

ANALYSIS OF PAKISTAN'S POSTAL BALLOTS



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Introduction to the series on Gallup Electoral Vault

This report is part of a special series that aims to provide the readers interesting findings from Gallup Pakistan's electoral database. The data has been consolidated from the Elections Commission of Pakistan (ECP) data on general elections since the 1970 till the latest general elections held in 2018.

This particular report provides noteworthy information regarding Pakistan's postal voting system, highlighting the significance of the use of postal ballots within the elections and providing an in-depth analysis of the difference between the non-postal and postal votes cast in the 2018 elections with respect to the different parties.

Key Findings

1. In the Pakistan General Elections for 2018, the total number of votes cast from postal ballots amounts to around 107,995 from the four provinces and FATA.
2. In terms of the postal ballot votes for the 2018 general elections, the most votes were cast from Punjab (56%), followed by Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (28%), Sindh (8%), Balochistan (5%) and then FATA (2%).
3. For only 3% of the National Assembly seats (6 seats) was the number of postal ballot paper votes were greater than the winning margin (i.e. the difference in votes between the winning party and the runner-up party for a particular constituency).
4. PTI received the highest number of votes from the postal ballots at 40%, while PML-N received only 16% and Pakistan People's Party got 8%. Independent representatives ranked third highest in terms of postal ballot votes at 12%.
5. Comparison of the 2018 general election results and those from the postal ballot votes from that year shows that in certain cases the postal votes were higher for certain parties while for others it was near the results of the actual general election. For instance, PTI received 32% of the votes in the actual general elections as compared to 40% from the postal votes. However, it can be seen that in the case of PML-N, they received 24% of the votes in the actual elections but received only 16% from the postal ballot votes.

Introduction to Pakistan's Postal Voting System

In Pakistan, for any typical general elections, there are typically two ways of voting: by physically going to the polling station and casting one's vote and through the mail. Postal voting in elections involves the distribution of ballot papers by post and their subsequent return through the post as well.

Major Beneficiaries of Postal Voting

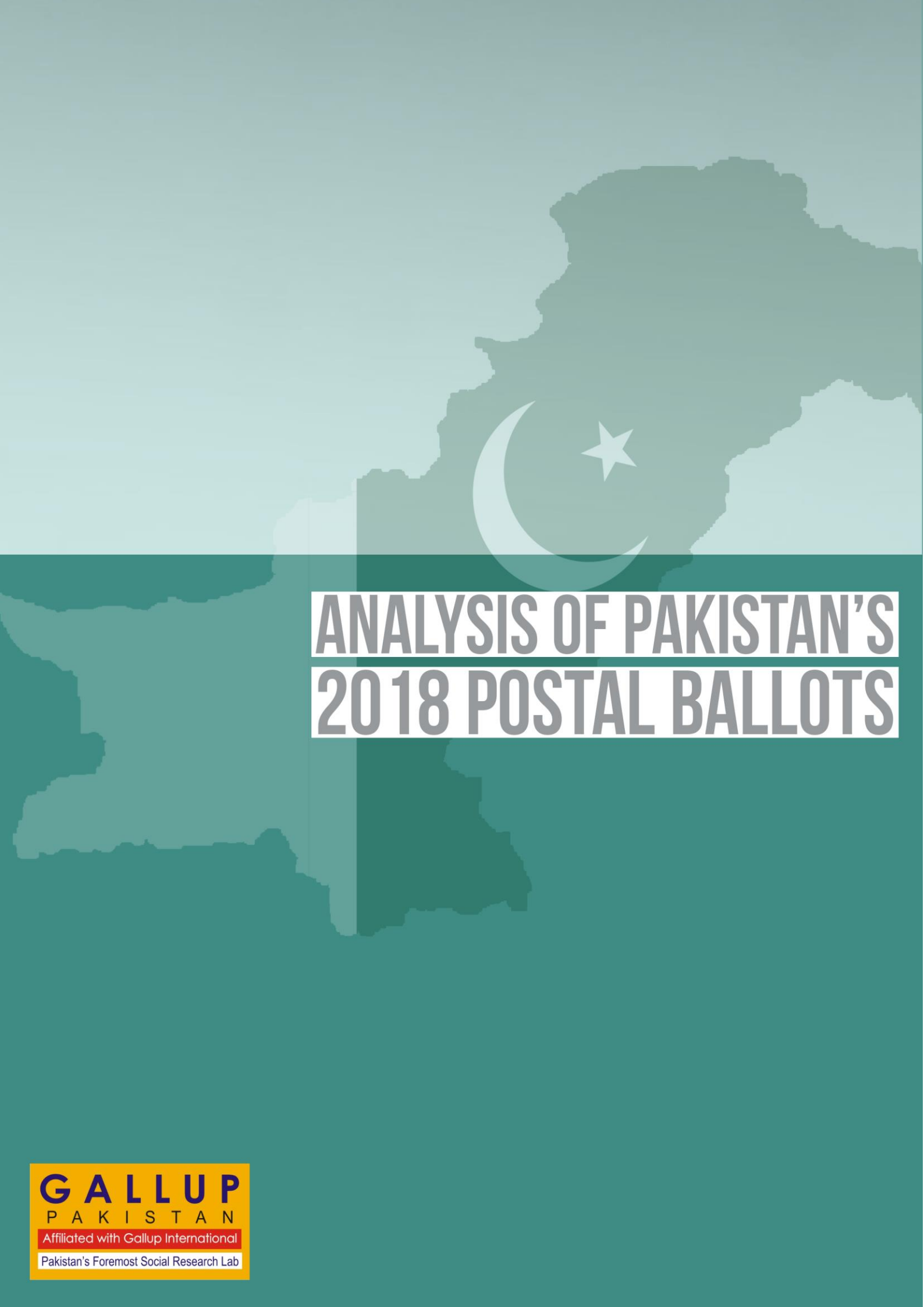
Unlike some other countries, the access to postal voting in Pakistan is limited to certain individuals and this facility is not open to the general public as of yet. According to the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP), under the law, this facility has only been extended to a certain status of individuals.

Firstly, any person who works in government service or any individual who holds a public office and is stationed away at a place other than where their constituency is located, is eligible to use the facility of postal voting. Similarly, the wife or a person who works in government service or holds any public office or the child/children of such persons who are registered voters and are residing with the person in question (i.e. away from their constituency) are also eligible to use the facility of postal voting. As such, this also applies to members of the Armed Forces. Furthermore, any person who is detained in prison or held in custody at any place within Pakistan is also eligible to vote through post since they would be still considered to be a resident in the electoral area in which they would have been resident if they had not been detained. Additionally, those polling personnel or those people, including Police personnel, appointed by the Returning Officer to perform any duty regarding the election at any polling station that is different from the one where they are required to cast their vote are also allowed to vote through postal voting. Since 2018, the Election Commission of Pakistan has also allowed people who are physically disabled who are unable to travel and those who hold a National Identity Card with a logo for physical disability issued by NADRA (National Database and Registration Authority) to be entitled to vote through postal ballots as well.

Electoral Process for Postal Ballots

Typically for postal voting, first those eligible apply for a ballot paper for voting through postal ballots. Applications for postal ballots in Pakistan are available on a prescribed form available on the ECP's website or may be collected from the Returning Officer of the constituency in question. Every application specifies the name of the elector, their address and their serial number within the electoral roll. Upon receipt of the application by an elector, the Returning Officer is required to immediately send a ballot paper to that elector through post along with an envelope bearing a certification of posting, showing the date as well. This is to be filled in by the proper official from the Post Office at the time of posting. Consequently, the elector, upon receiving their ballot paper for voting by postal ballots, is to record their vote in the prescribed manner. After doing so, the elector is required to post the ballot paper to the Returning Officer in the envelope sent to them so that it can reach before the consolidation of the election results. It is to be noted that voting through postal ballots can only take place within dates specified by the ECP. Additionally, voters who are eligible and to whom postal ballots are issued are not allowed to vote in person at the polling station¹.

ANALYSIS OF PAKISTAN'S 2018 POSTAL BALLOTS

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Analysis of Pakistan's 2018 Postal Ballots

Not many people within Pakistan are too aware about the facility of postal ballots nor has there been a lot of extensive analysis done regarding the significance of postal ballots on the election results. As such, this report aims to undertake the activity of analysing data regarding postal ballots for the 2018 General Elections in Pakistan.

(i) Province-wise analysis

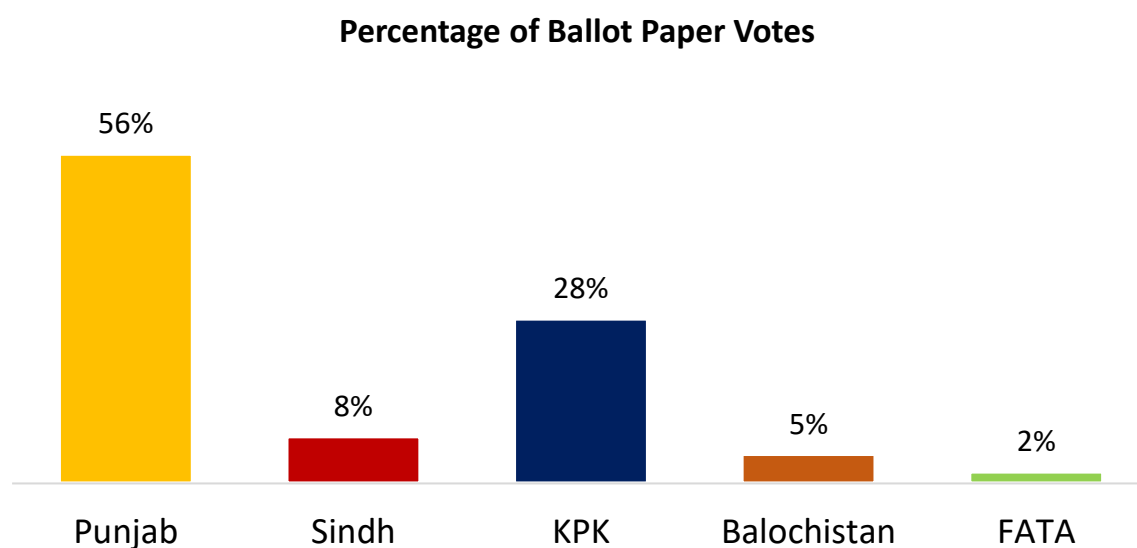
In the Pakistan General Elections for 2018, around 47-48 million votes were cast. Looking at the aggregate data, it can be seen that the most votes were cast in the province of Punjab followed by Sindh, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KPK), Balochistan and then the Federally Administered Tribal Areas (FATA). In terms of the postal ballot votes, the most votes were cast from Punjab, followed by Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, Sindh, Balochistan and then FATA. Hence, it can be deduced that postal votes may follow the same direction as normal election votes i.e. votes are distributed according to the population – the higher the population, the higher the proportion of postal votes from that area.

The total number of postal ballots amounts to 107,995 votes from the four provinces and FATA. As can be seen in Table 1, out of the postal ballot votes, 56% are from Punjab, 8% are from Sindh, 28% are from KPK, 5% are from Balochistan and 2% are from FATA. These numbers show that people from Punjab employ the use of postal ballots the most while people from Balochistan employ the use of postal ballots the least from amongst the provinces listed. Furthermore, it can be observed that postal ballot votes in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa were significantly more as compared to the share of non-postal ballot votes from KPK and the national population share. On the other hand, the share of postal ballots from Sindh are significantly lower than the share in the non-postal ballot votes from Sindh.

(ii) **Who would win if purely postal ballots were considered?**

In some cases, votes through postal ballots can hold a lot of weight and have the potential to overturn the election result for that particular constituency. This can be seen in Table 2.

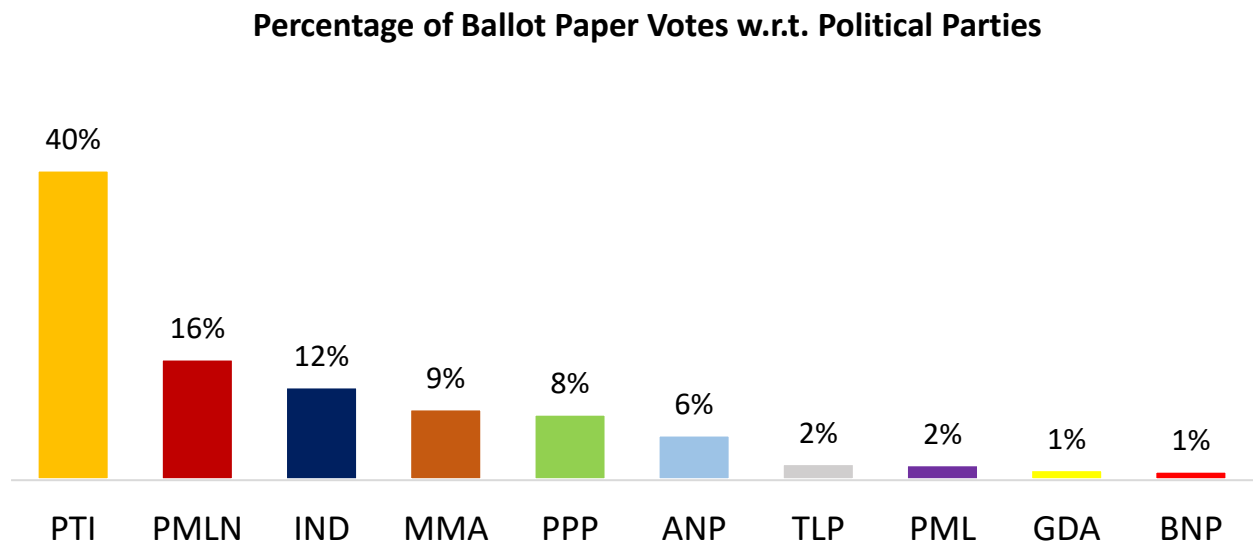
The winning margin is described as the difference in votes between the winning party and the runner-up party for a particular constituency. The above table shows that for 3% of the National Assembly seats (6 seats), the number of postal ballot paper votes were greater than the winning margin and the implications of this may be quite significant. For 13% of the National Assembly seats (29 seats), the difference between the number of votes through postal ballots and the winning margin was near, ranging from a different of 0 to 5,000 votes. Nevertheless, for 85% of the seats (191 seats), the difference between the number of postal votes and the winning margin was greater than 5,000 votes.

Considering the results of the postal voting for the 2018 general elections alone, it was observed that Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaaf (PTI) got the highest percentage of postal ballot votes, followed by Pakistan Muslim League (N), and then the independents. The results for the top 10 political parties who got the highest amount of votes through the postal ballots is given as follows:

The Table 3 and Figure 2 show that PTI received nearly 40% of the postal ballot votes while PML-N received only 16% and independent representatives received 12% of the postal votes. Muttahida Majlis-e-Amal (MMA) received 9% of the postal ballot votes, followed by Pakistan People’s Party at 8%, Awami National Party at 6%, Tehreek-e-Labbaik Pakistan at 2% and so on.

(iii) Comparison of the actual General Elections 2018 results vs. postal ballot results

If we compare the results from the actual Pakistan general elections in 2018 to the results of just the postal ballots for 2018, some differences can be discerned between the two. These differences can be seen in the two tables below where Table 4 shows the top 10 results from the postal ballots while Table 5 shows the top 10 results from the actual general elections in 2018.

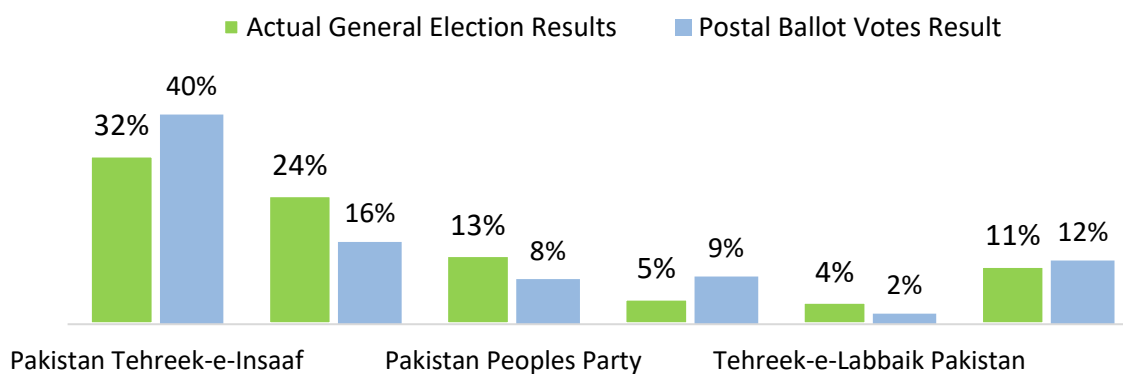

Comparing the results of the actual general elections to those from the postal ballots it can be seen that PTI got 32% of the votes in the actual general elections while 40% of the postal ballot votes were for the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaaf party. Similarly, PML-N received 24% of the votes in the actual elections while only 16% of the postal ballot votes were for PML-N. Pakistan People's Party received 13% of the votes in the actual elections versus receiving 8% of the postal ballot votes. However, for the Muttahida Majlis-e-Amal (MMA) party, they received more votes from the postal ballots (9%) than in the actual general elections (5%). Independents also received a slightly higher percentage of postal ballot votes (12%) than in the elections (11%).

Conclusion

Conclusively, it can be seen that postal ballots do hold some level of significance and their inclusion may overturn the results for certain constituencies. Therefore, more focus needs to be directed towards postal ballots and their significance.
