



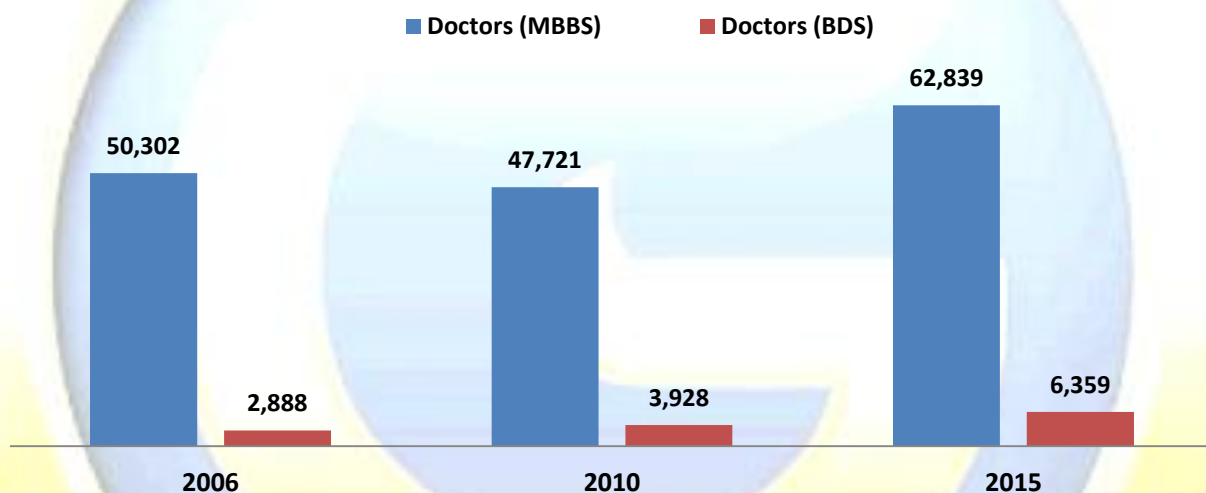

Despite a growth of 25% between 2006 to 2015 in MBBS doctors in Punjab, doctor patient ratio remains alarmingly low and unable to keep up with population growth: Gallup Pakistan Big Analytics Team

Islamabad, January 17, 2018

According to Pakistan Medical and Dental Council (PMDC) statistics as quoted in the Statistical Pocket Book 2017, over a period of 9 years, despite annual growths in the number of medical personnel, doctor patient ratio remains alarmingly low in Punjab.

The number of registered MBBS doctors in Punjab has increased from 50,302 in 2006 to 62,839 in 2015, a rise of 25% in 9 years with an annual rise of 2.7%. Meanwhile, the number of BDS doctors has depicted a growth of 13.3% annually and risen from 2,888 to 6,359 in 9 years.

On the other hand, the population of Punjab has also increased by 24% over a span of 9 years. It is alarming to note here that despite the sprawl of medical colleges in the country, the doctor patient ratio remains at 1 doctor per 1,702 people in Punjab. Moreover, by 2015, there were only 6,350 dentists/dental surgeons for a population of 107 million in Punjab.

As can be seen from the table below if one accounts for population growth, over the past 9 years growth in medical doctors is only 3% and growth in BDS doctors is -9%. In other words, the population per dentist has increased quite drastically in the past 9 years.

It should be noted that the statistics are only reflective of registered doctors and those who are practicing medicine in Pakistan maybe lower (Brain drain as well as large number of female doctors not practicing medicine despite heavily registered). In order to improve the doctor patient ratio, significant increase in supply of doctors is needed.
