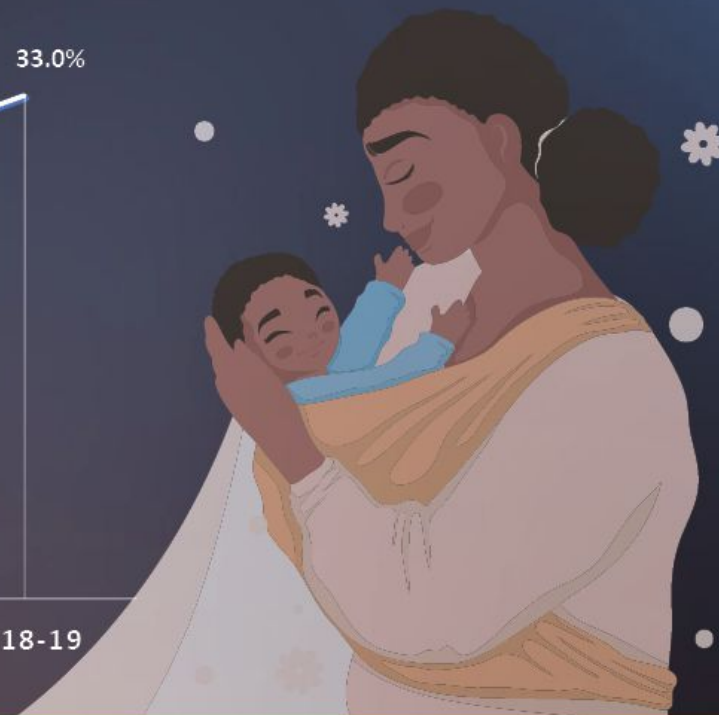
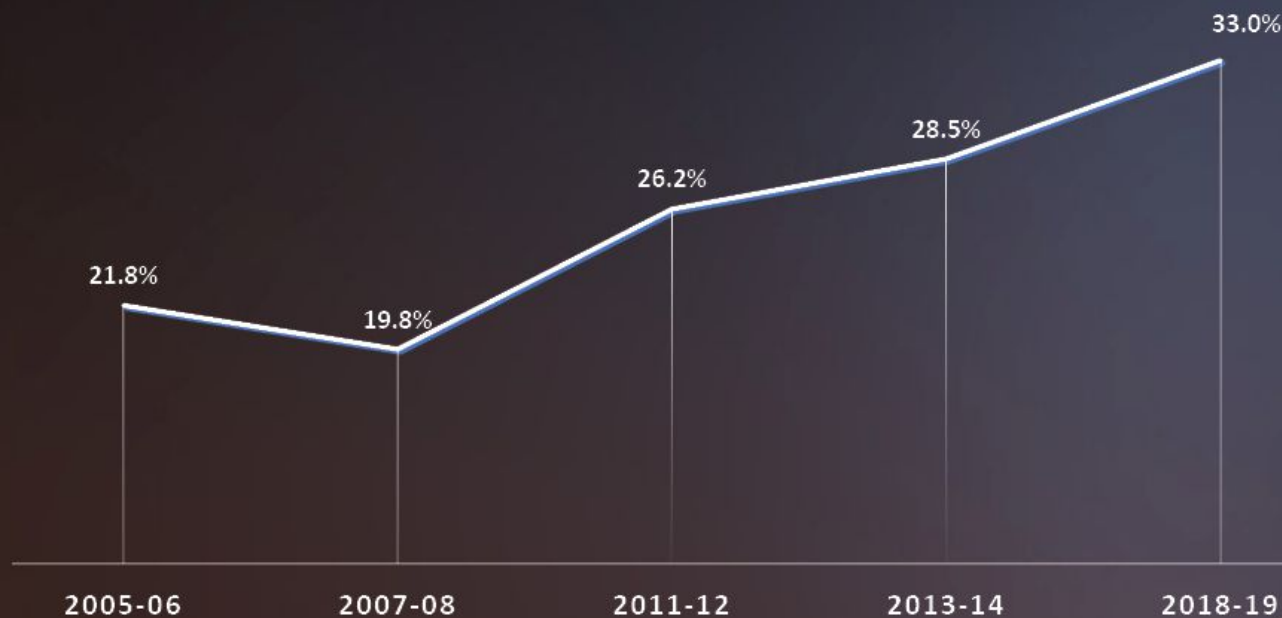


Between 2005 and 2018, 11.2% more mothers (aged 15-49 years) had post-natal checkups within 6 weeks of delivery in Pakistan

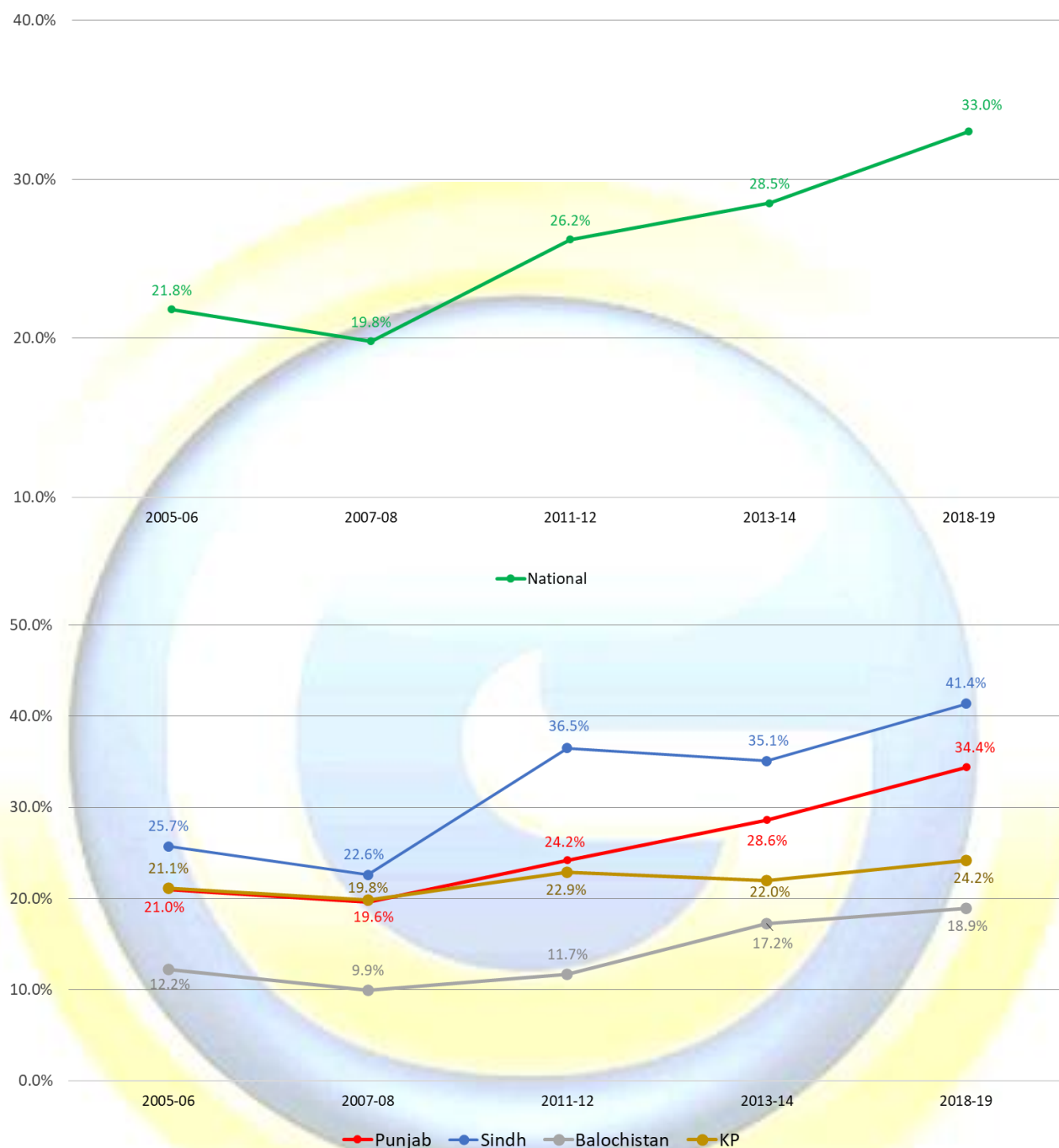
In a Pakistan Social and Living Standards Measurement (PSLM) Survey conducted in the year 2005-06 and subsequently in years 2007-08, 2011-12, 2013-14, and 2018-19, a representative sample of Pakistani mothers between the ages of 15-49 years from across the country were assessed regarding their prenatal and postnatal healthcare. In response to the question ***“After the birth (of your last child) did you receive a post-natal checkup within 6 weeks of delivery from a health care facility or at home?”***, in year 2005-06, overall, 21.8% Pakistani mothers responded “Yes”. The affirmative response was highest in Sindh at 25.7%, followed by 21.1% in KP, 21% in Punjab, and 12.2% in Balochistan.

Comparative Picture: In 2018-19, overall, 33% responded “Yes”, the affirmative response now was still highest in Sindh at 41.4%, but Punjab (34.3%) eclipsed KP (24.2%), followed by 18.9% in Balochistan.

Trend Analysis: The proportion of Pakistani mothers between the ages of 15-49 years that reported having prenatal consultations during their latest pregnancy increased by 11.2% on a national level between 2005-06 and 2018-19. At the provincial level, increases were recorded across all four provinces, the highest being in Sindh with 15.7% more pregnant women doing so, followed by 13.4% Punjab, 6.7% in Balochistan, and 3.1% in KP in the same time period.

This press release has been made as part of the Gallup Pakistan History Project which aims to release historical empirical polling data to wider audiences. The objective is to sustain and encourage empirical decision-making in Pakistan.
