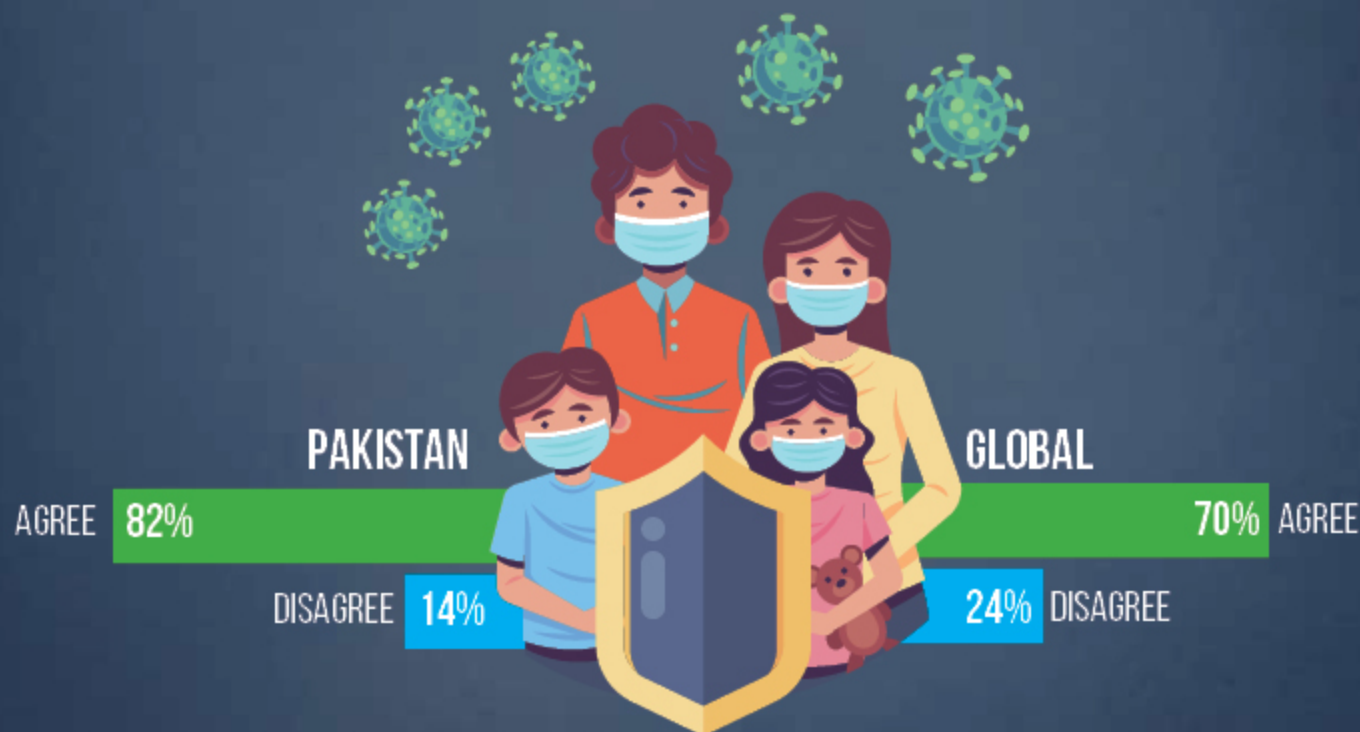

8 IN 10 PAKISTANIS (12% ABOVE THE GLOBAL AVERAGE) AGREED THAT THEY ARE WILLING TO SACRIFICE SOME OF THEIR HUMAN RIGHTS IF IT HELPS PREVENT SPREAD OF THE VIRUS; PAKISTAN RANKS 9TH OUT OF 47 COUNTRIES IN TERMS OF THIS: GALLUP INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION AND GALLUP & GILANI PAKISTAN

8 in 10 Pakistanis (12 % above the global average) agreed that they are willing to sacrifice some of their human rights if it helps prevent spread of the virus; Pakistan ranks 9th out of 47 countries in terms of this: Gallup International Association and Gallup & Gilani Pakistan

(Islamabad), February 10, 2021

According to a Gallup & Gilani Pakistan Survey in Pakistan (and similar surveys done worldwide Gallup International Association (GIA) across the world), 82% Pakistanis said that they were willing to sacrifice some of their human rights if it helps prevent spread of the virus. 14% Pakistanis were not willing.

These findings emerge from an international survey conducted across the globe by Gallup International Association at the end of 2020. The survey covers 47 countries around the world and about 45,000 adult citizens, which represents about 2/3 of the global population. During the whole of 2020 Gallup International Association followed the development of the global attitudes of the population towards the pandemic. The results, presented below, come from the fourth wave of global tracking. The fieldwork for Pakistan was conducted by Gallup Pakistan between **9th October and 2nd November 2020**.



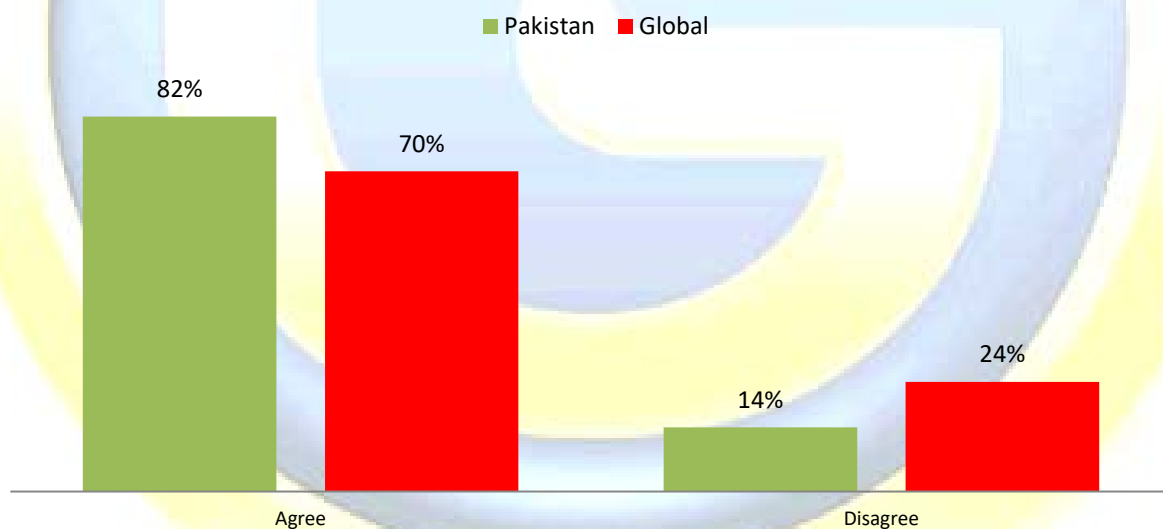
COVID-19: 82 % Pakistanis (12 % above the global average) agreed that they are willing to sacrifice some of their human rights if it helps prevent the spread of the virus.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces was asked the following question, “Thinking specifically about the Coronavirus (COVID-19) how strongly do you agree or disagree with the following statement? - I am willing to sacrifice some of my human rights if it helps prevent the spread of the virus.” In response to this question, 38% Pakistanis strongly agreed, 44% agreed, 12% disagreed, 2% strongly disagreed while 5% did not know/did not respond.

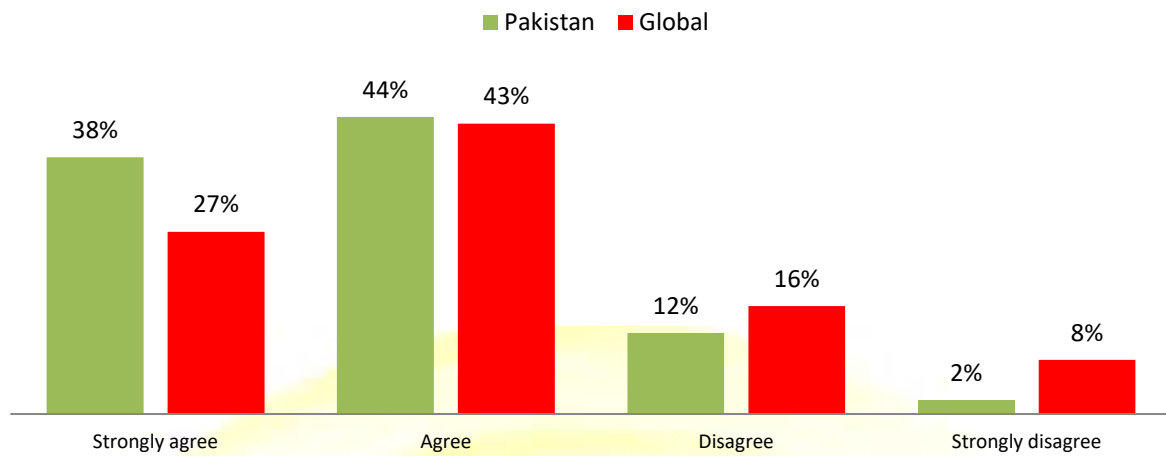
Global result: Globally, 70% people are willing to sacrifice some of their human rights if it helps prevent the spread of the virus.

Globally (when the same question was asked in another 46 countries), 27% strongly agreed, 43% agreed, 16% disagreed, 8% strongly disagreed while 5% did not know/did not respond.

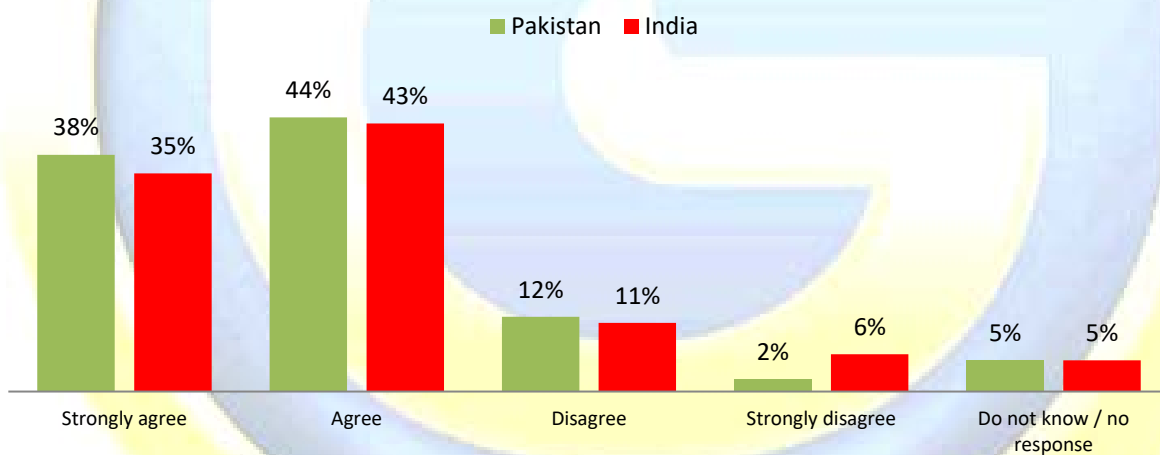

Regional comparative results: 4% less Indians agreed that they would be willing to sacrifice their human rights if it prevents the spread of the virus.

The survey was also conducted in India as part of the international study. Responding to the same question, in India, 78% agreed with the statement saying that they will be willing to sacrifice some of their human rights if it helps prevent the spread of the virus.

Pakistan ranks 9th among 47 countries surveyed with respect to willingness to sacrifice some human rights if it helps prevent spread of the virus

Among all the 47 countries surveyed in this international study, people in Vietnam showed the highest willingness to sacrifice some human rights if it helps prevent spread of the virus. At the bottom were Japan, Mexico and Russia.

Top 10 nations with highest willingness to sacrifice some human rights if it helps prevent spread of the virus: Pakistan ranks 9th out of 47 countries in terms of willingness to sacrifice human rights if it helps prevent spread of the virus.
