

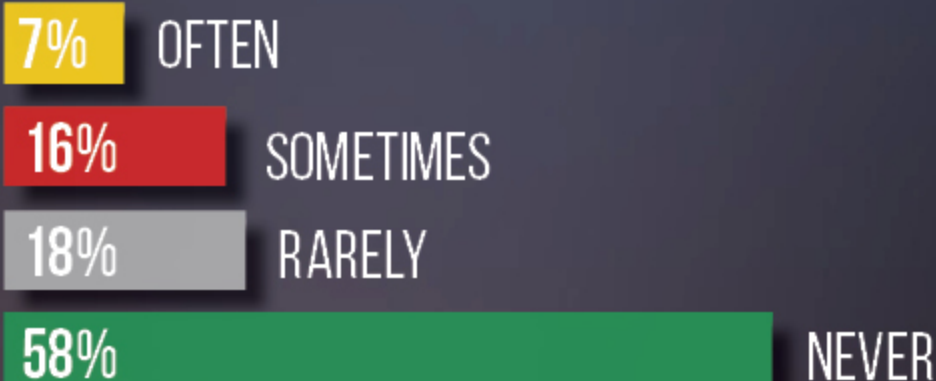
58% Pakistanis never feel unsafe from crime in their own home; this is a 21% rise since 2010 (World Values Survey & Gallup & Gilani Pakistan)

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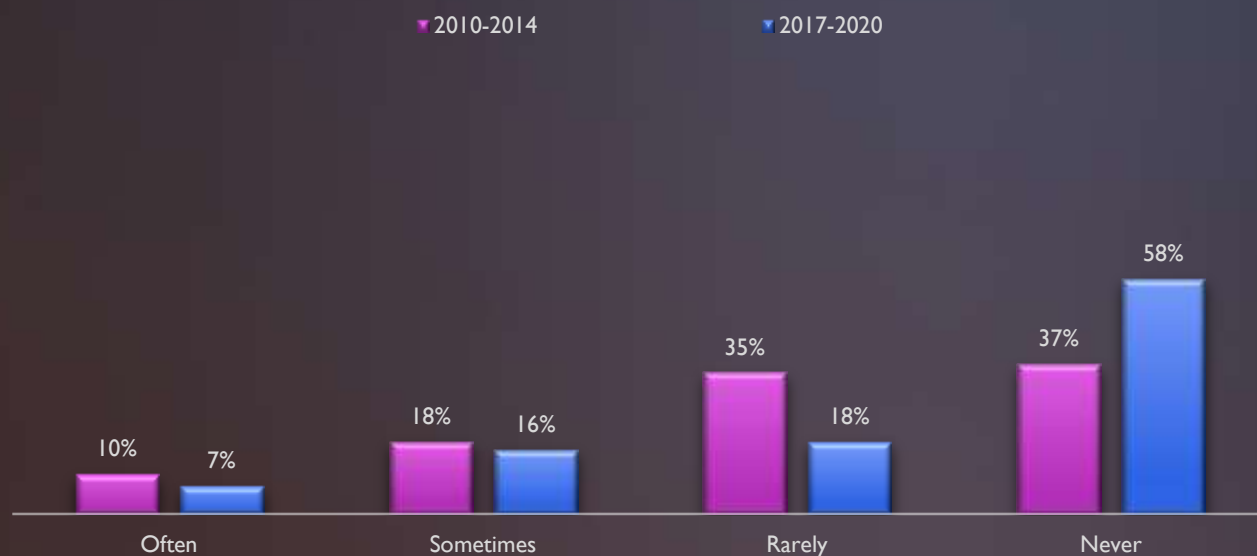

According to the World Values Survey conducted between the year 2010-2014, respondents were asked *"In the last 12 months, how often have you or your family felt unsafe from crime in your own home?"* In response, 10% said often, 18% said sometimes, 35% said rarely while 37% said never.

Comparative Picture: The question was asked again between 2017-2020 during Wave 7 of the World Values Survey to enable a comparison across the years. According to the 2020 results, 7% said often, 16% said sometimes, 18% said rarely while 58% said never.

This press release has been made as part of the Gallup Pakistan History Project which aims to release historical empirical polling data to wider audiences. The objective is to sustain and encourage empirical decision making in Pakistan.
