GALLUP PAKISTAN ELECTORAL REPOSITORY PARTYWISE RUNNER UPS: PUNJAB

Elections 2013: Out of 150 seats in Punjab, PTI was the runner up on 35% seats followed by PPP and Independent candidates on 19% seats each. PML N candidates were runner ups on 15% seats only.

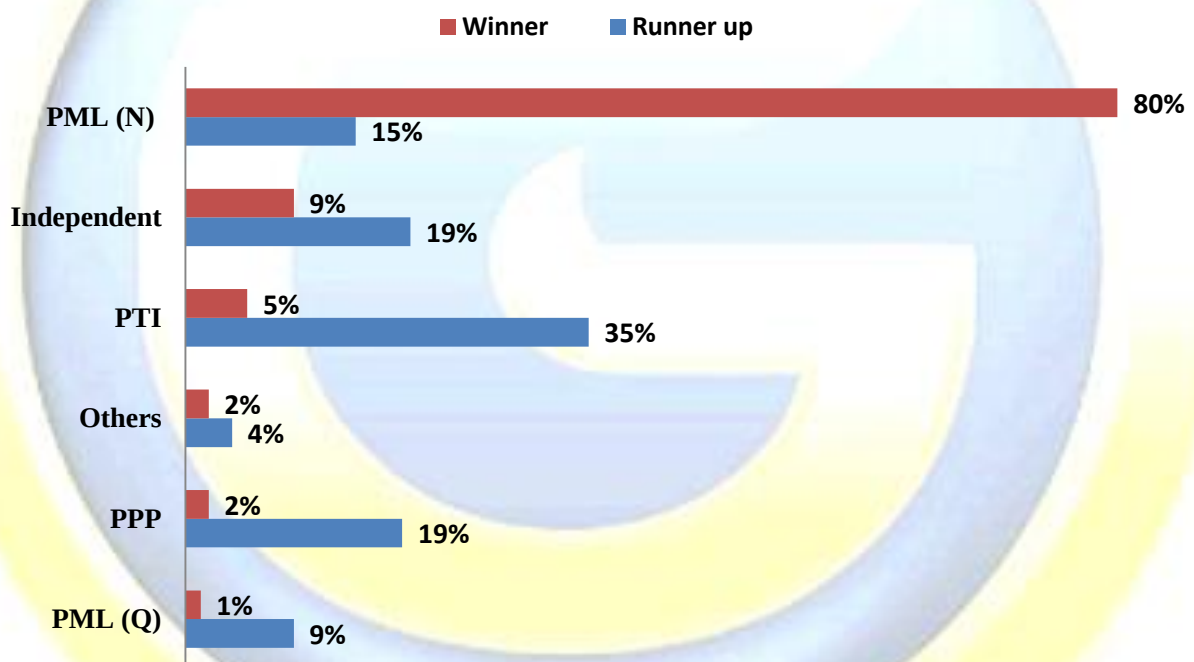

Introduction to the series on Gallup Electoral Repository:

This press release is part of a special press release that aims to provide the readers interesting findings from Gallup Pakistan's electoral database. The data has been consolidated from the Elections Commission of Pakistan (ECP) data on the latest general elections held in 2013.

This particular press release provides noteworthy information on the party-wise share of runner-up candidates in the 2013 elections in Punjab.

Share of winner/runner-up candidates in Punjab

An analysis of the electoral results suggests that while PML (N) was victorious in 80% of the constituencies in Punjab, its candidates were runner ups in 22 constituencies (15%). Meanwhile, PPP candidates were winners in 8 seats (2%), they were runner ups in 28 constituencies (19%). On the other hand, PTI candidates were victorious in 5% of the constituencies and runner ups in over 52 constituencies (35%).

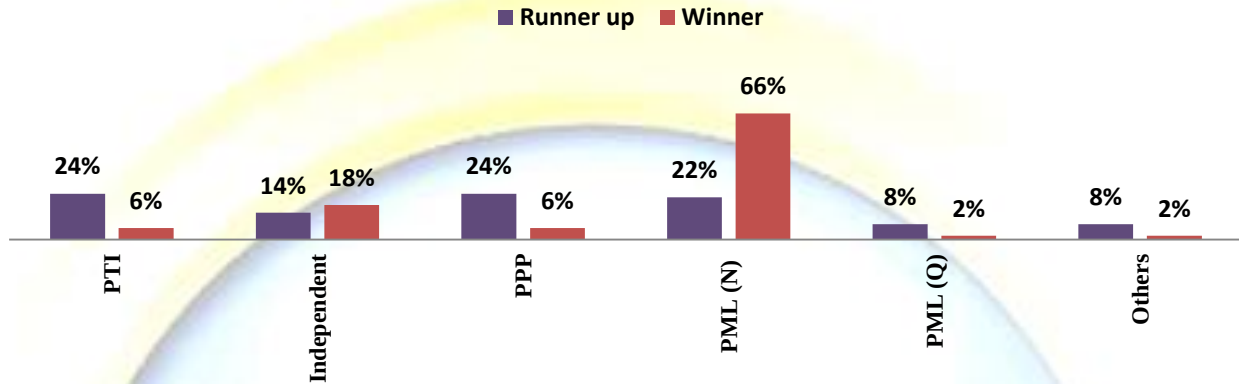


Sub-regional comparison:

Southern Punjab:

Out of 50 seats in Southern Punjab, PTI and PPP were runner ups in 24% constituencies each, PML N candidates were runner ups in 22% of the constituencies, Independent candidates in 14% constituencies and PML-Q in 8% constituencies. Runner ups for the remaining 4 seats belonged to other parties.

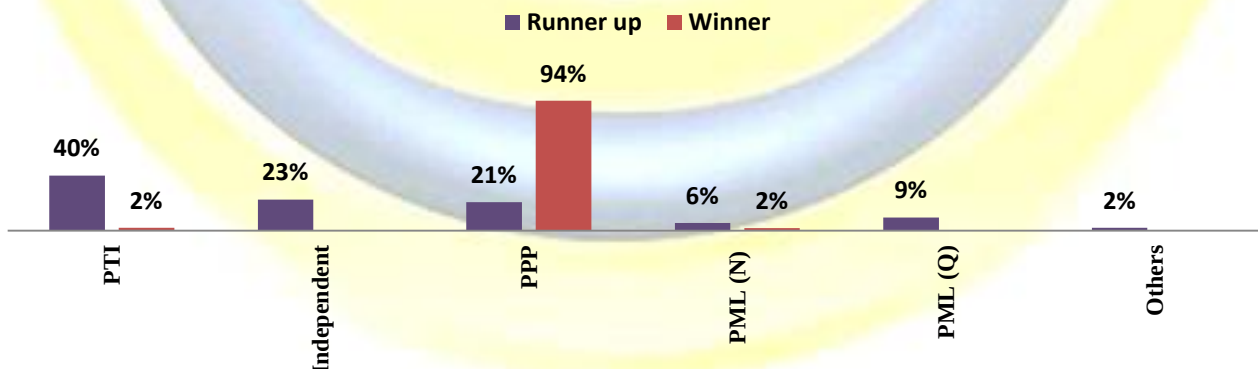

Central Punjab:

Out of 53 seats in Central Punjab, PTI candidates were runner ups in 40% of the constituencies; Independent candidates were runner ups in 23% of the constituencies, PPP candidates in 21% constituencies and PML-Q in 9% of the constituencies. 6% of the runner up candidates belonged to PML-N.

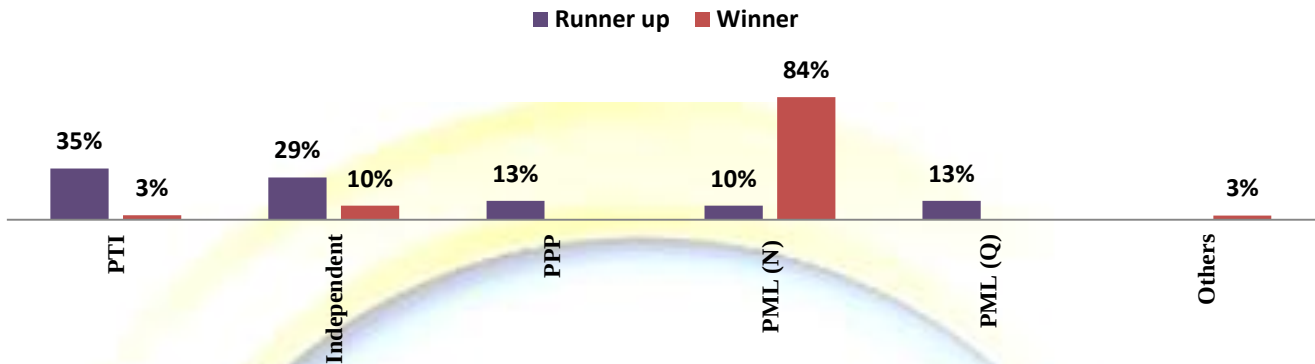

Western Punjab:

Out of 31 seats in Western Punjab, PTI candidates were runner ups in 35% of the constituencies; Independent candidates were runner ups in 29% of the constituencies, PPP and PML Q candidates in 13% constituencies each and PML N in 10% of the constituencies. 6% of the runner up candidates belonged to PML-N.

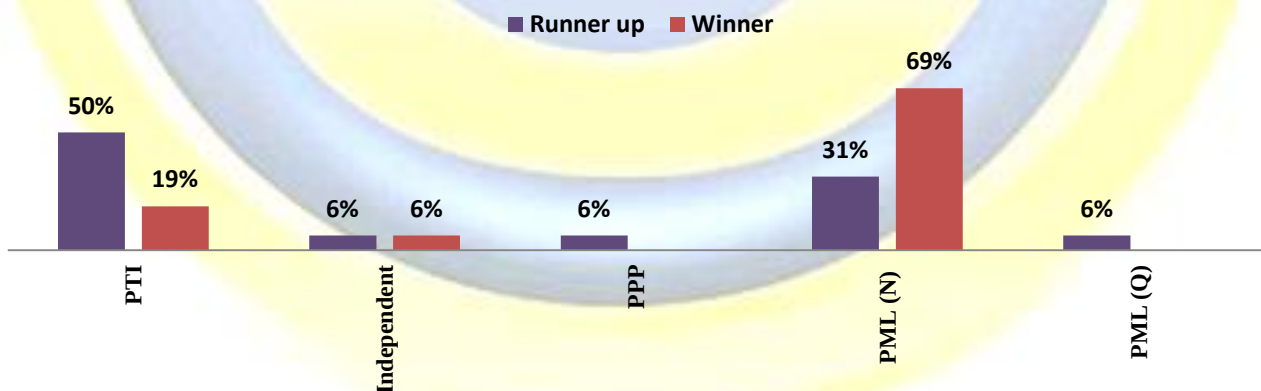

Northern Punjab:

Out of 16 seats in Northern Punjab, PTI candidates were runner ups in 50% of the constituencies, PML N candidates were runner ups in 31% of the constituencies, 6% each of the runner up candidates belonged to PML Q, PPP and Independent.

Share of winner/runner-up candidates in Northern Punjab



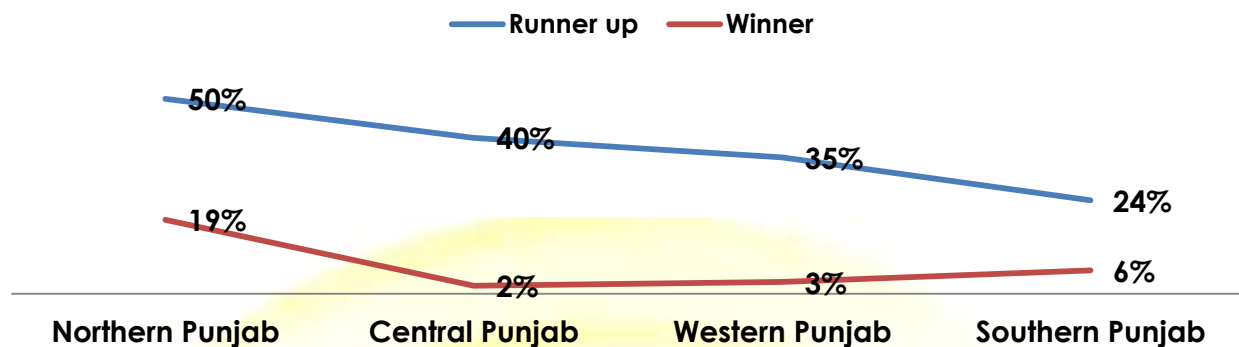

Gallup Pakistan Electoral Repository: An Introduction

The Gallup Pakistan Electoral Repository is comprised of the following sources:

1. Election Commission data on past 10 elections in Pakistan, available over each constituency. This data was acquired from Election Commission website and converted into digital database in SPSS form and is now referred to as Gilani Index of Electoral Record.
2. Gallup Exit Polls for every election since 1985.
3. Gallup pre and post-election survey record since 1985.
4. Analysis by Dr. Ijaz Shafi Gilani on elections piece by piece, as well as in combined form.
