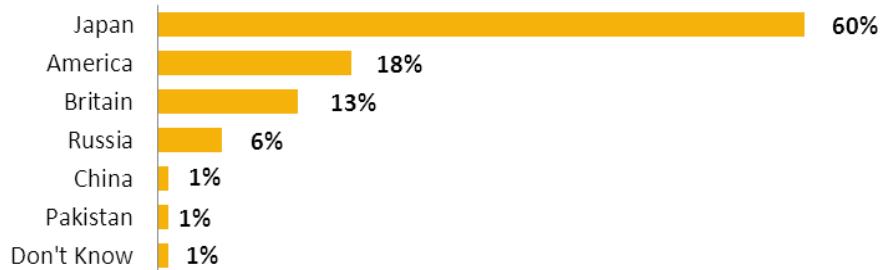

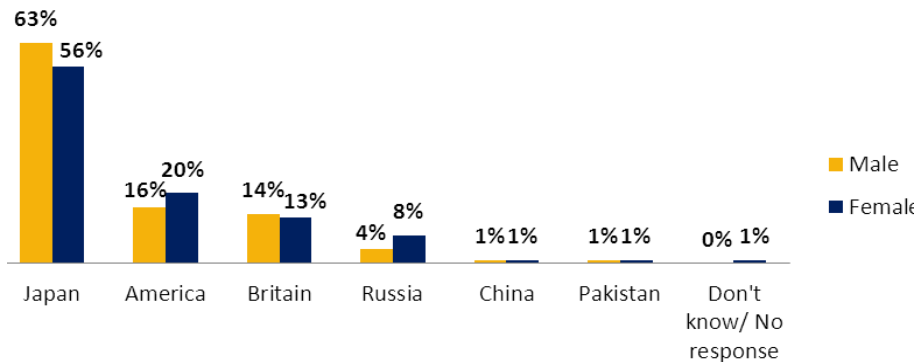

Gender Breakdown

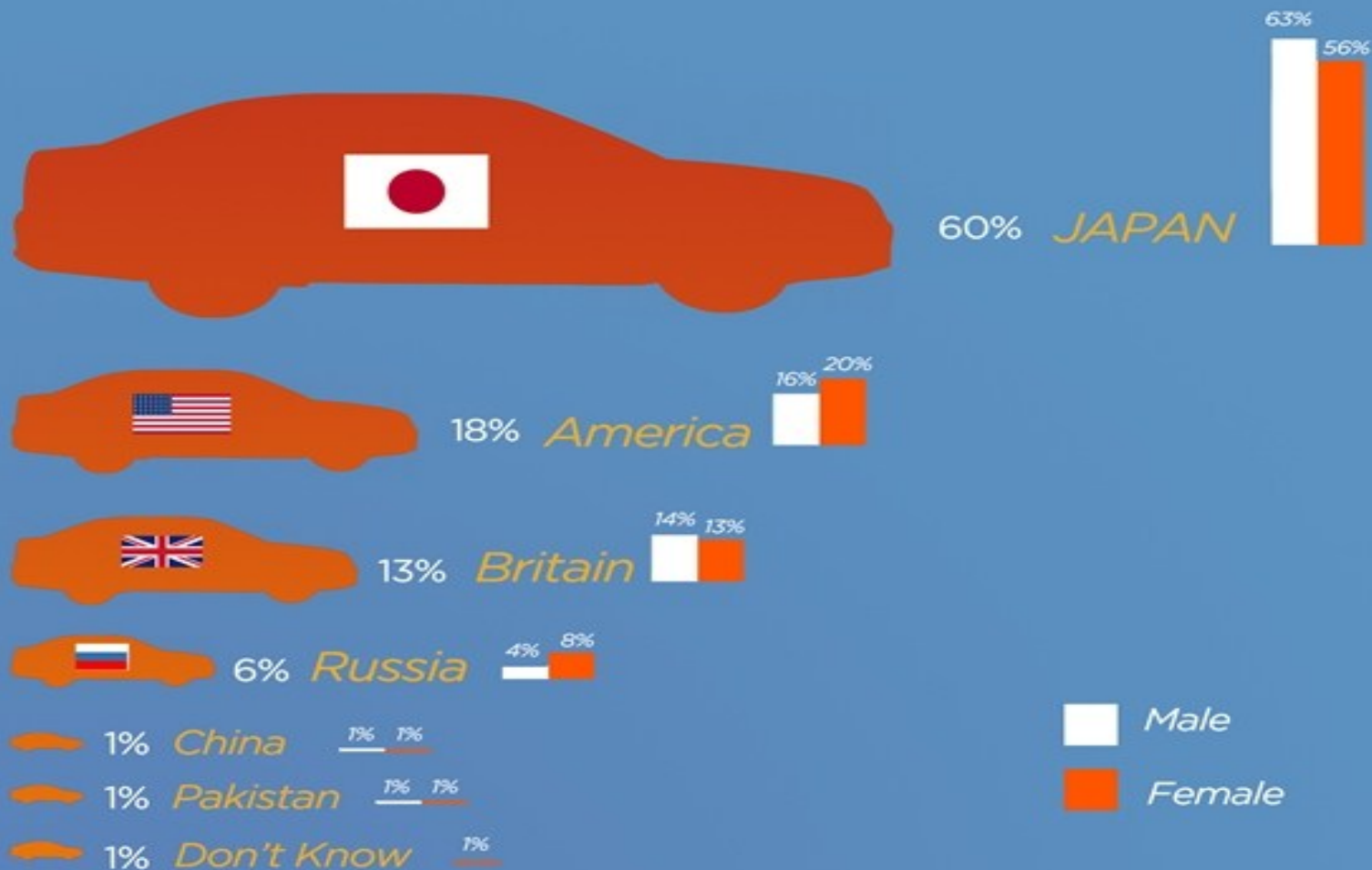
A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Suppose you get a car as a reward, and four cars of the same size are placed in front of you. One is made in Japan, the second in America, the third is made in Britain, and the fourth one is Russia. Which country’s car would you like to have?” In response to this question, 60% of the respondents said they preferred Japanese cars, 18% of the respondents said they preferred American cars; 13% preferred British cars; 6% preferred Russian cars; while 1% preferred cars made in China or Pakistan, 1% respondent didn’t respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1892 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during May 18- May 25, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

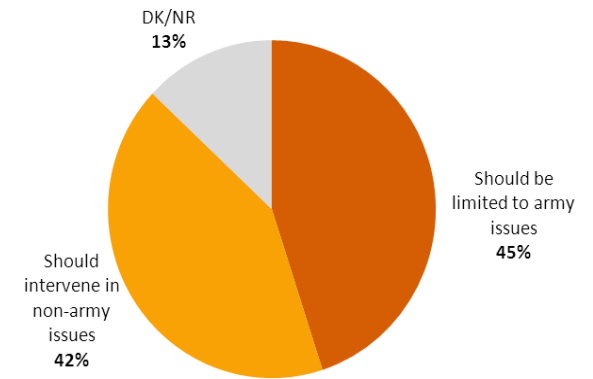

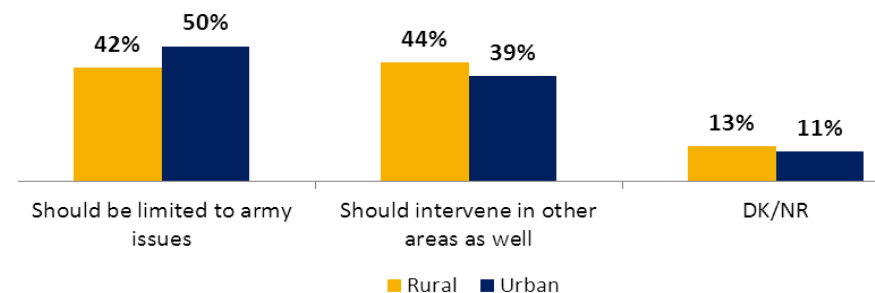
According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 45% Pakistanis believe that the army should only intervene in issues that concern it; 42% believe that it should also intervene in non-army issues.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Some people think that the army should only intervene in those issues that concern the army, while others believe that they should help in other areas as well. What is your opinion about this?” In response to this question, 45% respondents said that it should be limited to army issues only, while 42% said that it should intervene in non-army issues as well and 13% respondent didn’t respond.

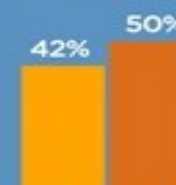
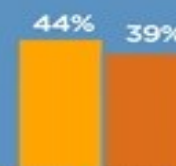

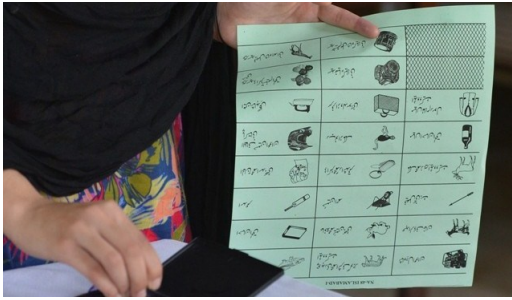

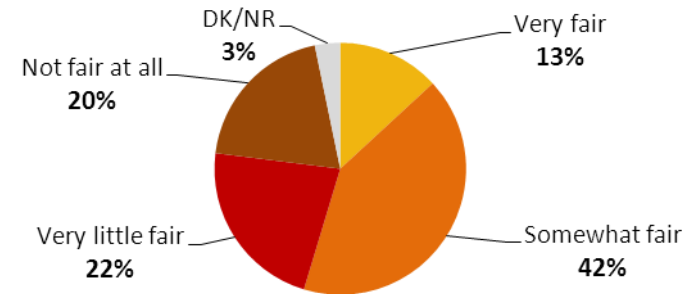

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 13% Pakistanis believe that the elections held in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa were very fair and transparent; 42% believe that these were somewhat fair.

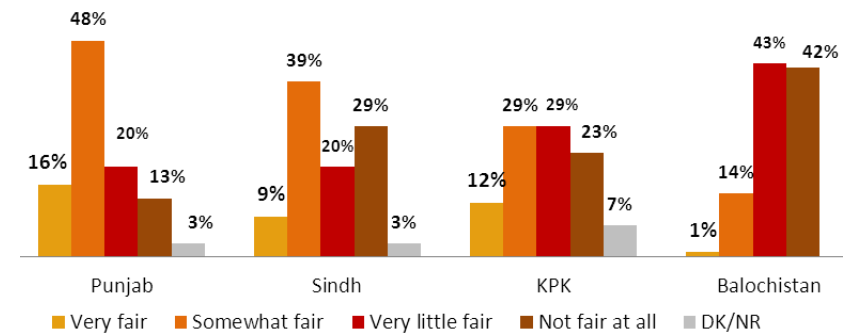
A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Some people think that the elections held in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa were fair and transparent, while others believe the opposite. To what extent, do you think, were the elections held in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa fair and transparent?” In response to this question, 13% of the respondents claimed that the elections were very fair, 42% claimed the elections were somewhat fair, 22% claimed that they were very little fair and 20% claimed that the elections were not fair at all. 3% respondents did not respond.

According to the provincial breakdown, the perceived fairness of the elections was 41% in KPK. In comparison, the perceived fairness of the elections was 64% in Punjab, 48% in Sindh and 15% in Balochistan.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1870 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during June 08 - June 15, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

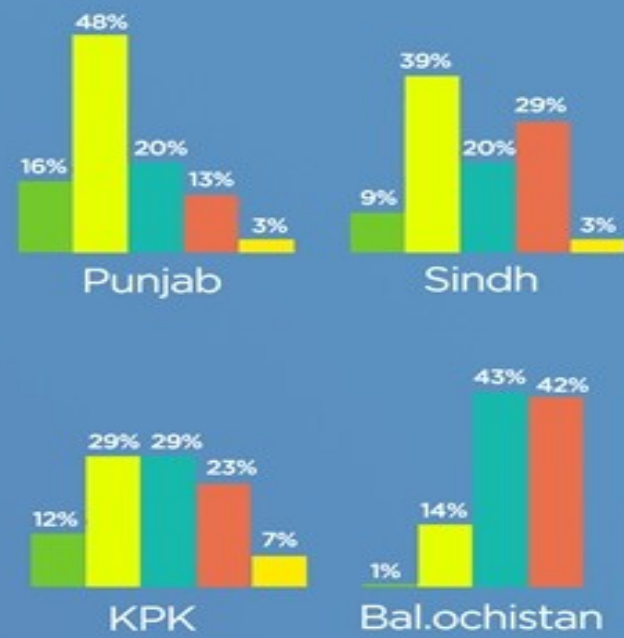


Provincial Breakdown

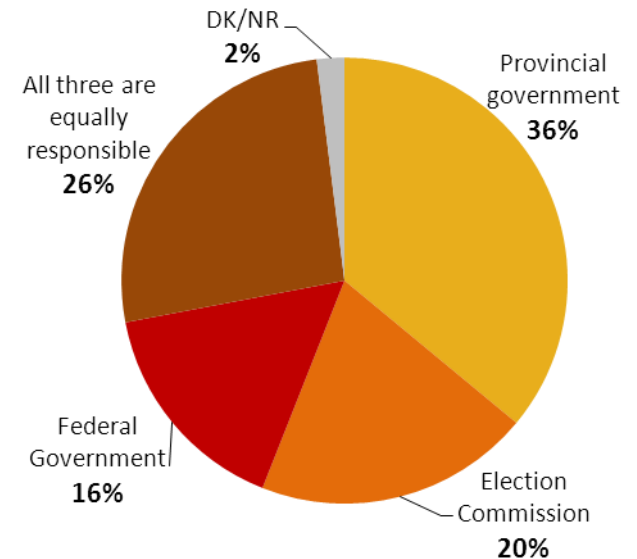

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “In the recently held local bodies’ elections in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, there were instances of violence, mismanagement, and firing. Some people say that the provincial government is responsible for all these incidents, while the provincial government holds the Election Commission responsible for mismanagement. Who do you think is responsible?” In response to this question, 36% respondents said that the provincial government was responsible for the instances of mismanagement and violence during the local elections, 20% respondents said that the Election Commission was responsible, 16% respondents said that the federal government was responsible, while 26% respondents held all three as equally responsible for the mismanagement during the local elections, and 2% did not respond.

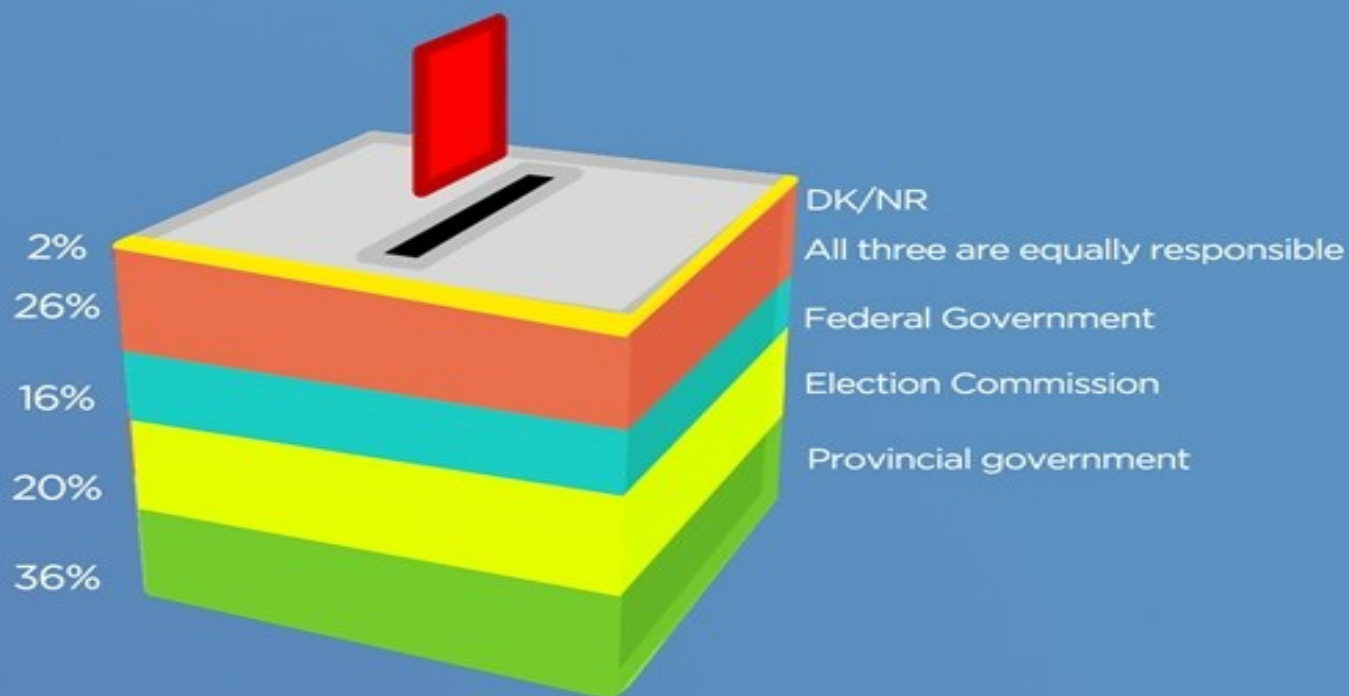

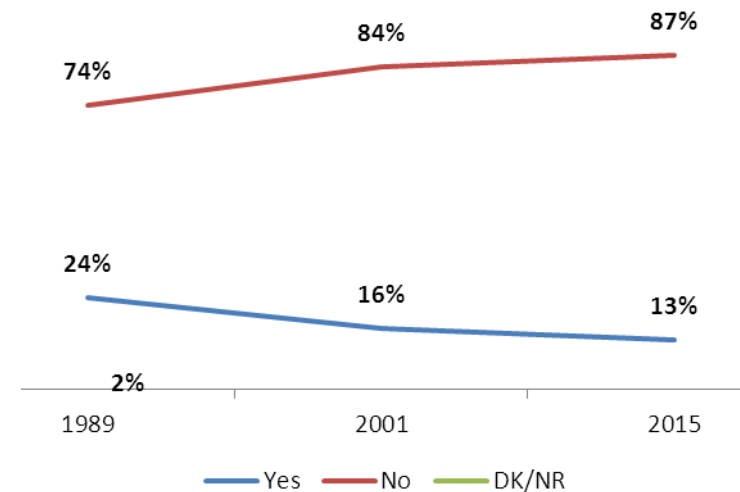

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 87% of the Pakistanis claim that no one from their household has needed to be hospitalized in the past one year.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “During the past year, has anybody from your household needed to be admitted to the hospital?” In response to this question, 13% Pakistanis said that during the past year, somebody from their household has needed to be admitted to the hospital. The rest (87%) said that no body from their family has needed to be hospitalized during the past year.

This question has also been asked during previous years over the past decade. Between 1989 and 2001, there was a steep increase in the percentage of respondents who claimed that nobody from their family has needed to be admitted to the hospital during the past year. Their percentage rose from 74% to 84%. The percentage of those respondents who said otherwise fell from 24% to 16% during this time. From 2001 to 2015, the increase in the percentage of those who said no steadied and rose to only 87%. Similarly, the percentage of those who said yes decreased by only 3% from 16% to 13%.

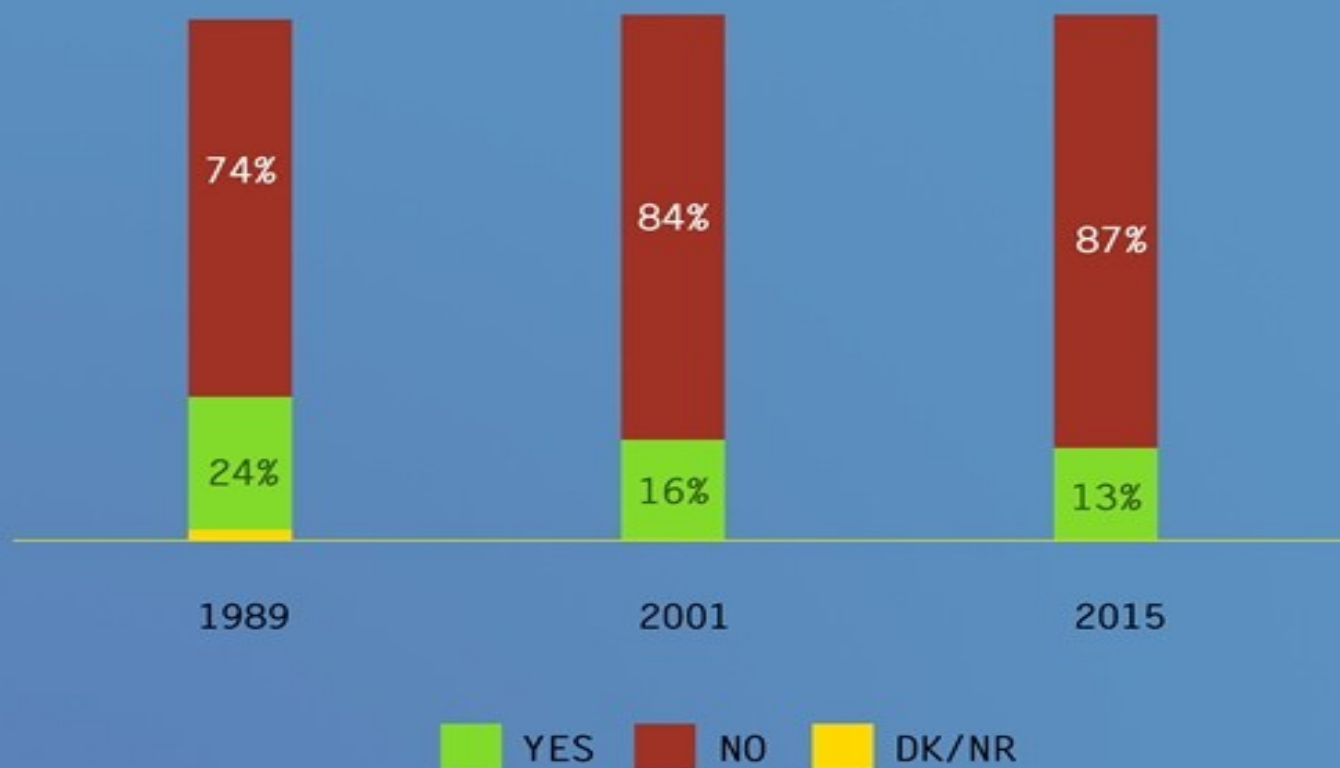
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13% PAKISTANIS CLAIM THAT SOMEBODY FROM THEIR HOUSEHOLD
