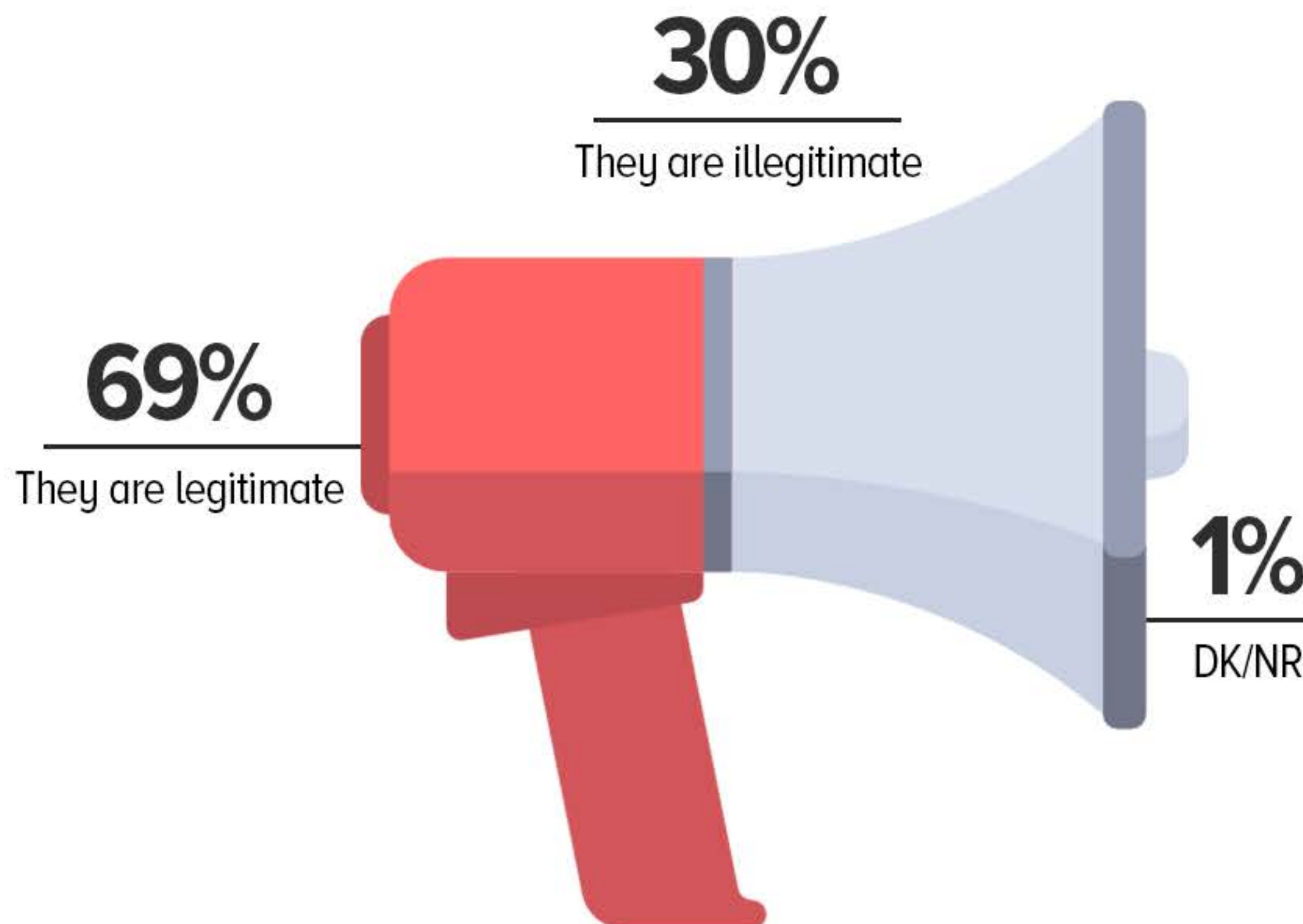

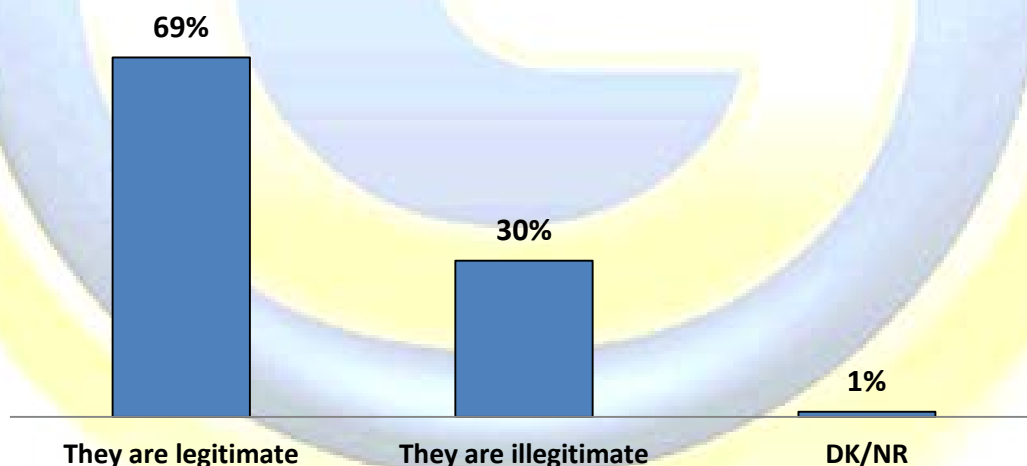
**7 in 10 Pakistanis believe that demands made by Tehreek-e-Labaik protesters during the sit-in were legitimate.

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 7 in 10 Pakistanis believe that demands made by Tehreek-e-Labaik protesters during the sit-in were legitimate.

A nationally representative sample of men and women from across the four provinces was asked, “Some people believe that the demands put forward as pre-conditions for ending the protest by the Tehreek-e-Labaik leaders, such as the resignation of Law Minister Zahid Hamid, the lifting of the ban which prohibits putting speakers on all sides of the mosques etc, are legitimate. While others think they are illegitimate. What do you think?” In response to this question, 69% said they were legitimate, 30% said they were illegitimate and 1% did not respond.

Question: “Some people believe that the demands put forward as pre-conditions for ending the protest by the Tehreek-e-Labaik leaders, such as the resignation of Law Minister Zahid Hamid, the lifting of the ban which prohibits putting speakers on all sides of the mosques etc, are legitimate. The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1829 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, November 19–November 25, 2017. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.
