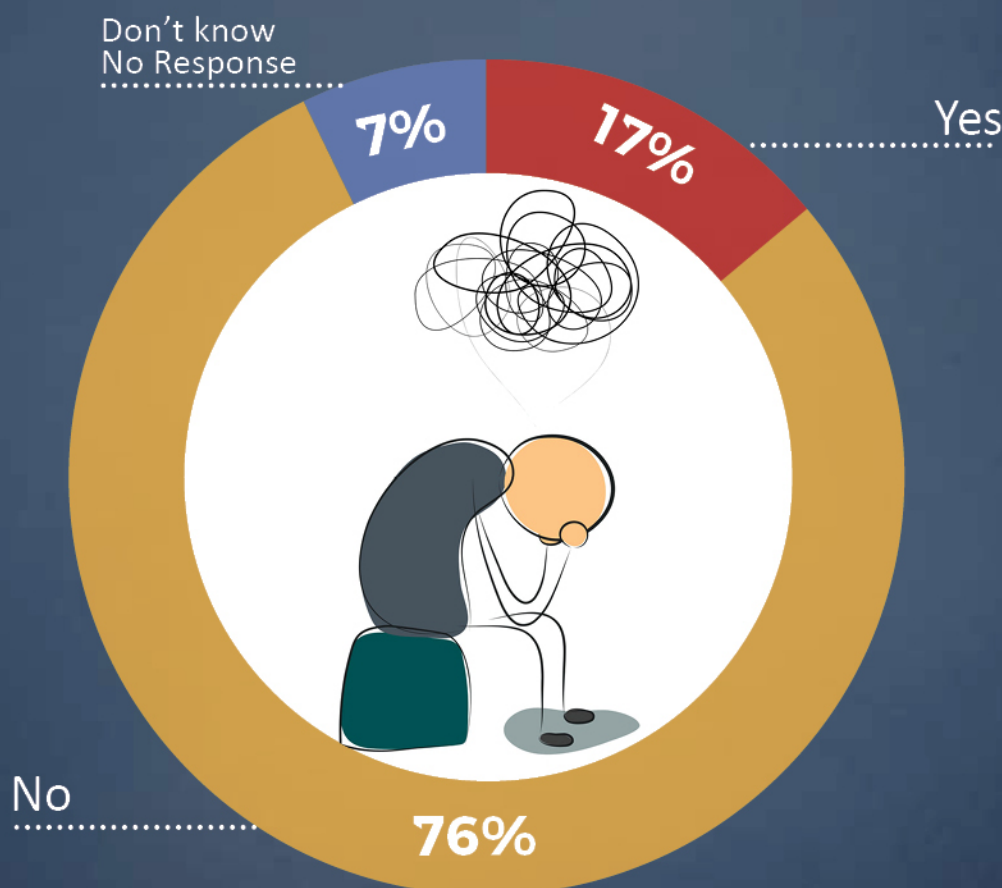

17% PAKISTANIS SAID THAT EITHER THEY OR THEIR FAMILY MEMBER(S) HAVE EXPERIENCED HOPELESSNESS IN THE LAST 7 DAYS: GALLUP & GILANI PAKISTAN

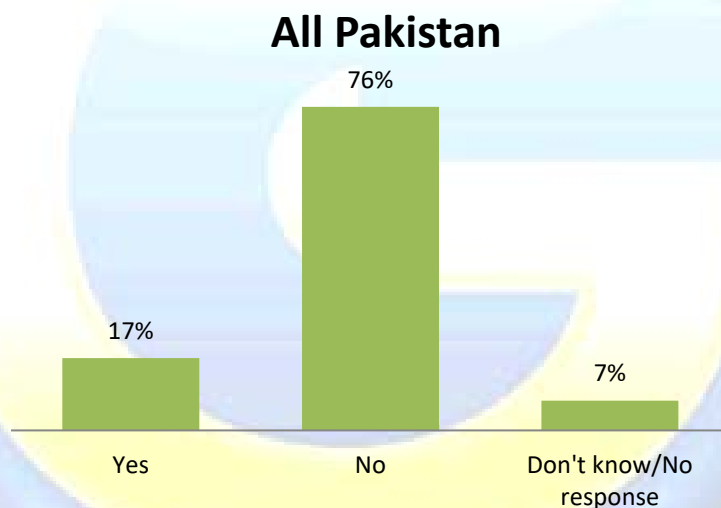
17% Pakistanis said that either they or their family member(s) have experienced hopelessness in the last 7 days: Gallup & Gilani Pakistan

(Islamabad), April 29, 2021

According to a survey conducted by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 17% of the respondents said that they or their family member(s) have experienced hopelessness in the last 7 days.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces was asked the following question, “*Have you or your family member(s) experienced hopelessness in the last 7 days?*” In response to this question, 17% said yes, 76% said no and 7% did not know/did not respond.

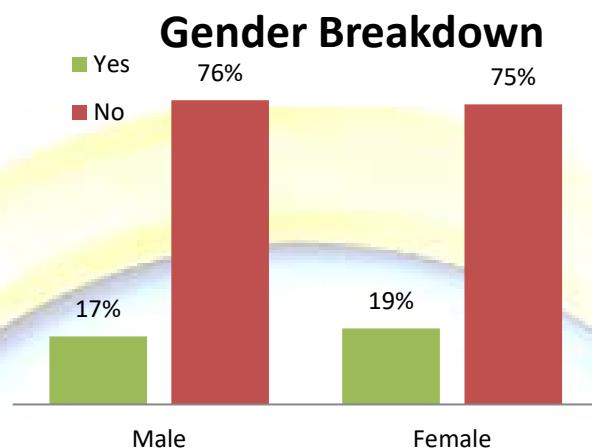
Question: “Have you or your family member(s) experienced hopelessness in the last 7 days?”

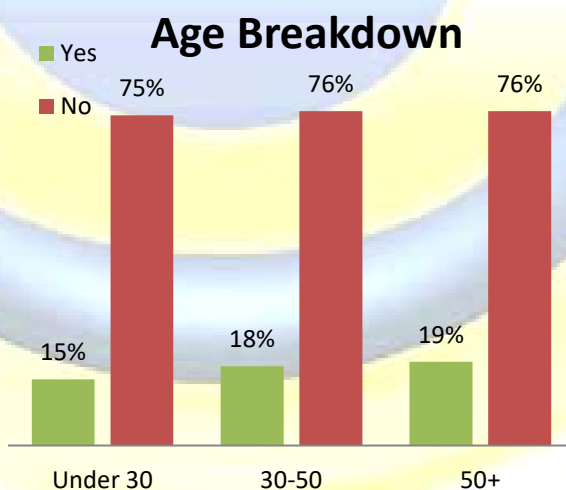
Gender Breakdown: Compared to males, 2% more females reported that they or their family members felt hopeless in the past 7 days

Data reveals that females are relatively more likely to report that they or their family members experienced hopelessness in the last 7 days.



Age Breakdown: 50+ more likely to say that they or their family members experienced hopelessness in the past 7 days

Disaggregating the data shows that 19% people who are 50+ report that they or their family members felt hopeless in the past week. This is higher compared to 18% of Pakistanis in the 30-50 age bracket and 15% who are under 30.



The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1,590 men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, during December 24, 2020 – January 15, 2021. The error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at the 95% confidence level. The methodology used for data collection was phone interviews. Respondents hailed from over 100 districts of Pakistan.
