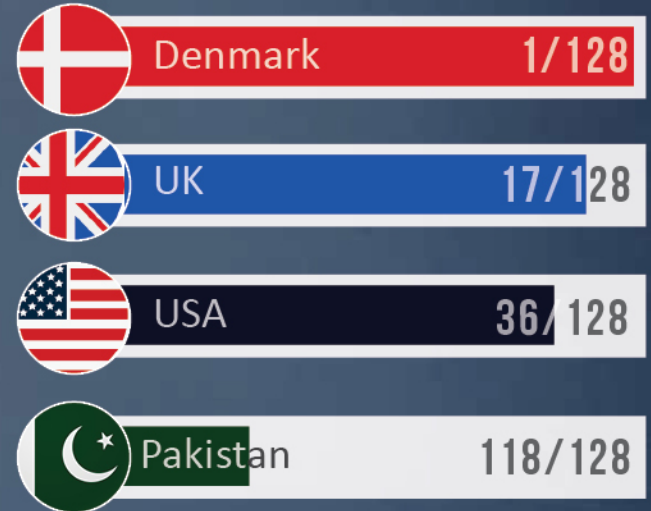

**Civil Justice Index: Pakistan ranks 118 across 128 countries in the world.
(World Justice Project and Gallup & Gilani Pakistan)**

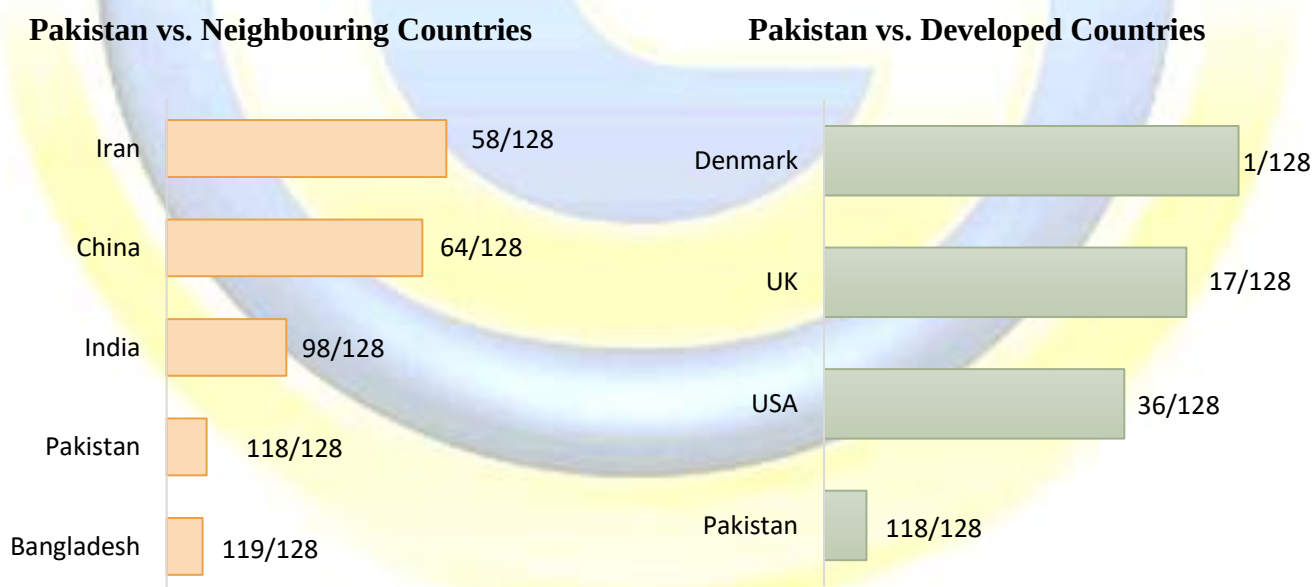

According to a World Justice Project (WJP) Survey conducted by Gallup Pakistan, Pakistan ranks 118 among 128 countries surveyed in the world in terms of civil justice.

The global survey results are based on Factor 7 of the WJP Rule of Law Index which measures whether ordinary people can resolve their grievances peacefully and effectively through the civil justice system. It measures whether civil justice systems are accessible and affordable as well as free of discrimination, corruption, and improper influence by public officials. It examines whether court proceedings are conducted without unreasonable delays and whether decisions are enforced effectively. It also measures the accessibility, impartiality, and effectiveness of alternative dispute resolution mechanisms.

Pakistan's score on the index has remained the same at 0.38 in 2019 and 2020, while Pakistan's rank has risen by two places.

The index is based on several indicators such as accessible and affordable civil justice, discrimination free civil justice, corruption free civil justice, civil justice free of improper government influence, not subject to unreasonable delay, civil justice is impartial and effectively enforced. Within the sub-factors, Pakistan ranks 122/128 in accessible & affordable civil justice, and 126/128 on impartiality and accessibility of alternate dispute resolution mechanism.

The study was released by World Justice Project and carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The country scores and rankings presented in this report are built from more than 500 variables drawn from the assessments of more than 130,000 households and 4,000 legal practitioners and experts in 128 countries and jurisdictions. The study in Pakistan was carried out among a sample of 1,000 men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, during 2019. The error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at the 95% confidence level.
