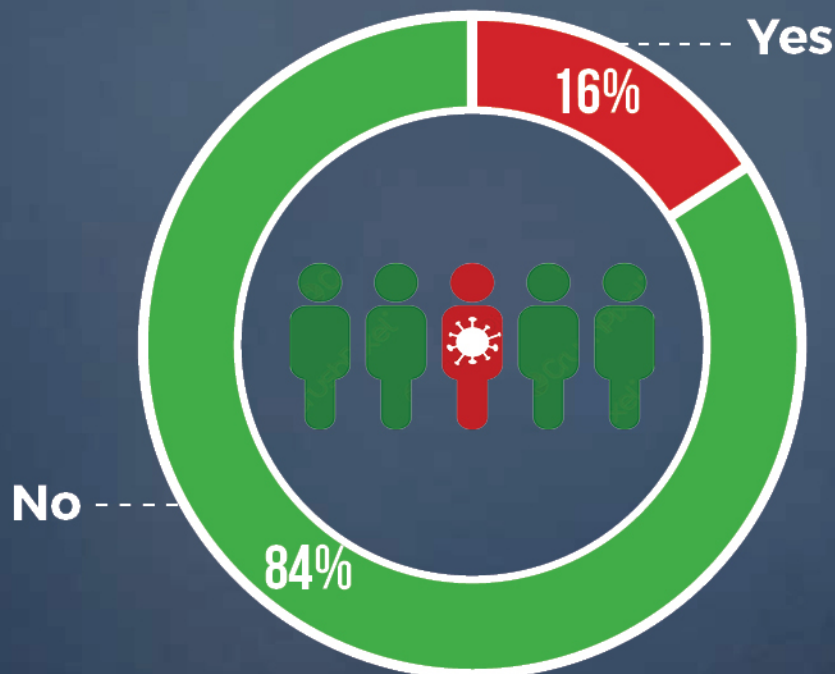

16% of Pakistanis know someone from their social circle who died of coronavirus; people from urban areas are more likely to know someone who died from the coronavirus as compared to rural areas: Gallup & Gilani Pakistan

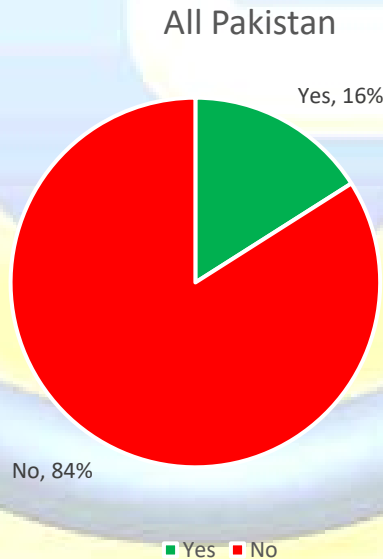

According to a survey conducted by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 16% of Pakistanis know someone from their social circle who died of coronavirus.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces was asked the following question, “Do you know someone in your social circle who died of corona virus?” In response to this question, 16% responded in the affirmative while 84% stated that they did not know anyone from their social circle who died of coronavirus.

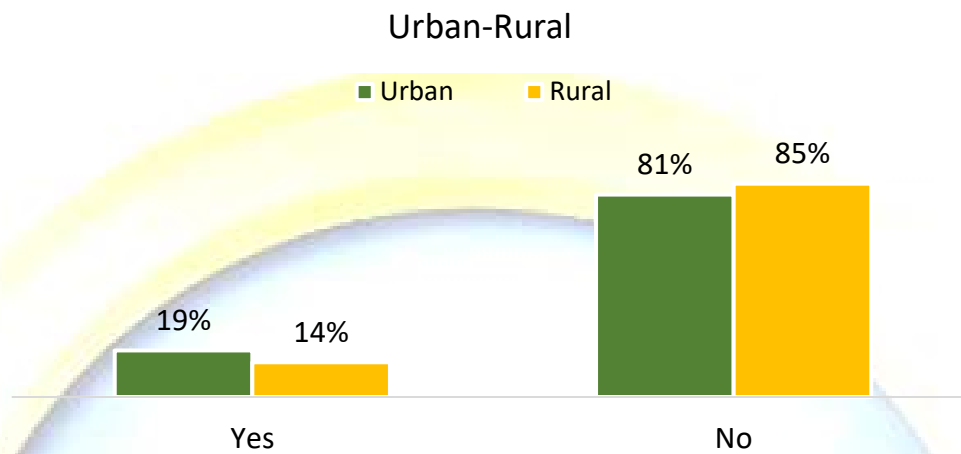
Question: “Do you know someone in your social circle who died of coronavirus?”

Urban-Rural Breakdown

Respondents from urban areas (19%) are more likely than rural areas (14%) to know someone in their social circle who has died of the coronavirus.



The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1066 men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, during July 01, 2021 – July 13, 2021. The error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at the 95% confidence level. The methodology used for data collection was CATI.
