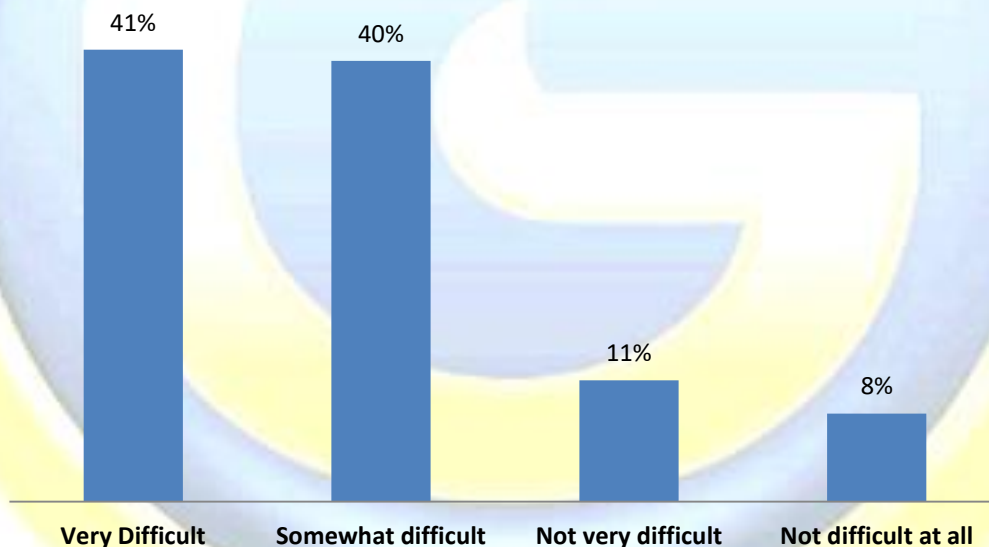
81% Pakistanis opine it was difficult (very or somewhat difficult) to fast in this year's Ramadan as compared to previous years. 19% say otherwise. (GALLUP & GILANI PAKISTAN POLL)

Islamabad, July 26, 2017

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 81% Pakistanis opine it was difficult (very or somewhat difficult) to fast in this year's Ramadan as compared to previous years. 19% say otherwise.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, "As compared to last year, how difficult was it for you to fast in the summer during this Ramadan?" In response to this question, 41% said it was very difficult, 40% said it was somewhat difficult, 11% said it was not very difficult while 8% said it was not difficult at all.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1823 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during June 19 - June 26, 2017. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.
