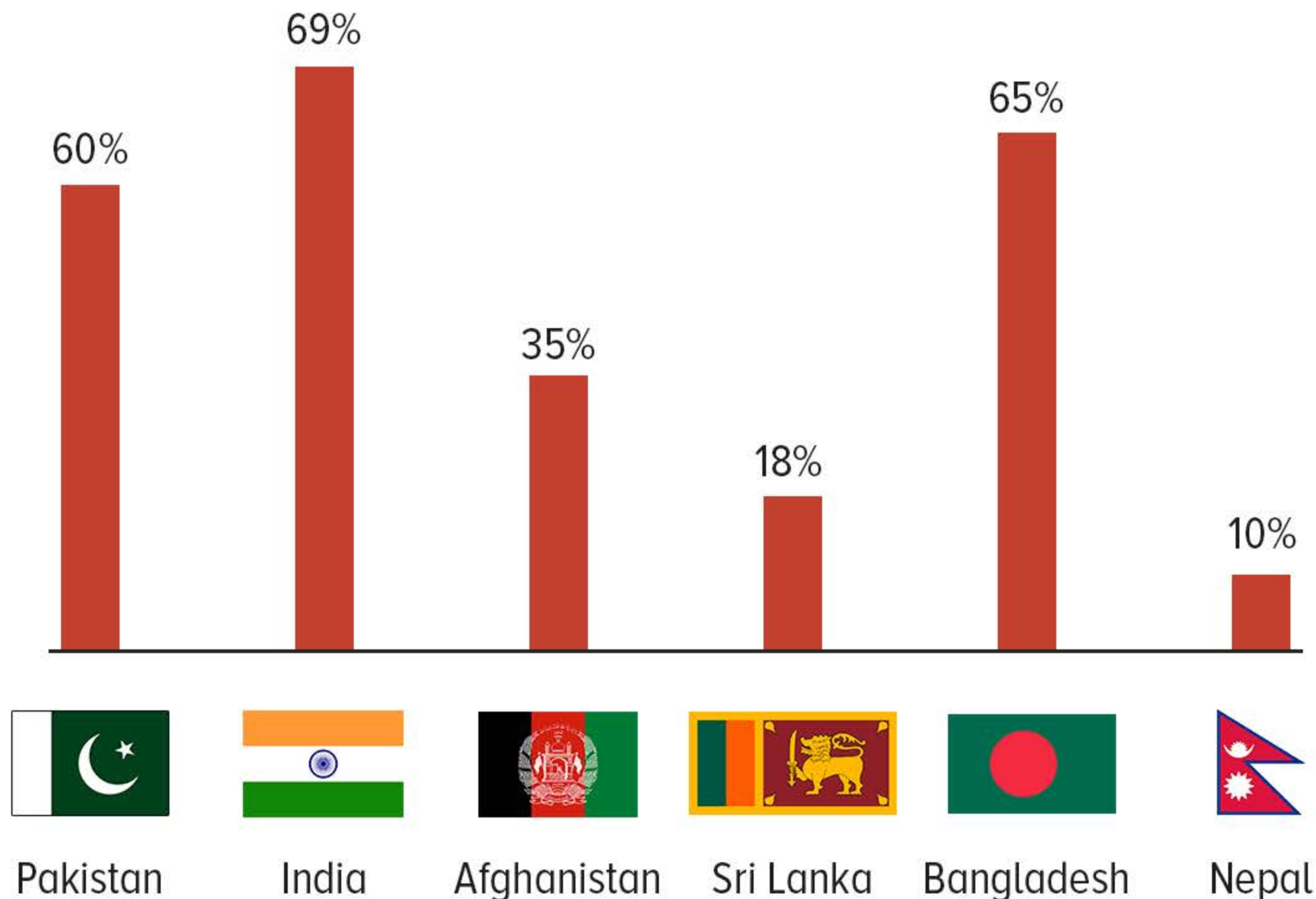

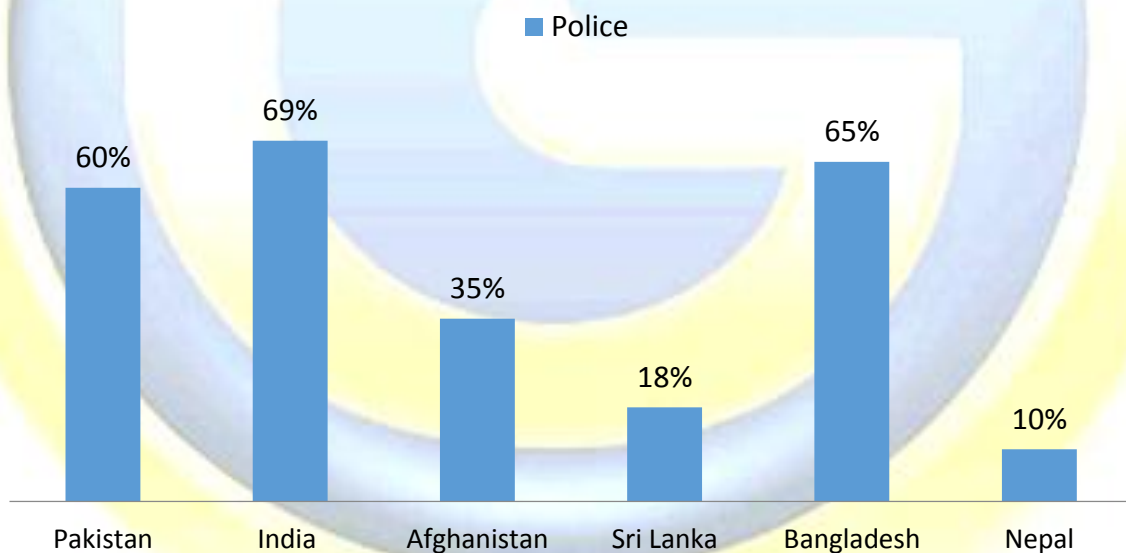

According to the findings of the World Justice Project Report on *The Rule of Law in Pakistan* based on a Gallup Survey in urban Pakistan, as compared to neighbouring South Asian countries, more Pakistanis report they, or someone in their neighbourhood, have paid a bribe to receive assistance from the police (60%).

Regional Comparison: Nepal least bribery prone; bribery rate highest in India.

Bribery is least pervasive in Nepal where only 10% respondents claim to have paid bribes to police officers.
