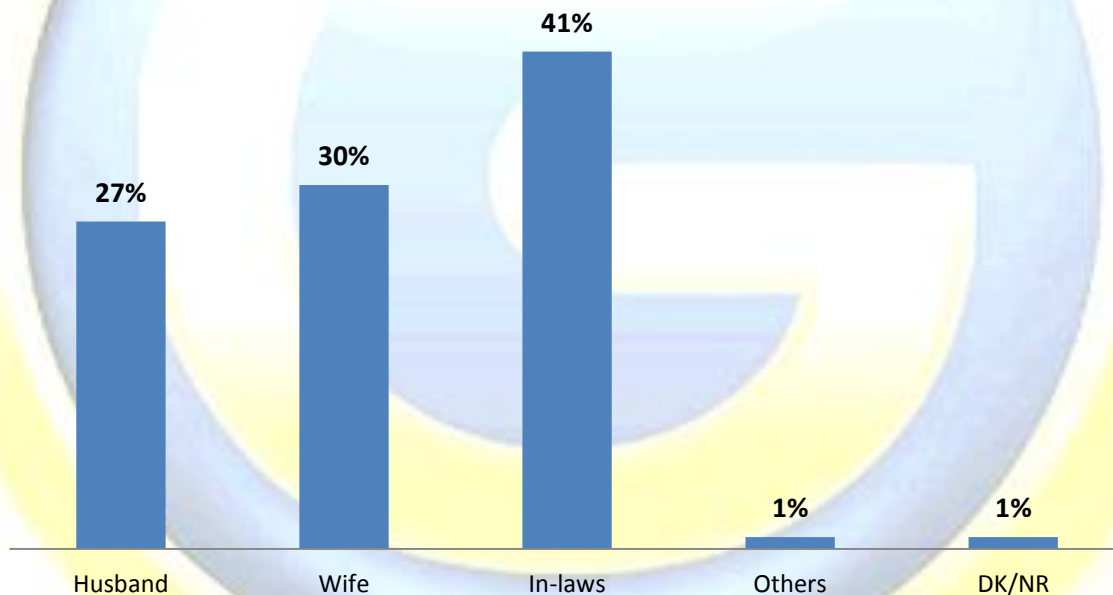
**2 in 5 Pakistanis opine that the in-laws are responsible for most divorces in Pakistan. 30% blame the wife.
(GALLUP & GILANI PAKISTAN POLL)**

Islamabad, October 9, 2017

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 2 in 5 Pakistanis opine that the in-laws are responsible for most divorces in Pakistan. 30% blame the wife.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked “Generally, when there are divorces in Pakistan, who do you think is the most responsible or the guilty party in the case?” In response, 27% said the husband, 30% said the wife, 41% said the in-laws and 1% said others. 1% did not know.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1781 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, September 11- September 18, 2017. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.
