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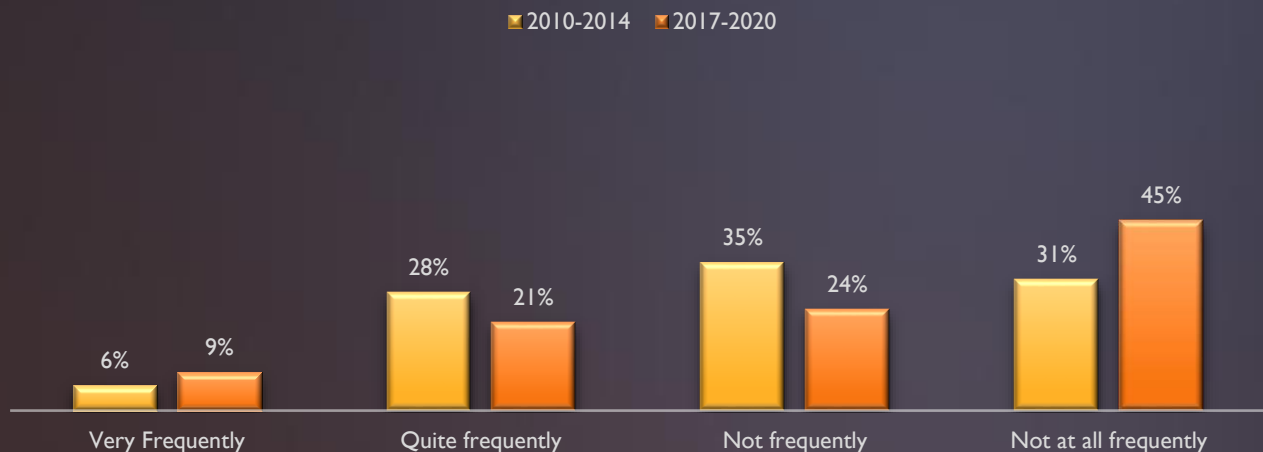

According to the World Values Survey conducted between the year 2010-2014, respondents were asked "How frequently do robberies occur in your neighborhood?" In response 6% said very frequently, 28% said quite frequently, 35% said not frequently and 31% said not at all frequently.

Comparative Picture: The question was asked again between 2017-2020 during Wave 7 of the World Values Survey to enable a comparison across the years. According to the 2020 results 9% said very frequently, 21% said quite frequently, 24% said not frequently and 45% said not at all frequently.

This press release has been made as part of the Gallup Pakistan History Project which aims to release historical empirical polling data to wider audiences. The objective is to sustain and encourage empirical decision making in Pakistan.
