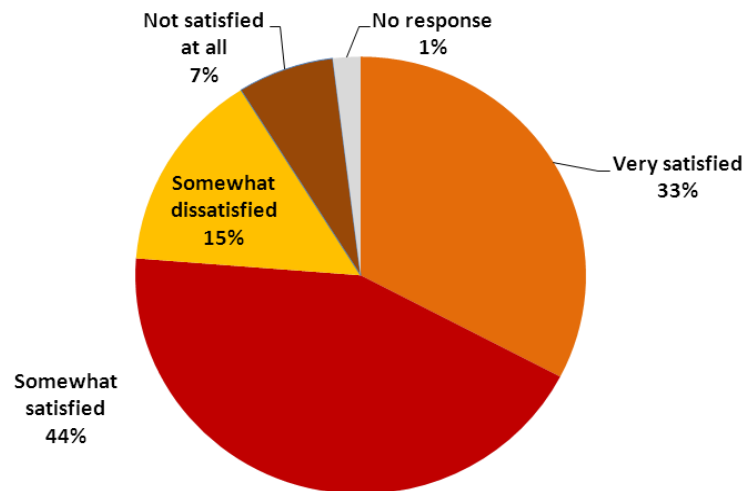

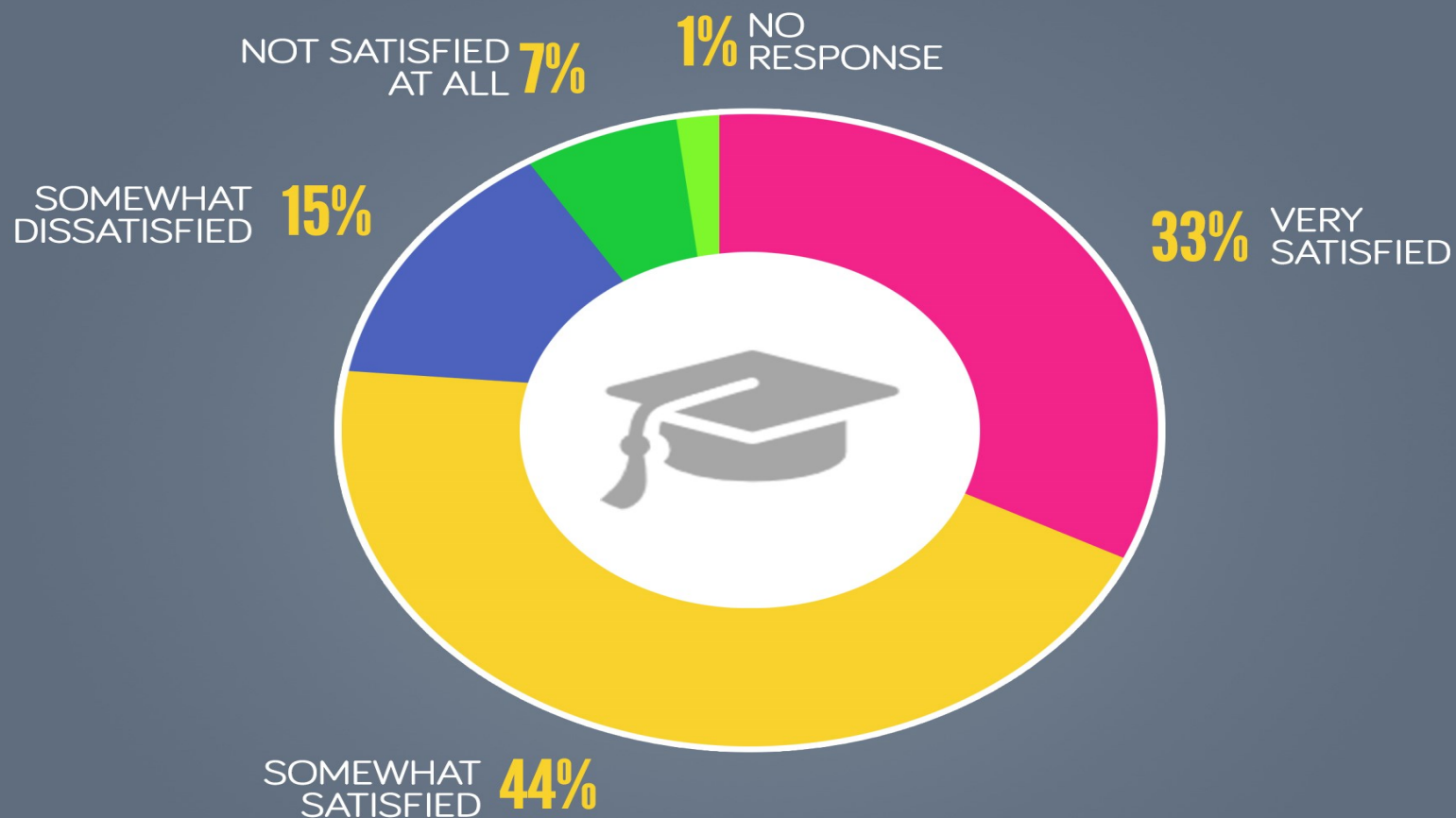

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 33% of the respondents whose children attend government schools said that they were very satisfied by their standard of education and 44% said that they were somewhat satisfied.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the four provinces who send their children to public schools was asked, “With regards to the government school(s) that your children attend, please tell the extent to which you are satisfied by their standard of education.” In response to this question, 33% of the respondents said that they were very satisfied by their standard of education, 44% said that they were somewhat satisfied while 15% said that they were somewhat dissatisfied and 7% were not satisfied at all, however 1% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 751 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during June 15 – June 22, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

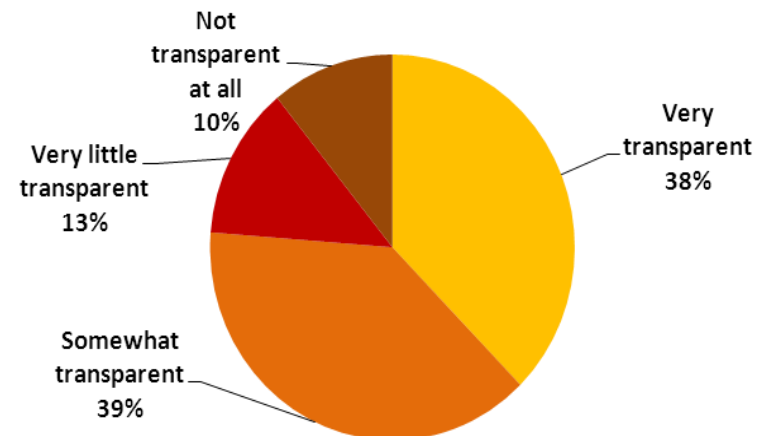
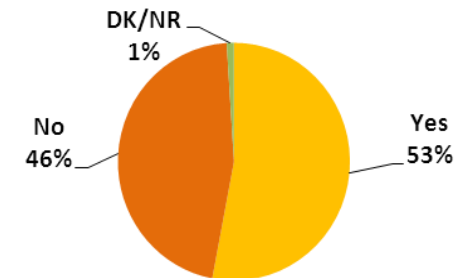

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Recently there were regional elections in Gilgit Baltistan where Pakistan Muslim League (N) gained victory. Have you heard/read anything about this?” In response to this question, 53% said yes, 46% said no and 1% did not respond.

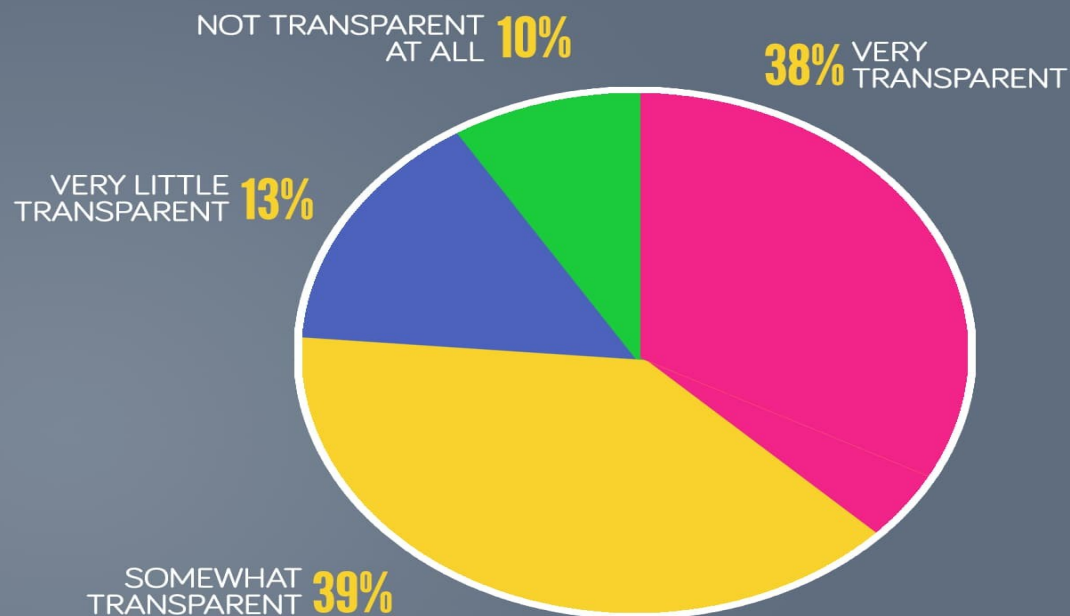
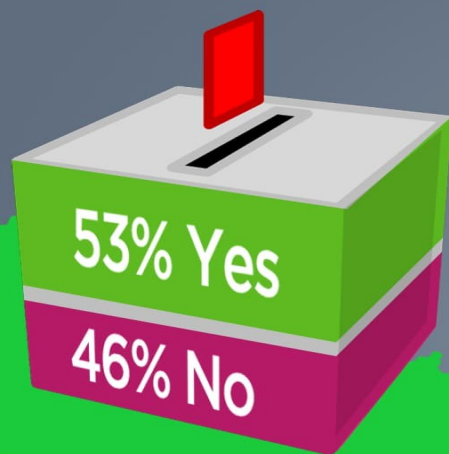
Respondents who had said yes were further asked, “In your opinion, to what extent were the recent elections in Gilgit Baltistan transparent and fair?” 38% of the respondents said that they were very transparent, 39% said that they were somewhat transparent, 13% said that they were very little transparent and 10% said that they were not transparent at all.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1854 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during June 15 – June 22, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ per cent at 95% confidence level.

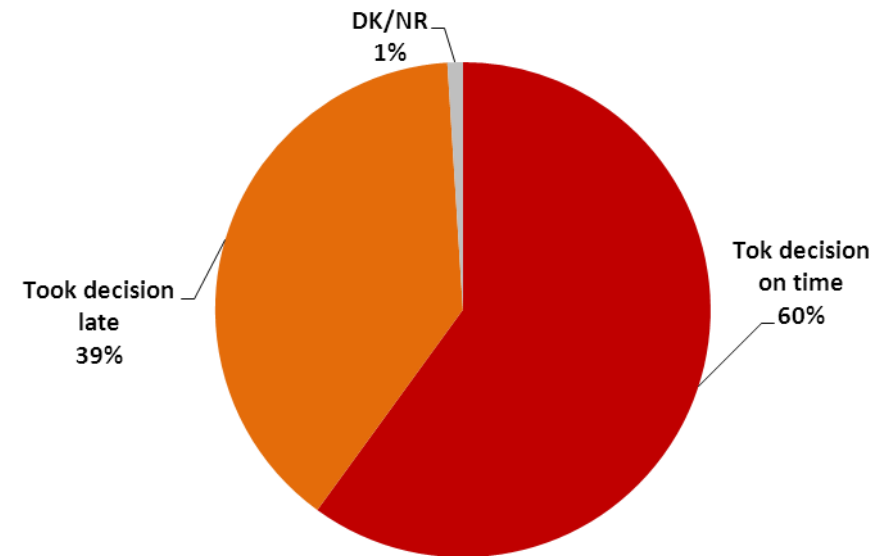

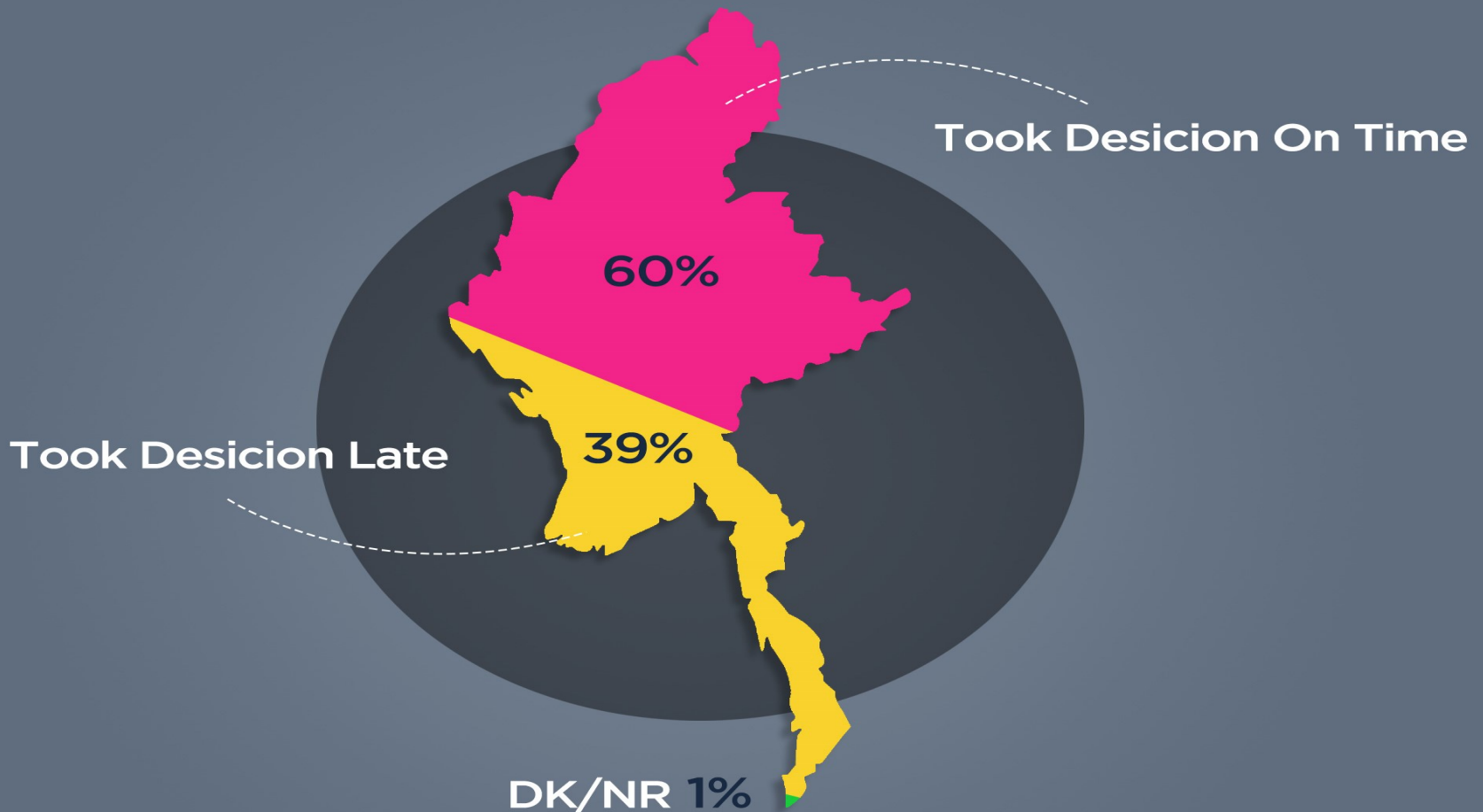
A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Recently, the Pakistani government has announced 5 million dollars in aid for Rohingya Muslims to provide food supplies for them and to increase diplomatic endeavors to raise awareness about their situation on every level. Some people think that the Pakistani government took the decision to help the Rohingya Muslims on time while others believe that they were late in taking this decision. What is your opinion?” In response, 60% of the respondents said that they took the decision on time while 39% said that they took the decision late and 1% did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1854 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during June 15 – June 22, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately ± 2 -3 per cent at 95% confidence level.

Some people think that the Pakistani government took the decision to help the Rohingya Muslims on time while others believe that they were late in taking this decision. What is your opinion?



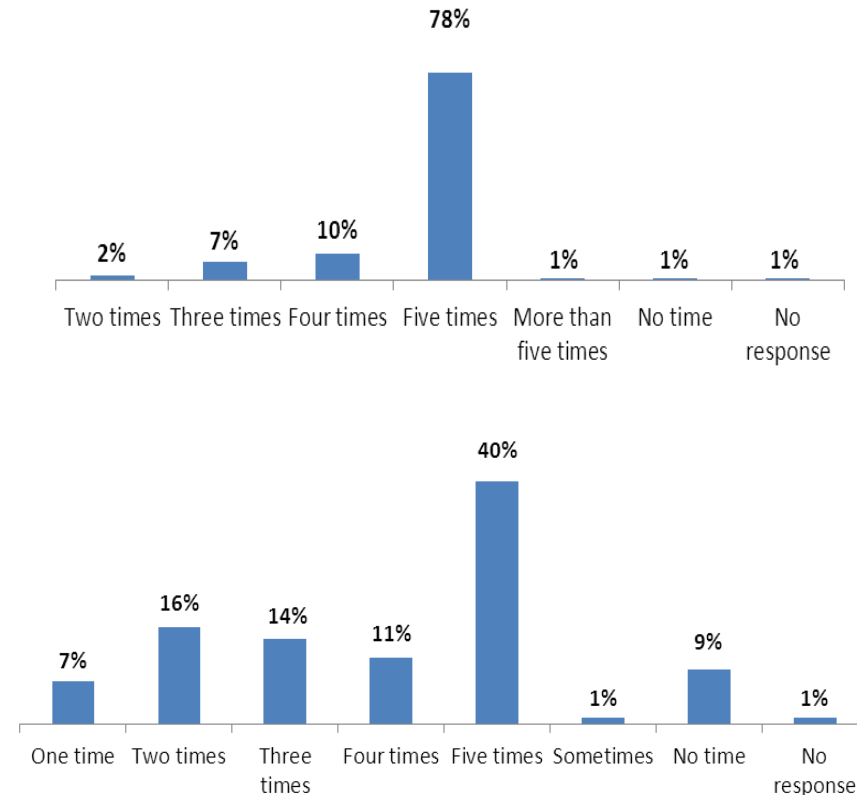

According to a Gilani Research Foundation Survey carried out by Gallup Pakistan, 78% of the respondents claimed that they are able to pray five times a day during Ramadan while 40% said that they are able to pray five times daily in months other than Ramadan.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women, from across the four provinces was asked, “Some people get the opportunity to pray whereas others don’t. How many times are you normally able to pray during Ramadan?” In response to this question, 78% of the respondents said that they are able to pray five times, 10% said that they pray four times, 7% said that they pray three times and 2% said that they pray twice daily. 1% said that they are able to pray more than five times while another 1% said that they did not pray any time and 1% did not respond.

Respondents were further asked, “How many times were you able to pray during months other than Ramadan?” 40% of the respondents said five times, 16% said two times, 14% said three times and 11% said four times. 9% said that they don’t pray any time while 7% said that they pray one time and 1% said that they prayed sometimes. 1% of the respondents did not respond.

The study was released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1899 men and women in rural and urban areas of all four provinces of the country, during June 22 – June 29, 2015. Error margin is estimated to be approximately ± 2 -3 per cent at 95% confidence level.

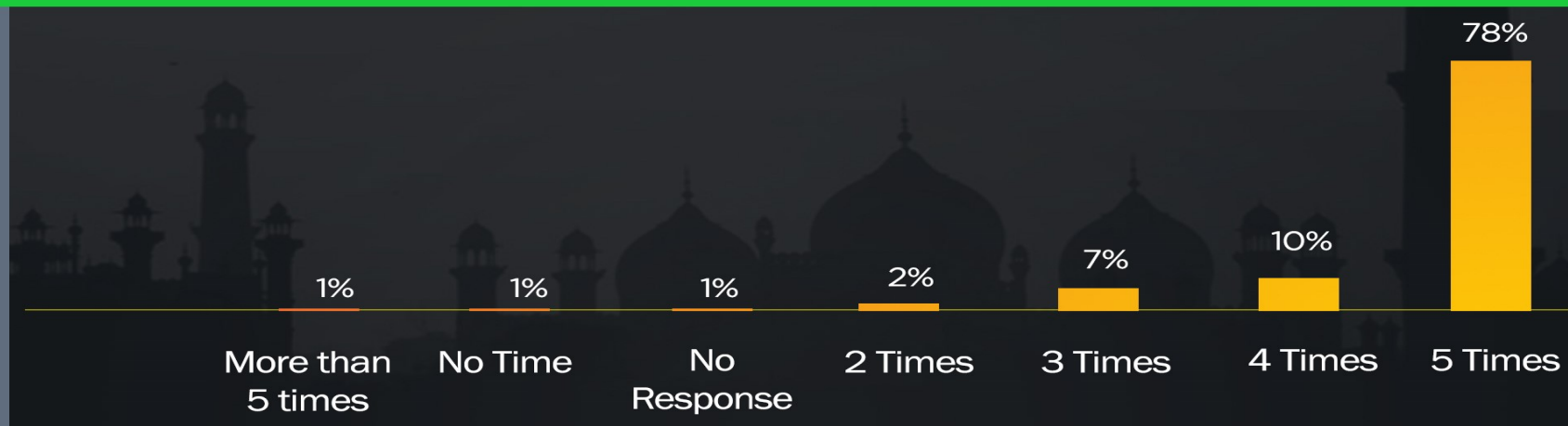

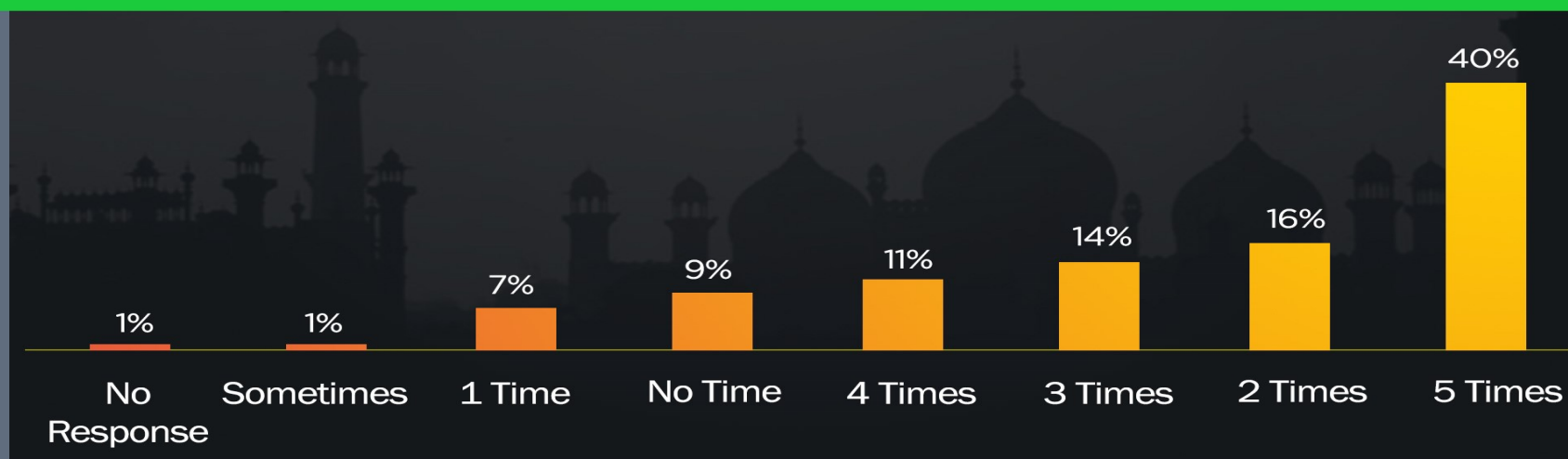

HOW MANY TIMES ARE YOU ABLE TO PRAY DURING MONTHS OTHER THAN RAMADAN?



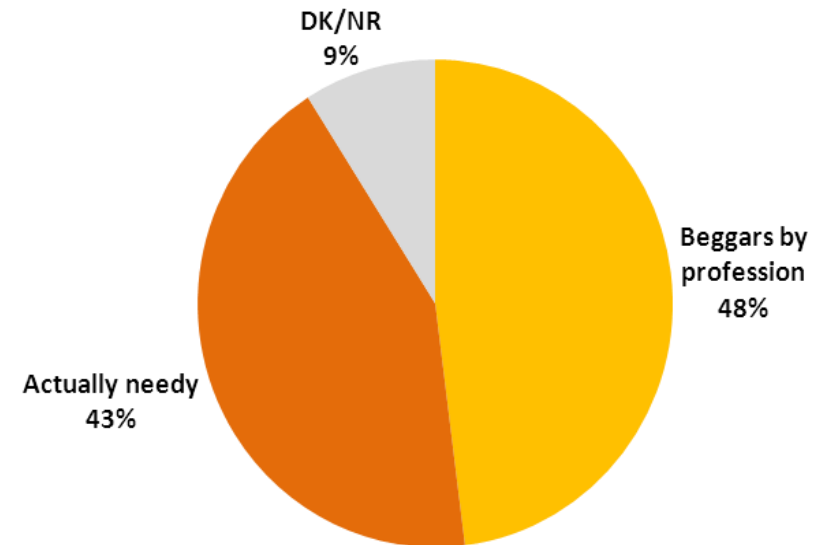

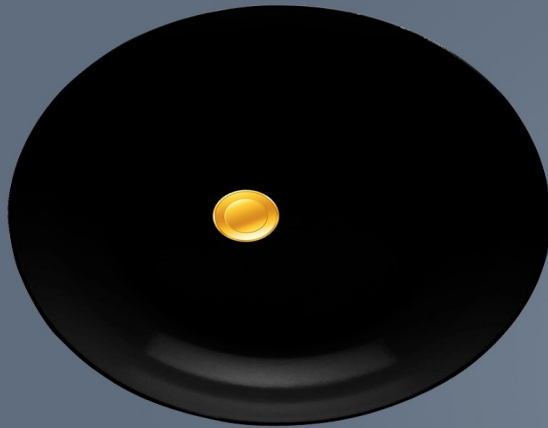

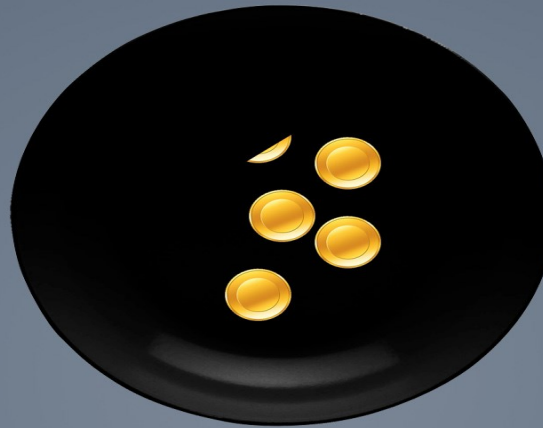


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PUBLIC OPINION DIVIDED OVER NEEDINESS OF BEGGARS IN RAMADAN.
