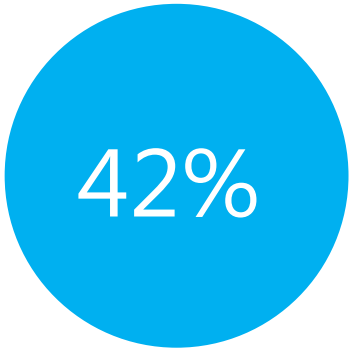

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 1 in 4 Pakistanis say that electricity load shedding is a very severe problem in their area; 13% more rural than urban respondents cite electricity load shedding to be a somewhat severe problem in their area.

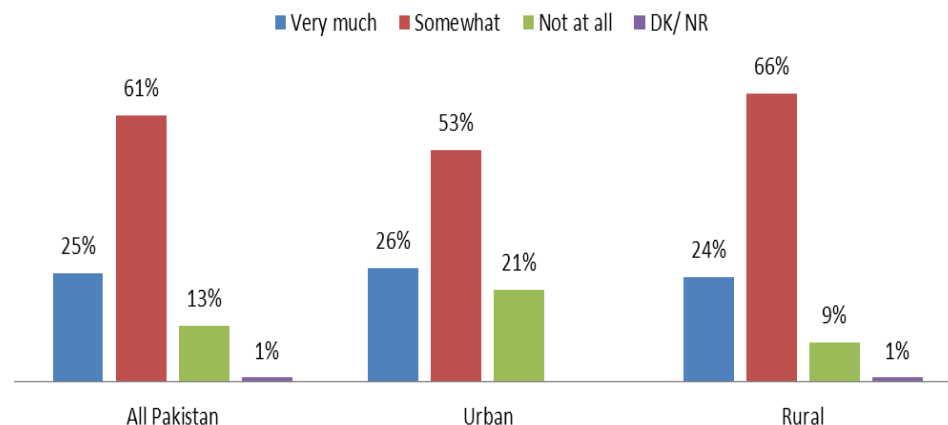
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "How extreme is the problem of electricity load shedding in your area?" In response to this question, 25% said electricity load shedding is a very extreme problem in their area, 61% said somewhat extreme, 13% said not extreme at all and 1% did not know or did not wish to respond.

Urban Rural Breakdown:

In urban areas, 26% said electricity load shedding is a very extreme problem in their area, 53% said somewhat extreme and 21% said not extreme at all. In rural areas, 24% said electricity load shedding is a very extreme problem in their area, 66% said somewhat extreme, 9% said not extreme at all and 1% did not know or did not wish to respond.

Comparing the two regions, 13% more rural than urban respondents cite electricity load shedding to be a somewhat severe problem in their area.

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1878 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during January 30 – February 6, 2017. 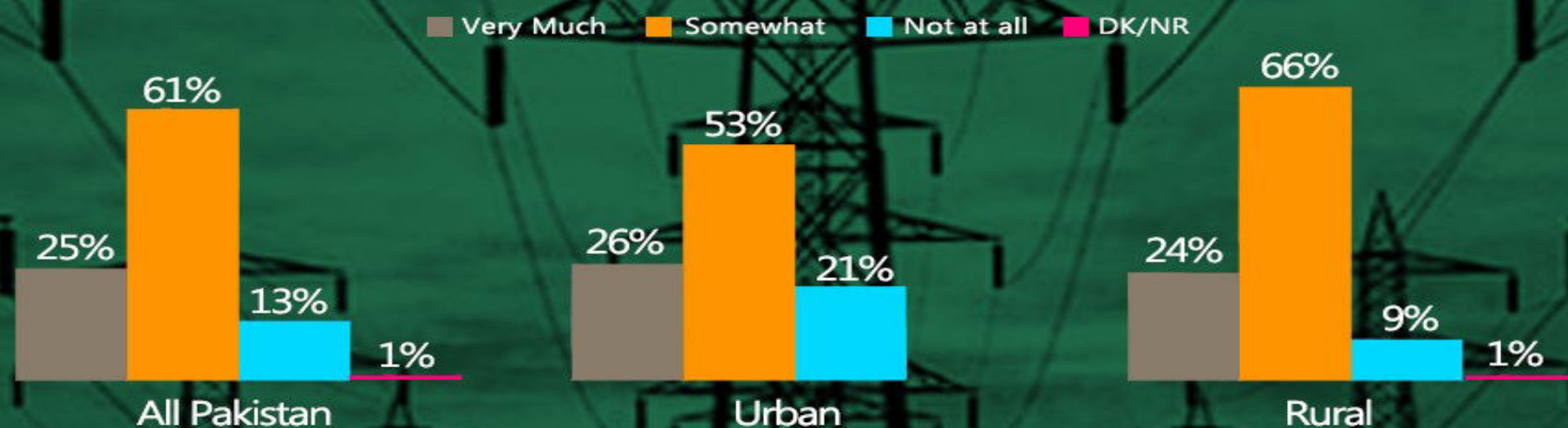

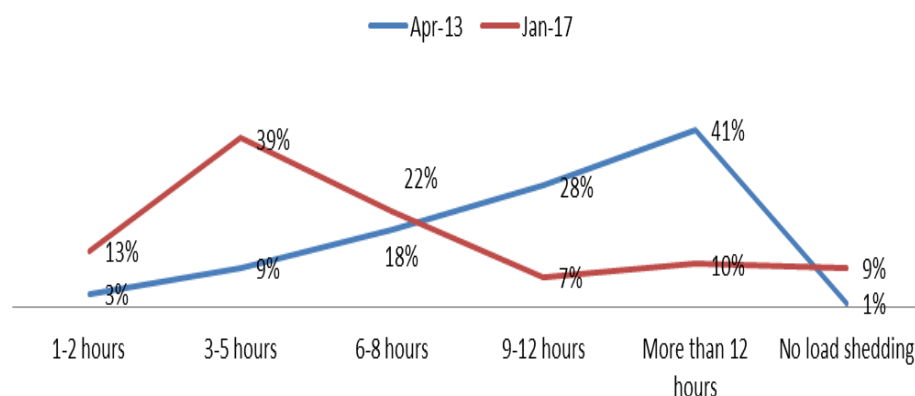
How extreme is the problem of electricity load shedding in your area?

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 39% Pakistanis say that electricity goes for 3-5 hours in their area; 9% say there is no load shedding in their area.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "Please tell us what is the duration of electricity load shedding in your area?" In response to this question in January 2017, 13% said the duration of electricity load shedding in their area is 1-2 hours, 39% said 3-5 hours, 22% said 6-8 hours, 7% said 9-12 hours, 10% said more than 12 hours, while 9% said there is no load shedding in their area.

Trend Analysis:

The same question was asked in April 2013. In 2013, 3% said the duration of electricity load shedding in their area is 1-2 hours, 9% said 3-5 hours, 18% said 6-8 hours, 22% said 9-12 hours, 41% said more than 12 hours, while 1% said there is no load shedding in their area.

According to public opinion, in four years, there has been a 10% increase in the proportion of Pakistanis who say that electricity load shedding in their area is 1-2 hours, a 30% increase in the proportion of Pakistanis who say that electricity load shedding in their area is 3-5 hours, a 4% increase in the proportion of Pakistanis who say that electricity load shedding in their area is 6-8 hours, a 21% decrease in the proportion of Pakistanis who say that electricity load shedding in their area is 9-12 hours, a 31% decrease in the proportion of Pakistanis who say that electricity load shedding in their area is more than 12 hours and an 8% increase in the proportion of Pakistanis who say that there is no load shedding in their area.

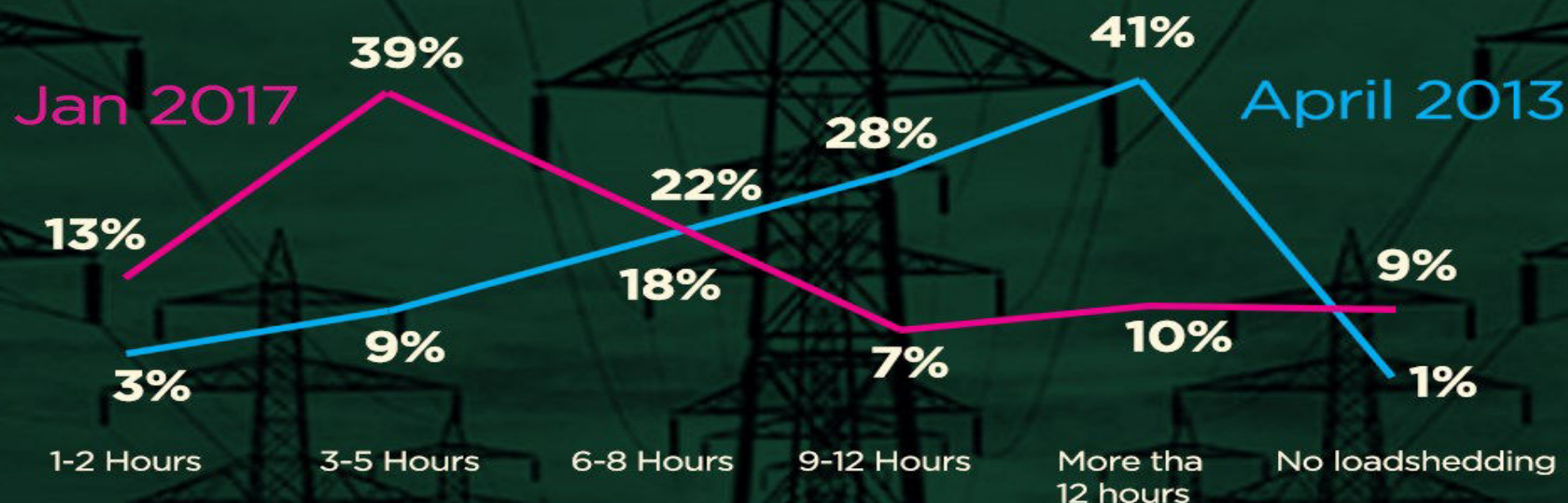
The findings of this poll point towards a relative improvement in electricity availability for Pakistani households since April 2013.

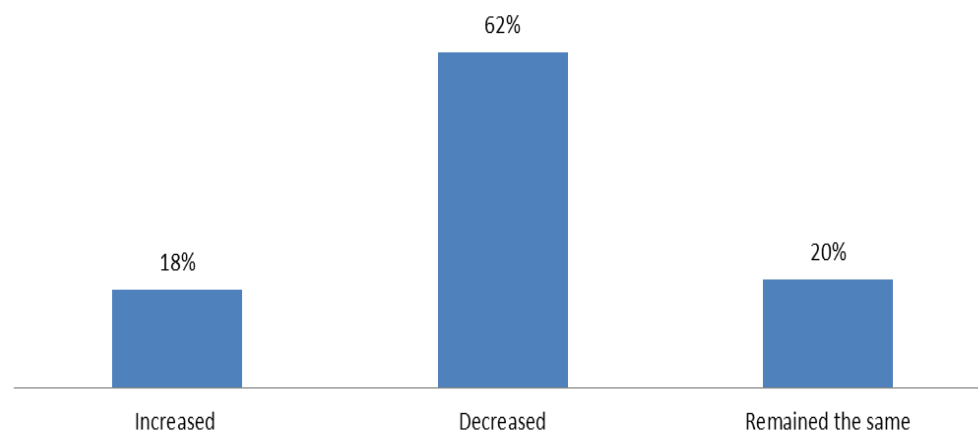

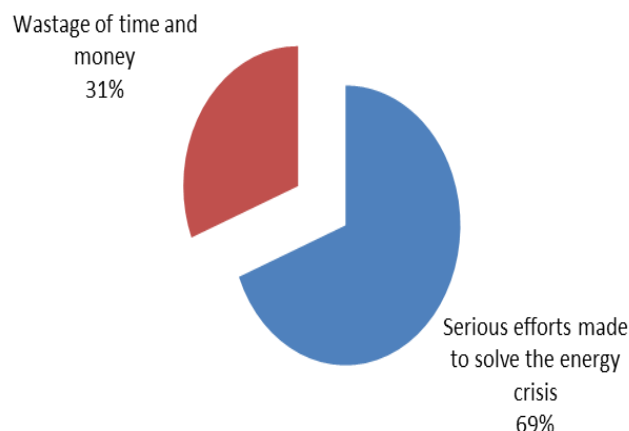
In your opinion, compared to the previous year has electricity load shedding in your area increased, decreased or remained the same this year?

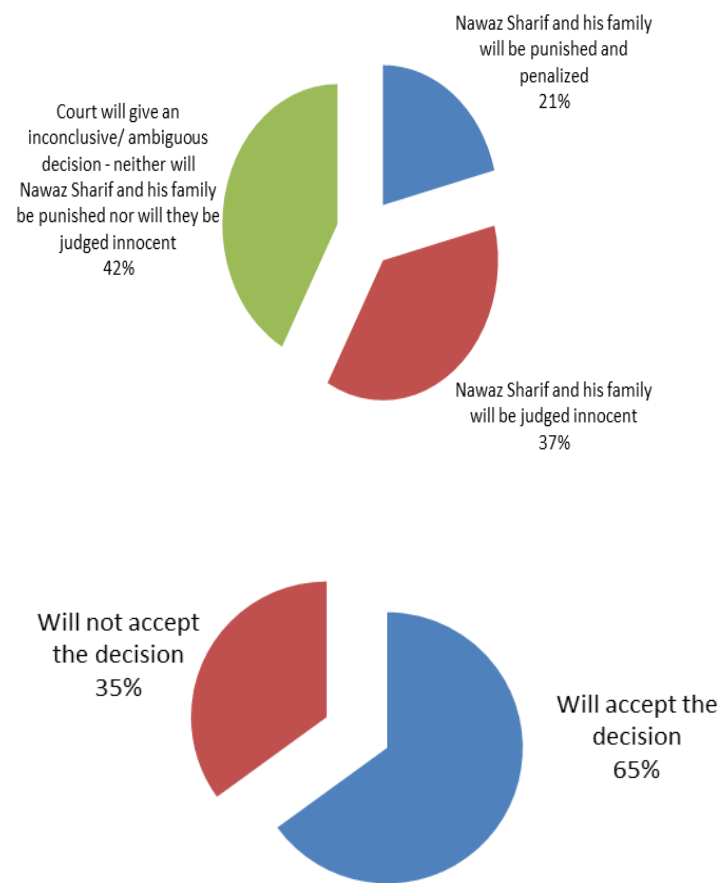
According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 4 in 10 Pakistanis believe that Supreme Court will give an inconclusive/ ambiguous decision on the Panama Leaks case; 65% opine that the court's decision will be accepted by the majority.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "Keeping in mind the Panama Leaks case, please tell in your opinion, which of the following result is most likely?" In response to this question, 21% said that Nawaz Sharif and his family will be punished and penalized, 37% said that Nawaz Sharif and his family will be judged innocent, while 42% said that court will give an inconclusive/ ambiguous decision.

Respondents were further asked, "Some people say that all political parties and public will accept the Supreme Court's decision on the Panamagate case, while others think it will not be accepted. What is your opinion?" In response to this question, 65% said that all political parties and public will accept the decision, while 35% said they will not accept the decision.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1813 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during
