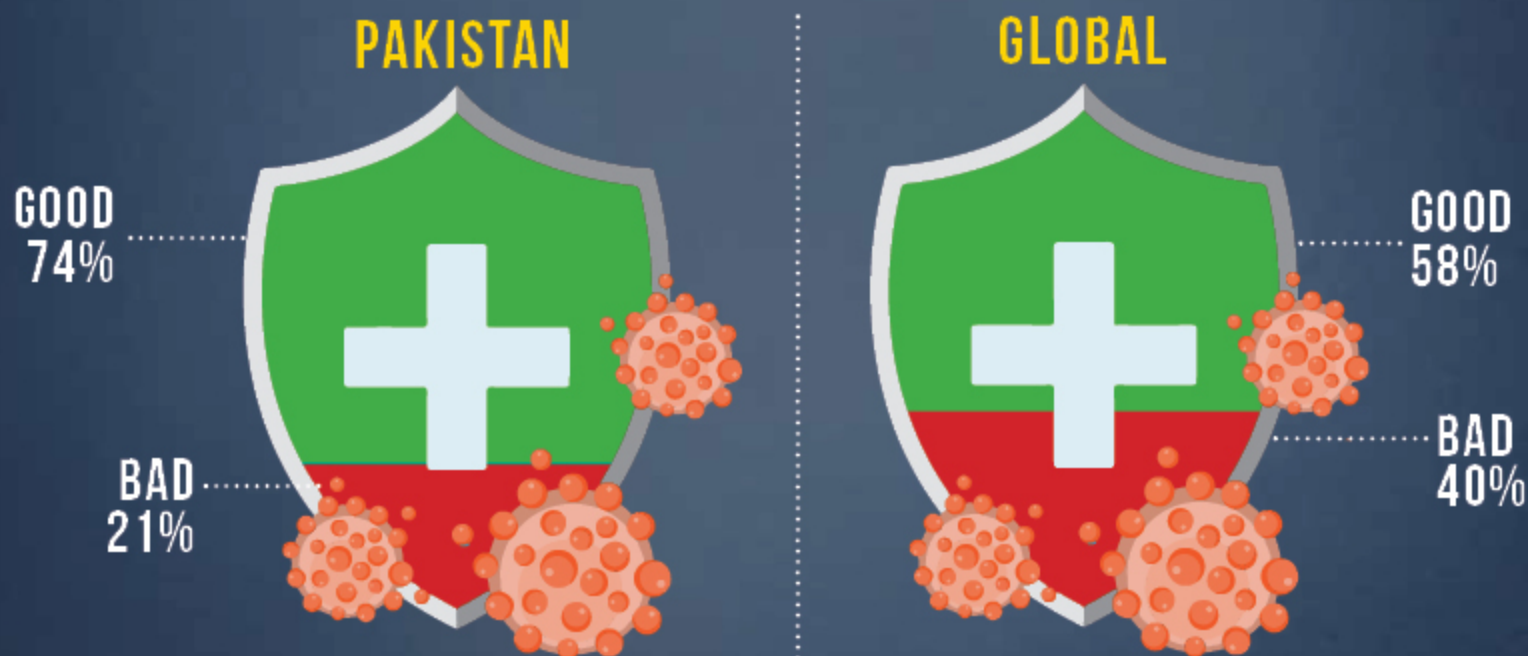

74% PAKISTANIS (16% ABOVE THE GLOBAL AVERAGE) THINK THAT THE HEALTHCARE SYSTEM'S CAPACITY WITH REGARDS TO THE CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC IN PAKISTAN IS GOOD. PAKISTAN RANKS 10TH OUT OF 32 COUNTRIES IN TERMS OF SATISFACTION WITH HEALTHCARE SYSTEM'S CAPACITY WITH RESPECT TO COVID-19: GALLUP PAKISTAN AND WIN WORLD SURVEY

74 % Pakistanis (16 % above the global average) think that the healthcare system's capacity with regards to the coronavirus pandemic in Pakistan is good. Pakistan ranks 10th out of 32 countries in terms of satisfaction with healthcare system's capacity with respect to COVID-19: Gallup Pakistan and WIN World Survey

According to a Gallup Pakistan Survey in Pakistan (and similar surveys done by Worldwide Independent Network of Market Research (WIN) across the world), 74% Pakistanis (16% above the global average) think that the healthcare capacity's system with respect to the coronavirus pandemic in Pakistan is good

21% Pakistanis are not satisfied with the healthcare system's capacity with respect to the coronavirus pandemic in Pakistan.

These findings emerge from an International survey conducted across the globe by The Worldwide Independent Network of Market Research (WIN): a global network conducting market research and opinion polls in every continent. WIN International has published the Annual WIN World Survey (WWS - 2020) exploring the views and beliefs of 26,759 individuals among citizens from 32 countries across the globe about the pandemic. The survey analyzes views and opinions related to the vaccine, the way governments handled the health crisis, the capacity of the national health systems and the likelihood of travelling in 2021.

Key Summary Findings:

- 1) 74% Pakistanis, 16% above the global average, rated their healthcare system's capacity with respect to COVID-19 as very well or pretty good
- 2) 77% in India (slightly higher than Pakistan) think that their healthcare system's capacity with respect to COVID-19 is good.
- 3) Perception of healthcare system's capacity during Covid-19 crisis: Pakistan in comparison with other countries: Pakistan lies above the global average of 58%
- 4) Healthcare system's capacity with respect to COVID-19 as per public perception was found to be highest in China followed by Vietnam and then Denmark.
- 5) Pakistan ranks 10th among 32 countries surveyed about healthcare system's capacity with regards to COVID-19 pandemic

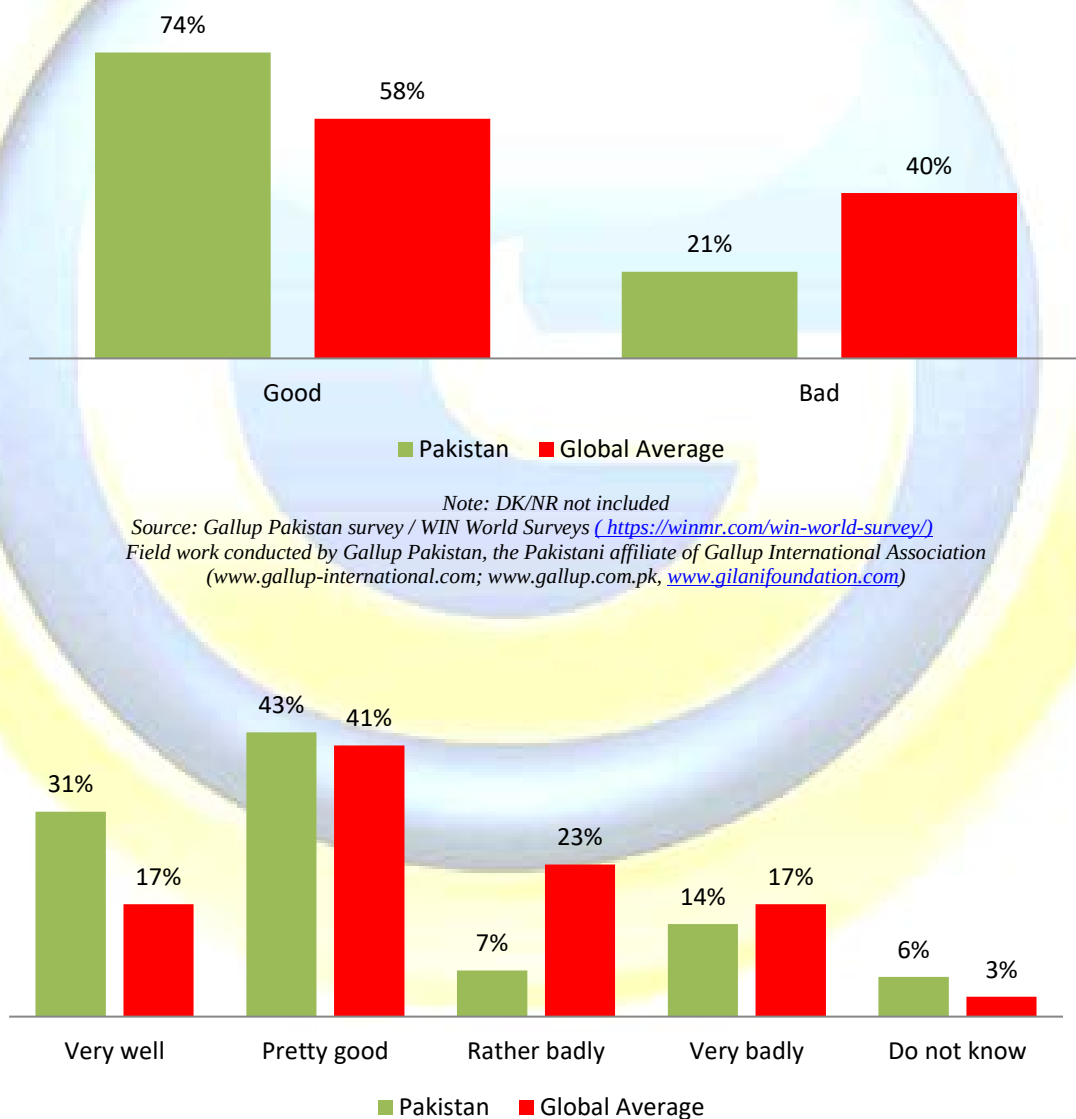


Perception of healthcare system's capacity with respect to COVID-19:
74% Pakistanis, 16% above the global average, rated the healthcare system's capacity with respect to COVID-19 as very well or pretty good

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces was asked the following question, “How would you rate the capacity of the health care system in your country with regard to the coronavirus pandemic?” In response to this question, 31% Pakistanis said very well, 43% said pretty good, 7% said rather badly, 14% said very badly while 6% did not know/did not respond.

Global result: Globally, 17% said very well, 41% said pretty good, 23% said rather badly, 17% said very badly while 3% did not know/did not respond.

Question: “How would you rate the healthcare system capacity in your country with regard to the coronavirus pandemic?”



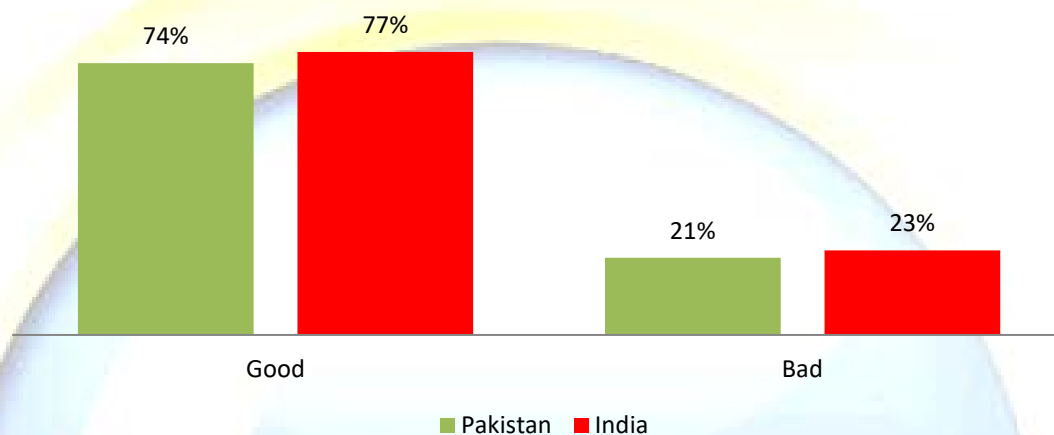

Regional comparative results: 77% in India (slightly higher than Pakistan) think that their healthcare system's capacity with respect to COVID-19 is good.

In India, 34% said very well, 42% said pretty good, 17% said rather badly and 6% said very badly.

The survey was also conducted in India as part of the international study. Responding to the same question, in India, 34% said very well, 42% said pretty good, 17% said rather badly and 6% said very badly. This is not too different from Pakistan where 74% people are satisfied with the healthcare system's capacity with respect to COVID-19.

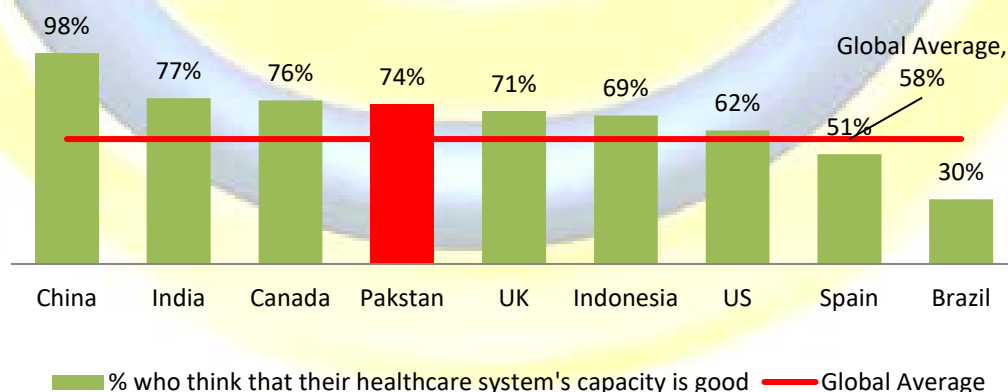

Perception of healthcare system's capacity during COVID-19 crisis: Pakistan in comparison with other countries: Pakistan lies above the global average of 58 %

74% of Pakistanis rate the healthcare system's capacity with respect to COVID-19 as very well or pretty good. This is lower than China (98%), India (77%) and Canada (76%) however it is higher than UK (71%), US (62%), Spain (51%), and Brazil (30%).



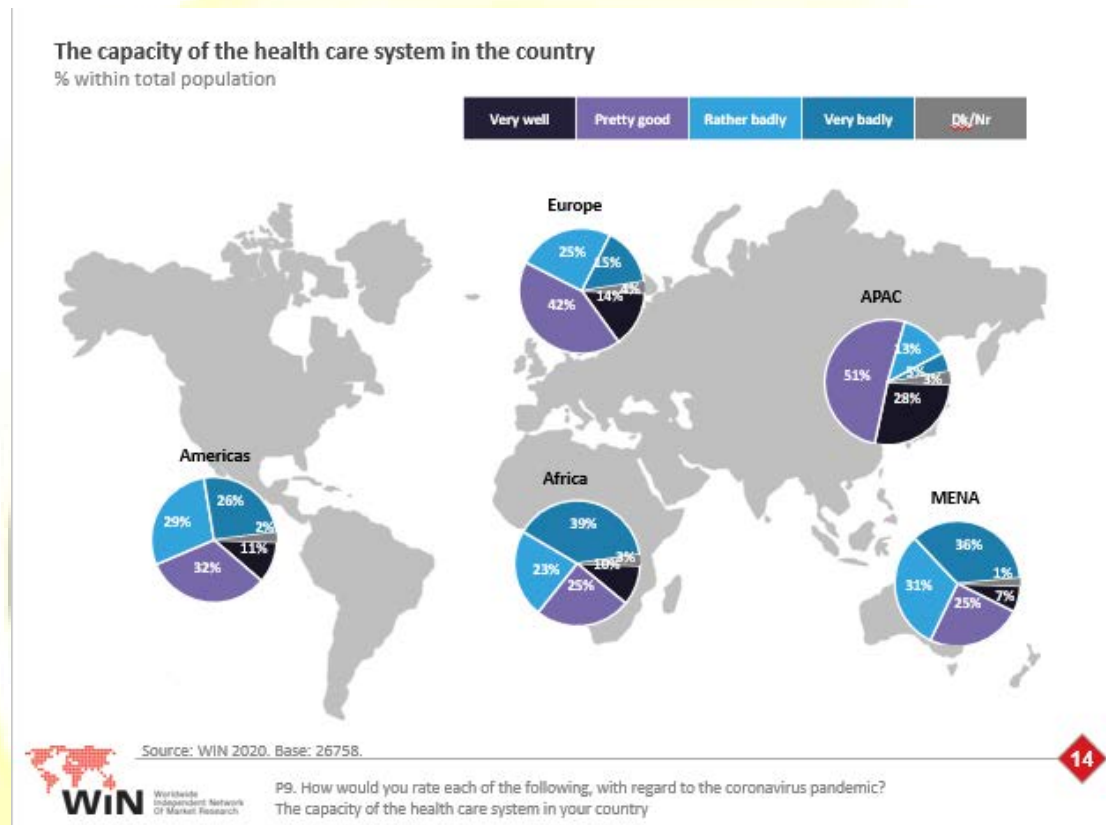

Further Regional Analysis: Healthcare system's capacity with respect to COVID-19 as per public perception was found to be highest in China followed by Vietnam and then Denmark.

The survey work was conducted across 32 other countries that belonged to all regions of the world. It was seen that healthcare system's capacity with respect to COVID-19 was highest in China and Vietnam (98%) and lowest in Poland (11%).

Pakistan lies in APAC region and as compared to APAC region average (79%), our healthcare system's capacity with respect to the coronavirus pandemic (74%) was found to be less than the region average by 5%.



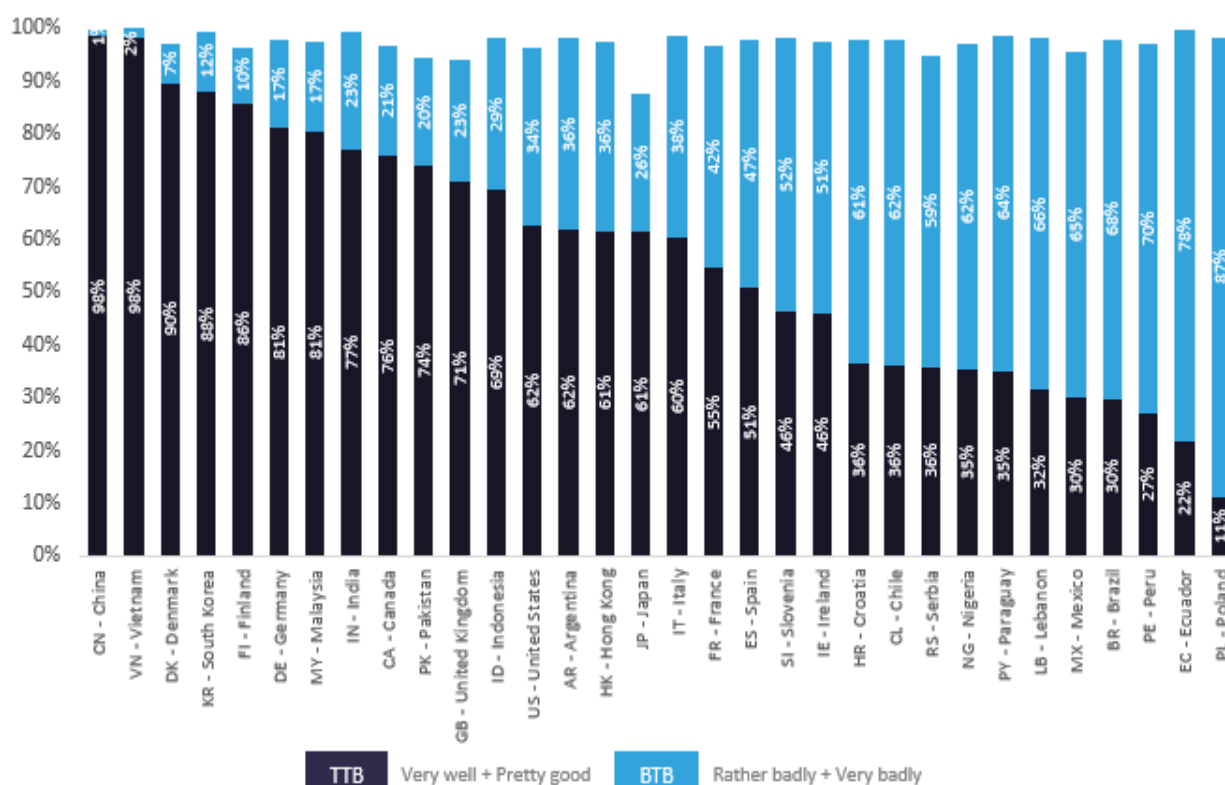
Pakistan ranks 10th among 32 countries surveyed about healthcare system's capacity with regard to COVID-19 pandemic

Among all the 32 countries surveyed in this international study, people in China and Vietnam showed highest satisfaction with their countries' healthcare system's capacity with regards to the COVID-19 pandemic. At the bottom was Poland followed by Ecuador.

Pakistan ranks 10 out of 32 nations in terms of healthcare system's capacity with regards to COVID-19.
