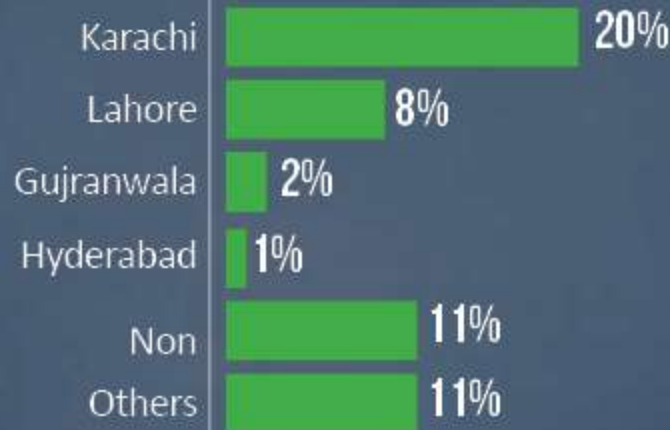

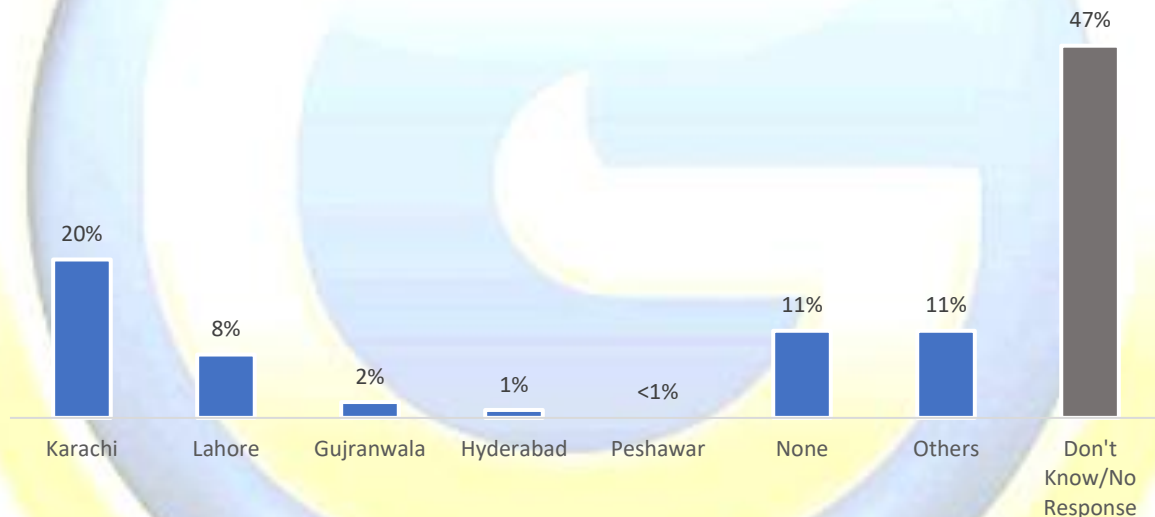

According to a survey conducted by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 1 out of 5 Pakistanis (20%) consider Karachi to be the dirtiest city in Pakistan.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the country was asked the question, “Please tell me which is the dirtiest city in Pakistan?” In response, 20% said ‘Karachi’, 8% said ‘Lahore’, 1% said ‘Hyderabad’, <1% said ‘Peshawar’, 2% said ‘Gujranwala’, 11% said ‘None’, 11% said ‘Others’, and 47% said that they did not know or gave no response.

The study in Pakistan was conducted and released by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1,023 men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, conducted from 03rd – 18th January, 2024. The error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at the 95% confidence level. The methodology used for data collection was telephonic surveys (CATI).
