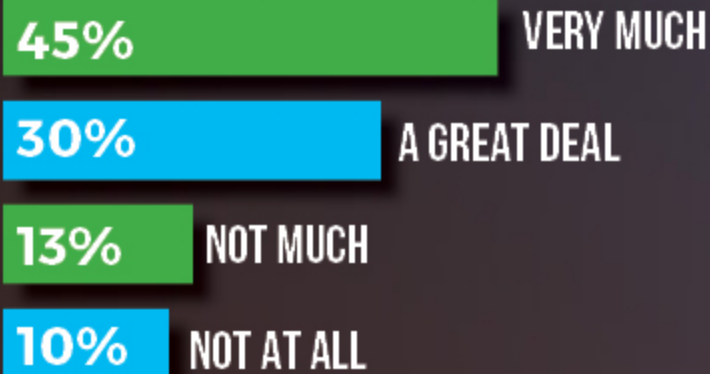


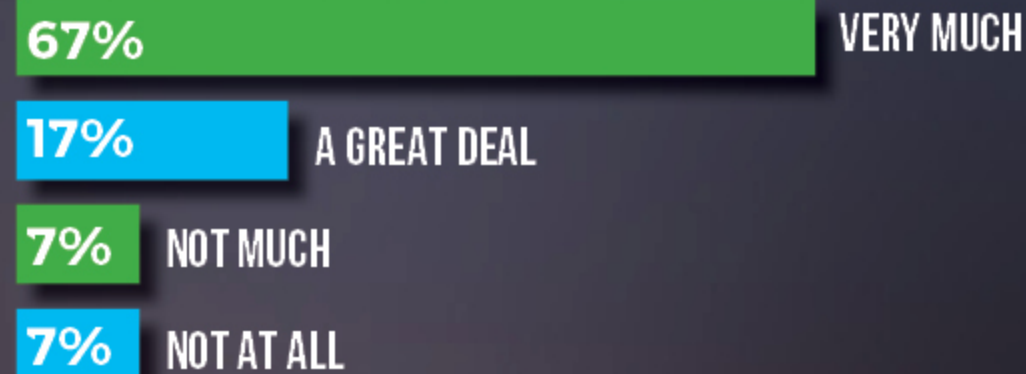

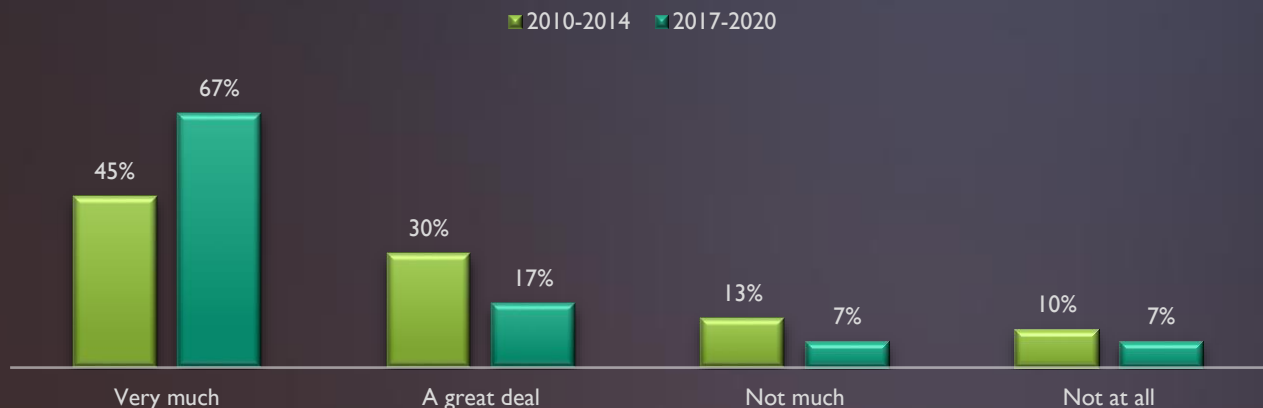
Islamabad, December 15, 2020

According to the World Values Survey conducted between the year 2010-2014, respondents were asked “To what degree are you worried about not being able to give your children a good education?” In response 45% said very much, 30% said a great deal, 13% said not much and 10% said not at all.

Comparative Picture: The question was asked again between 2017-2020 during Wave 7 of the World Values Survey to enable a comparison across the years. According to the 2020 results 67% said very much, 17% said a great deal, 7% said not much and 7% said not at all.

This press release has been made as part of the Gallup Pakistan History Project which aims to release historical empirical polling data to wider audiences. The objective is to sustain and encourage empirical decision making in Pakistan.
