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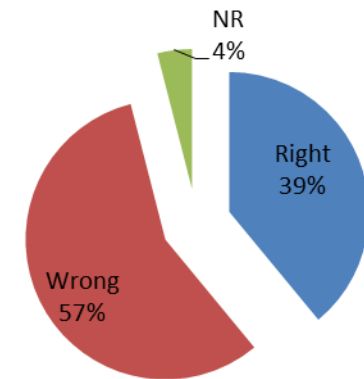

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 57% Pakistanis say that the government did wrong by arresting Hafiz Saeed.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "Recently, Hafiz Saeed, the head of Falaḥ In-saniat Foundation and Jamat ul Dawah was house arrested. Some people say that the government has done the right thing, while others say that the government did wrong. What is your opinion?" In response to this question, 39% said the government did the right thing, while 57% said the government did wrong. 4% did not wish to respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1784 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during February 6 – February 13, 2017. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

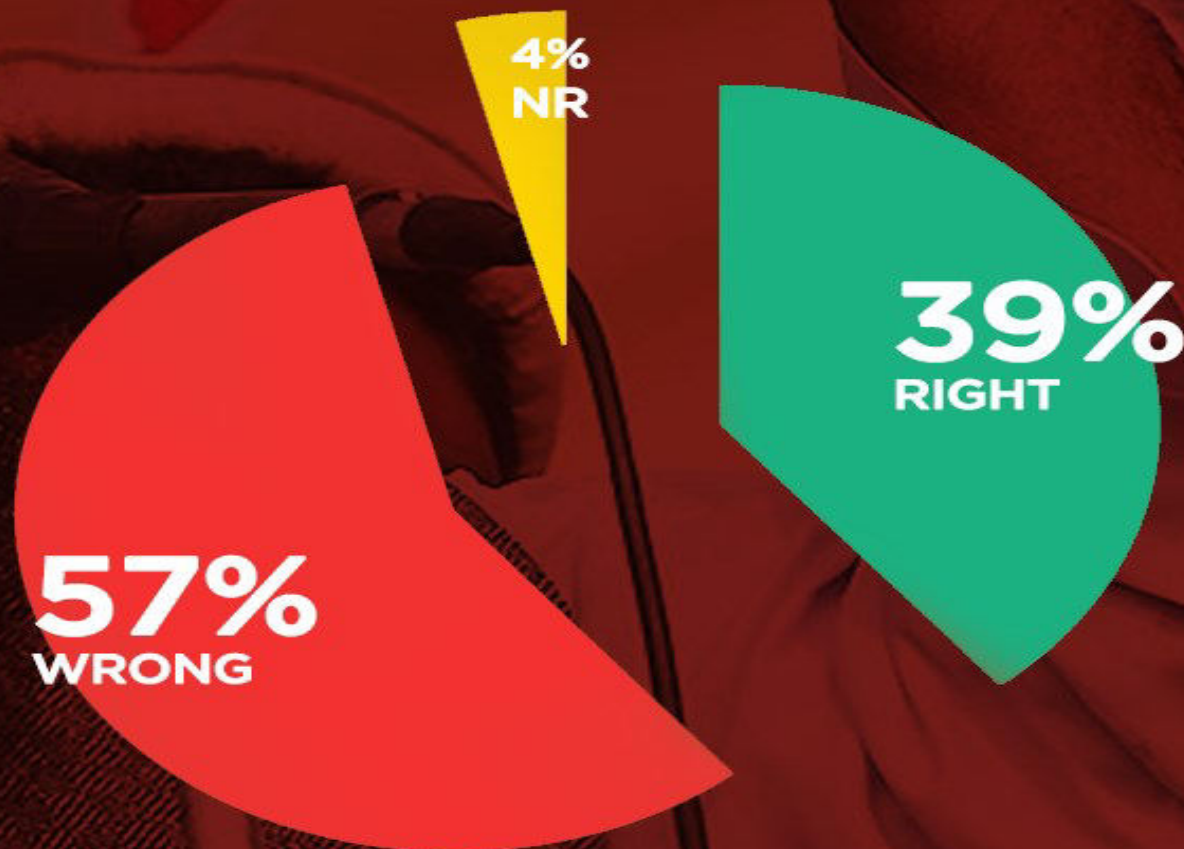

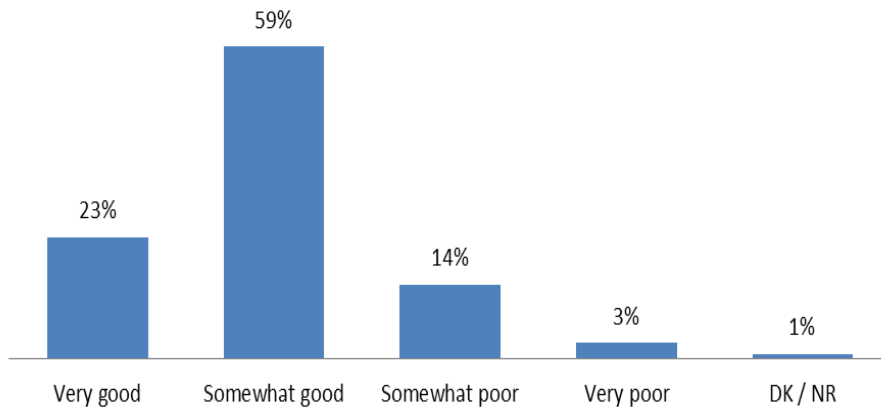

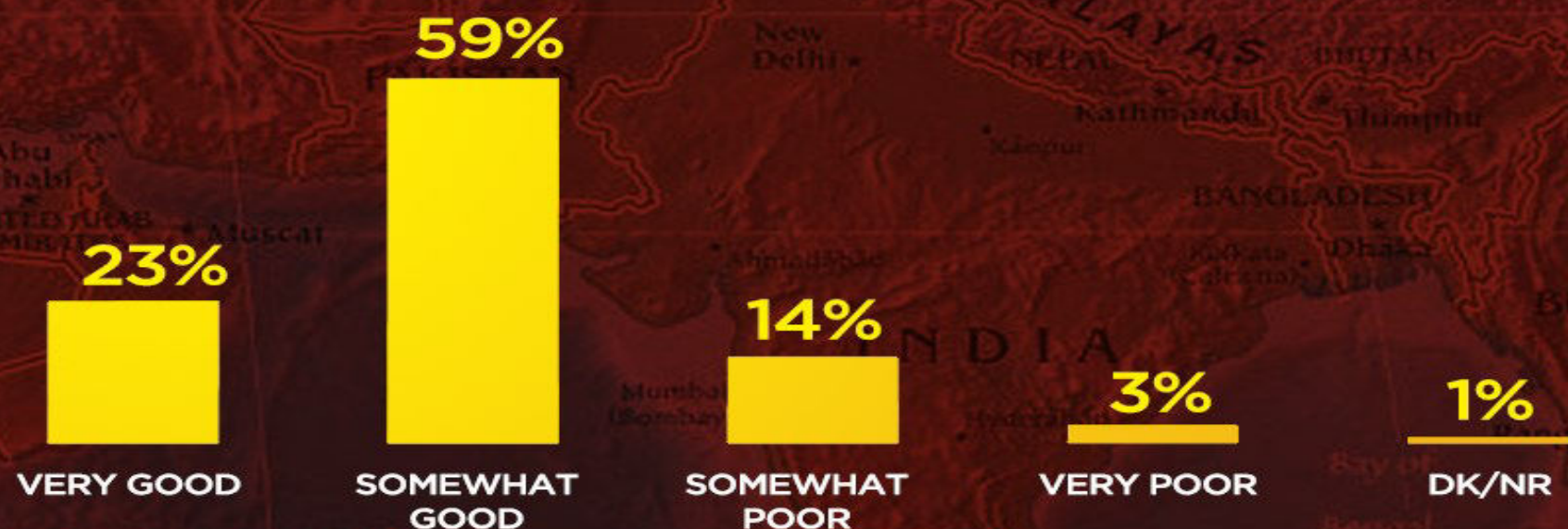
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "Turning now to Pakistan's relations with other countries in South Asia including: India, Nepal, Sri Lanka, Burma/ Myanmar, Bhutan, the Maldives and Afghanistan. Do you personally think Pakistan has good relations or poor relations with most of these countries in South Asia? And is that very or somewhat?" In response to this question, 23% said very good, 59% said somewhat good, 14% said somewhat poor and 3% said very poor. 1% did not know or did not wish to respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1838 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during February 20 – February 27, 2017. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

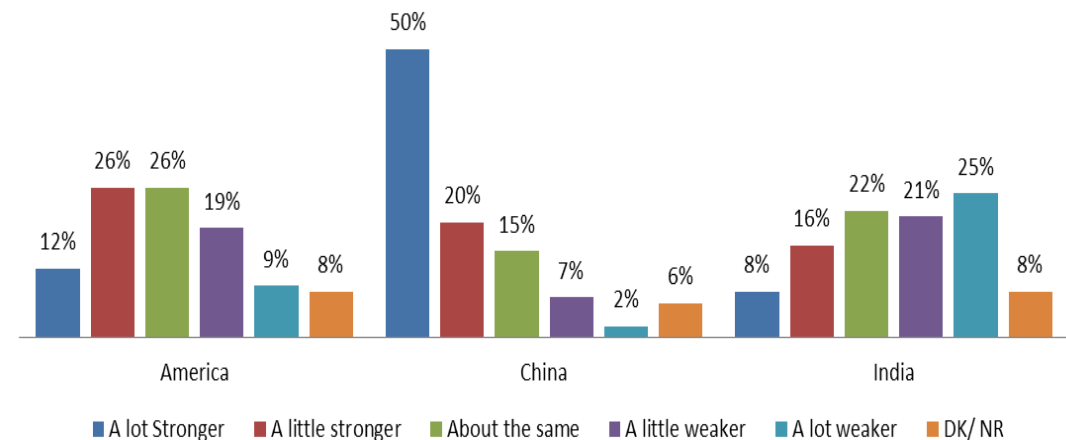

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, Majority Pakistanis (70%) would like Pakistan's relationship to grow stronger with China over the next ten years; 46% would prefer weaker relationship with India.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "And if it were up to you, would you like Pakistan's relationship with each of these countries to grow stronger, weaker or stay the same over the next 10 years. And is that a lot or a little?" In response to this question, for America 12% said they would like Pakistan's relationship to grow a lot stronger, 26% said a little stronger, 26% said about the same, 19% said a little weaker, 9% said a lot weaker, while 8% did not know or did not wish to respond. For China, 50% said they would like Pakistan's relationship to grow a lot stronger, 20% said a little stronger, 15% said about the same, 7% said a little weaker, 2% said a lot weaker, while 6% did not know or did not wish to respond. For India, 8% said they would like Pakistan's relationship to grow a lot stronger, 16% said a little stronger, 22% said about the same, 21% said a little weaker, 25% said a lot weaker, while 8% did not know or did not wish to respond.

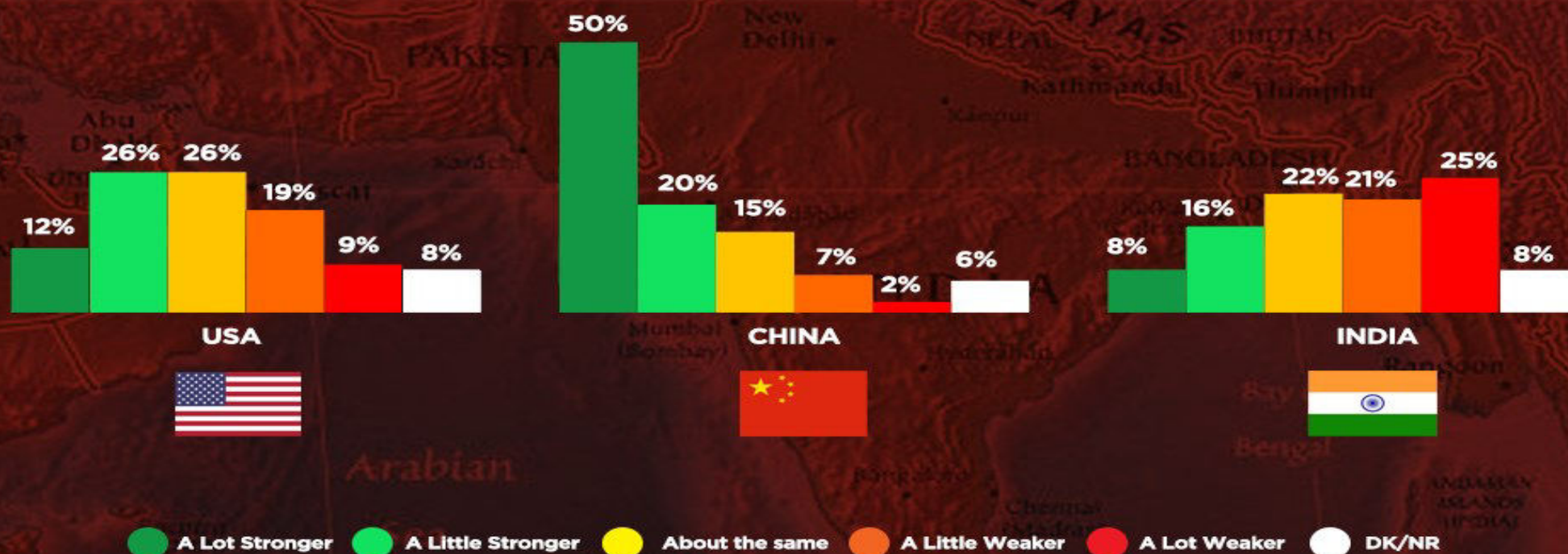

And if it were up to you, would you like Pakistan's relationship with each of these countries to grow stronger, weaker or stay the same over the next 10 years. And is that a lot or a little?



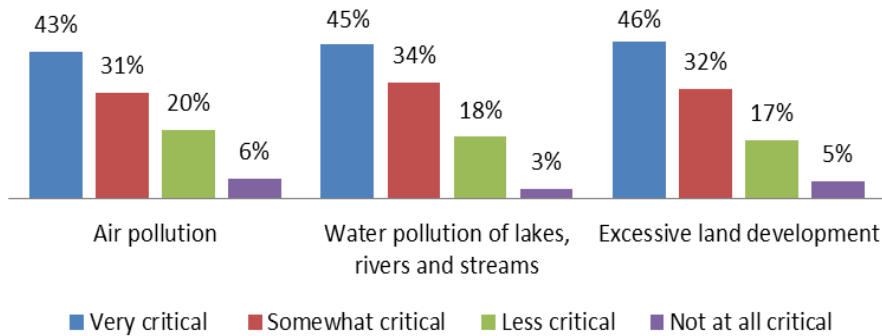

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 79% Pakistanis cite water pollution to be a critical problem (very or somewhat) in their locality, followed by 78% who say excessive land development.

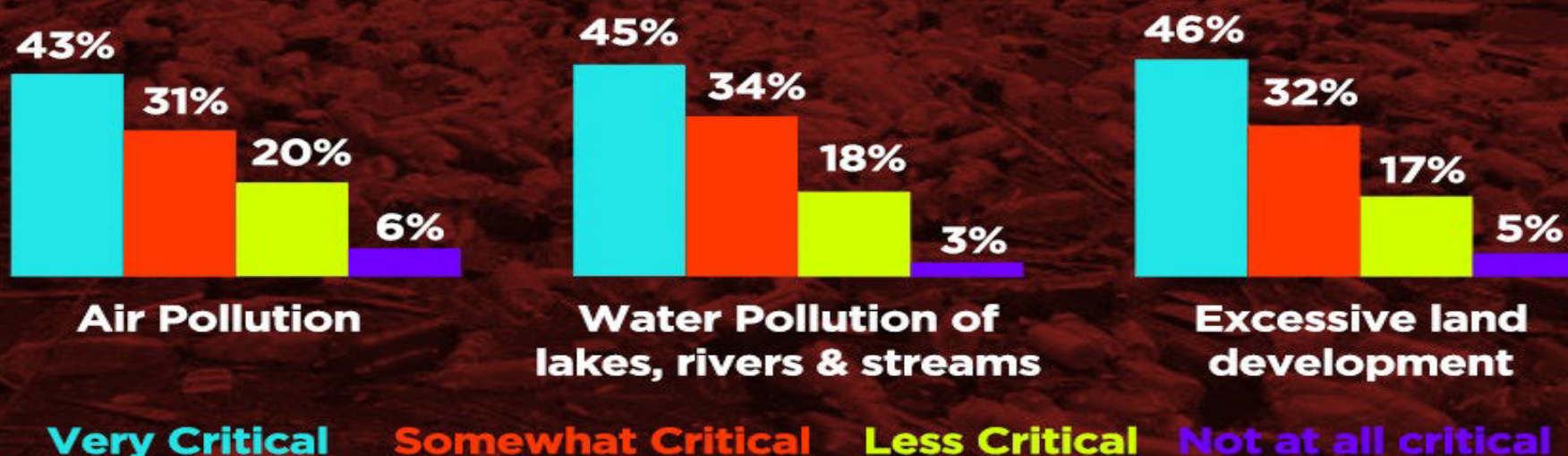
A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “How much, if at all is each of the following a problem in your local community?” In response to this question, for air pollution, 43% said it is a very critical problem in their local community, 31% said somewhat critical, 20% said less critical and 6% said not at all critical. For water pollution of lakes, rivers and streams, 45% said it is a very critical problem in their local community, 34% said somewhat critical, 18% said less critical and 3% said not at all critical. For excessive land development, 46% said it is a very critical problem in their local community, 32% said somewhat critical, 17% said less critical and 5% said not at all critical.

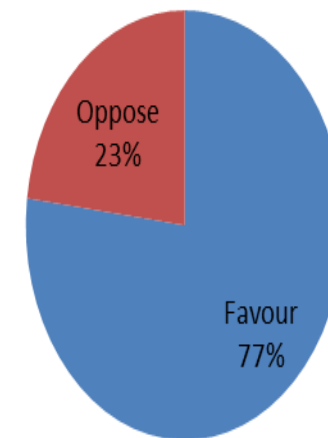

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 77% Pakistanis favour more nuclear plants to generate electricity in the country.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Do you favour or oppose expanding each of the following sources of energy in our country [More nuclear power plants to generate electricity]?” In response to this question 77% favour more nuclear power plants to increase electricity production, while 23% oppose it.

The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1838 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during February 20 – February 27, 2017. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.
