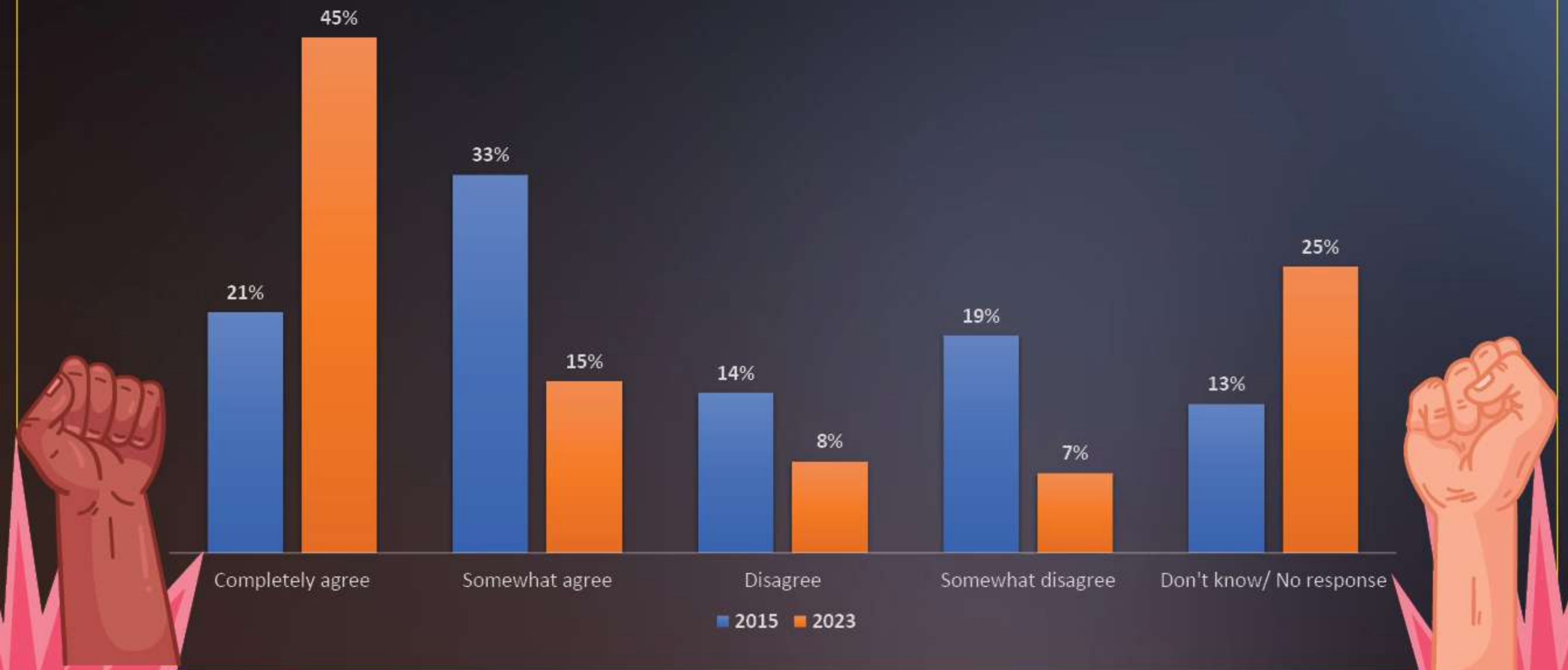


24% more Pakistanis in 2023, completely agree with the notion that the reasons for extreme violence during the Partition in 1947 are beyond comprehension, compared to 2015: Gallup & Gilani Pakistan History Project

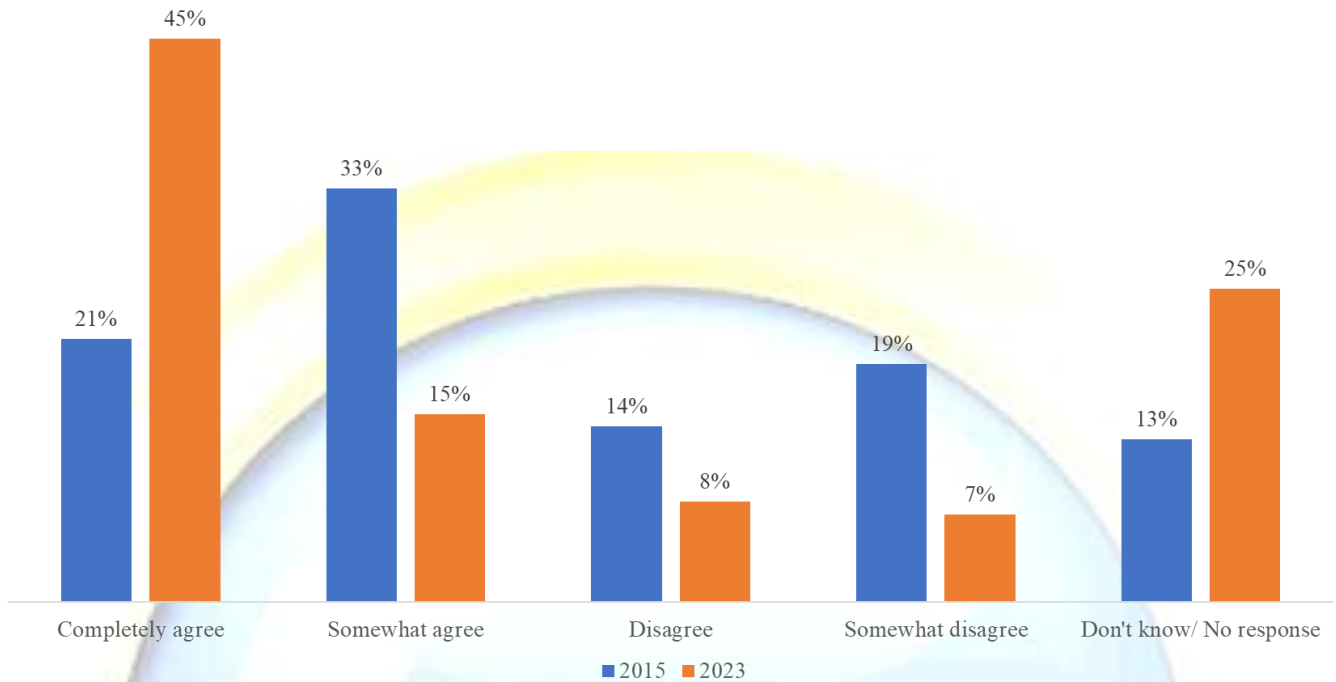
In a Gallup & Gilani Pakistan National Survey conducted in the year 2015, a representative sample of adult men and women from across Pakistan was asked the following question, *“To what extent do you agree or disagree with the view that ‘The reasons for extreme violence (during the Partition in 1947) are beyond comprehension’”* In response to this question, 21% said for ‘Completely agree’, 33% said ‘Somewhat agree’, 14% said ‘Disagree’, 19% said ‘Somewhat disagree’, and 13% said they did not know or refused to respond.

Comparative Picture: This question was asked again in 2023 to allow a comparison to be made across the years. In 2023, 45% said for ‘Completely agree’, 15% said ‘Somewhat agree’, 8% said ‘Disagree’, 7% said ‘Somewhat disagree’, and 25% said they did not know or refused to respond.

Trend Analysis: Between 2015 and 2023 opinions on the view that *‘The reasons for extreme violence (during the Partition of 1947) are beyond comprehension’* shifted quite significantly, with 24% more completely agreeing, 18% less somewhat agreeing, 6% less disagreeing, and 12% less somewhat agreeing. While those that did not know or refused to respond increased by 12%.

This press release has been made as part of the Gallup Pakistan History Project which aims to release historical empirical polling data to wider audiences. The objective is to sustain and encourage empirical decision-making in Pakistan.

The study in Pakistan was conducted and released by Gilani Research Foundation and carried out by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1,303 men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, conducted during 17th October – 7th November 2023. The error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at the 95% confidence level. The methodology used for data collection was telephonic surveys (CATI).

Aim and Rationale for Gallup Pakistan History Project

Bilal I Gilani, who is Executive Director at Gallup Pakistan, and the Director of Gallup Pakistan History Project explains the aim of the Project as follows: “Gallup Pakistan has been polling in Pakistan since 1979 (over 40 years). During this time, millions of Pakistanis have been surveyed by over a thousand interviewers of Gallup. In 2014, Gallup Pakistan has decided to release historical Public Opinion data and this Press Release is part of Gallup Pakistan’s History Project.
