In the 44-country study, Pakistan tops the list as most dissatisfied with democracy: Gallup International Study in Pakistan and in 44 other countries across the globe

Islamabad, 9th April, 2024

Gallup Pakistan has conducted a survey on perceptions regarding democracy, in collaboration with Gallup International. The survey, conducted with a diverse and representative sample of the Pakistani population, reveals the opinions of Pakistani citizens regarding democracy and the electoral process. **There are three yardsticks being used to measure people's perception about democracy: Fairness of Elections, are people governed by the will of people and is democracy the best system of government.** The survey was also conducted in another 44 countries as well and therefore provides comparative results from across the globe. The sample in Pakistan was around 1000 men and women but across the globe over 46,138 men and women were surveyed.

Niha Nazar, an analyst at Gallup Pakistan says 'Currently there is an even split amongst those who believe democracy is the best system of governance and those who believe otherwise; which is interesting to note because then is the reason for disagreeing the failure of democracy in Pakistan, or because fundamentally they believe there is a better alternative to it? It would make sense for the citizens to disagree based on a collation of both factors as well- because, while a theoretical model of democracy would be ideal, the practical implementation of it has largely not included the will of the people or been synonymous with free and fair elections. A shortfall in terms of these crucial democratic indicators coheres with the apparent disillusionment.'

Key Findings:

1. Despaired view of Pakistanis about Democracy on three counts: Is country ruled by will of people, are elections free and fair and is democracy the best system?

38% disagree (strongly or somewhat) with the statement **‘Democracy may have its flaws, but it is the best system of governance?’**

68% Pakistanis disagree (strongly or somewhat) with the statement that their country is **ruled by the will of the people**

45% who disagree (strongly or somewhat) with the statement that **elections in their country are free and fair.**

2. Top 5 countries:

“Democracy as the best system of governance”

Amongst the top 5 countries that appear to be most dissatisfied with democracy, Pakistan tops the list with 38%. Followed by Iraq (34%), Moldova (32%), Peru (31%) and Kenya (26%)

“Will of the people”

Pakistan (66%) comes second to Bosnia and Herzegovina (73%) as the top two countries that do not believe that their country is ruled by the will of the people.

“Free and fair elections”

Bosnia and Herzegovina (75%) tops the list of countries that does not believe that the elections in their country are free and fair. There is a 30% difference between the dissatisfaction of Bosnia and Herzegovina, as compared to Pakistan (45%).

3. Trend over the years:

“Democracy as the best system of governance”

There has been a significant shift in the opinions of Pakistanis regarding democracy as the best system of governance. In 2005, 61% agreed/somewhat agreed with the statement. This rose to 73% in 2014. However, it then fell by 35% in 2023- currently standing at 38%.

“Will of the people”

Compared to 2020 (48%) and 2021 (54%), there was a significant surge in the number of Pakistanis who do not believe that their country is ruled by the will of the people (66%) in 2023.

“Free and fair elections”

In 2020, nearly half (44%) of the citizens thought of elections as free and fair. This decreased to 40% in 2021, further falling to 28% in 2023.

4. Demographic differences

“Democracy as the best system of governance”

Females more skeptical about democracy, less educated people following suite, with more educated people still believing democracy is the best system of governance.

“Will of the people”

Females and the younger age group more disillusioned with the veracity of the claim that their country is run by the will of the people.

“Free and fair elections”

Men seem more like than women to believe in the occurrence of free and fair elections. Those who are more educated tend to disagree.

INDICATOR 1: DEMOCRACY AS THE BEST SYSTEM OF GOVERNANCE

2023 results for Pakistan

There appears to be an even split between those who agree with the opinion that democracy is the best system of governance, and those who disagree. Both stand at 38%, with 10% remaining neutral and 14% either not responding, or stating they don't know (*figure. 1*).

Demographic differences in views about democracy? Females more skeptical about democracy, less educated people following suite, with more educated people still believing democracy is the best system of governance.

In terms of demographic differences, more females (42%) as compared to males (34%) disagreed with the statement that democracy is the best system of governance (*figure. 2*). The difference amounting to 8%. In addition to that, respondents above the age of 65 (58%) were more likely to believe that democracy is the best system of governance, as compared to those between 54-64 (20%) (*figure. 4*). Furthermore, respondents with a higher education degree also agreed/strongly agreed that democracy is the best of system of governance (44%, second only to those who had completed secondary school (52). On the other hand, those who had no education/only basic education, fell on the other side of spectrum (28%) (*figure. 5*).

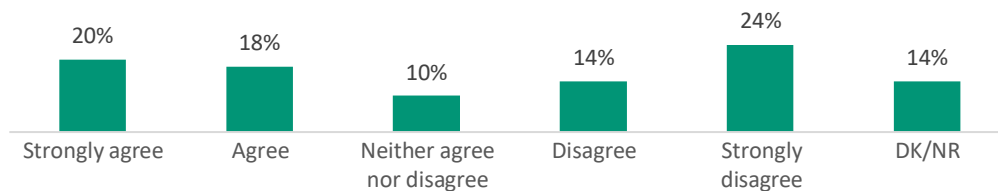
Views about democracy being the best system over time? Has skepticism been rising?

There has been a significant shift in the opinions of Pakistanis regarding democracy as the best system of governance. In 2005, 61% agreed/somewhat agreed with the statement. This rose to 73% in 2014 (*figure. 3*). However, it then fell by 35% in 2023- currently standing at 38%. (See note in methodology about trend analysis)

Pakistan and 43 other countries: Are we more skeptical? Pakistan tops the list of countries who are most skeptical about democracy being the best system of governance

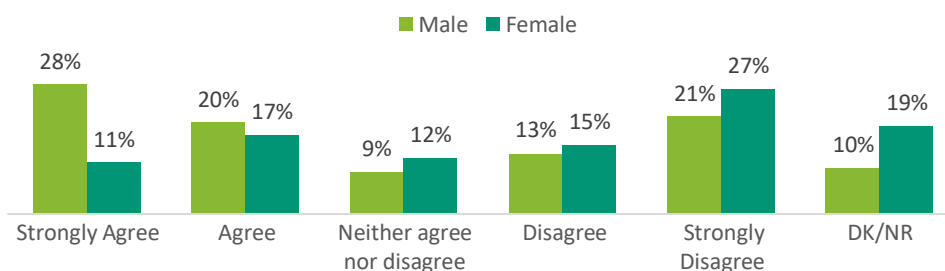
In terms of global comparison, amongst the top 5 countries that appear to be most dissatisfied with democracy, Pakistan tops the list with 38%. Followed by Iraq (34%), Moldova (32%), Peru (31%) and Kenya (26%) (*figure. 6*).

Q4. Do you agree or disagree with the statement "Democracy may have its flaws, but it is the best system of governance?"



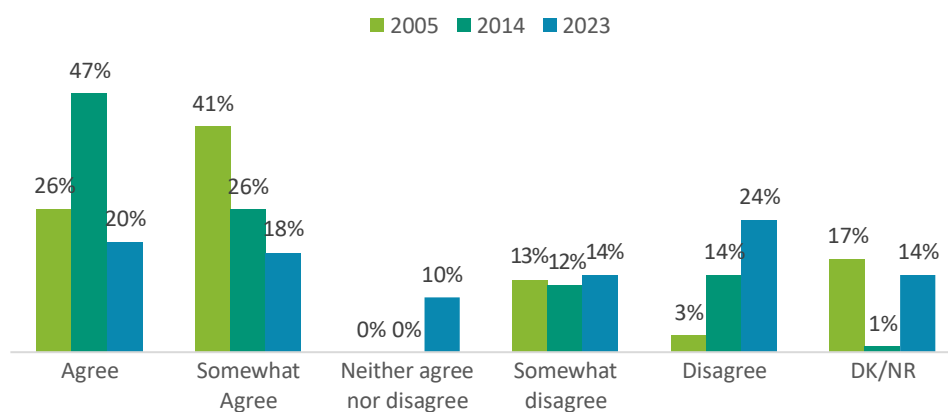

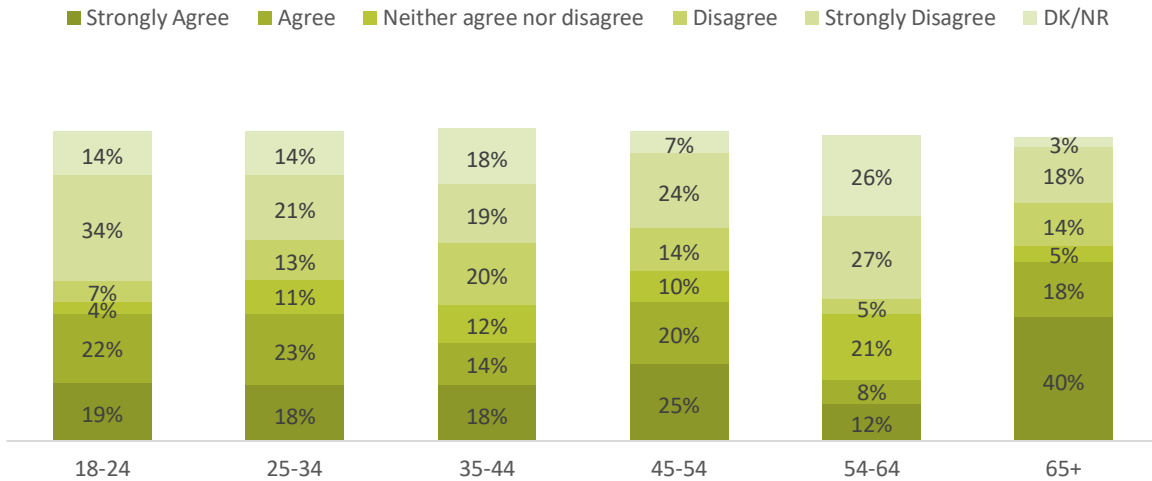

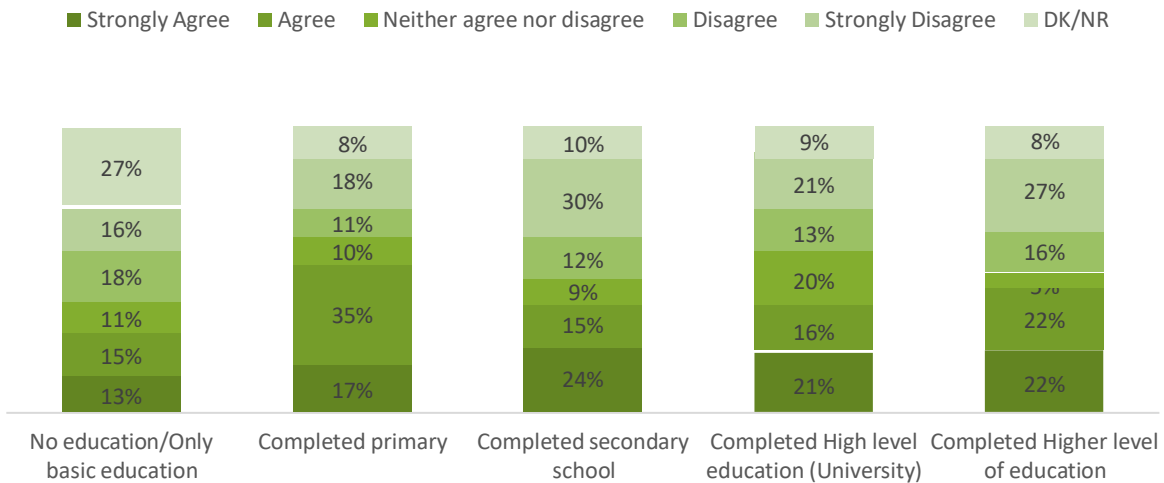

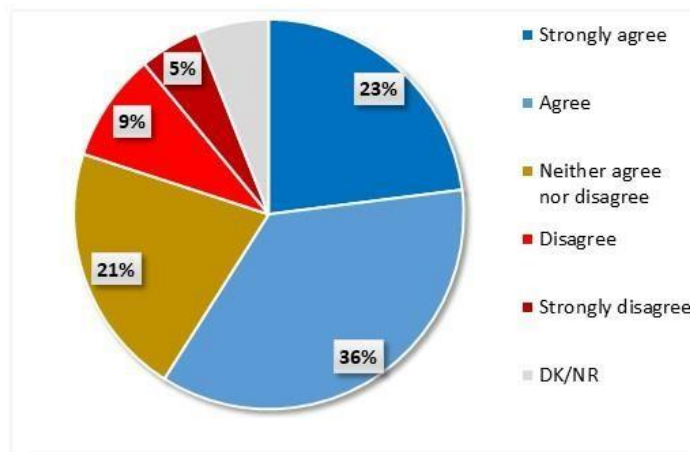

INDICATOR 2: WILL OF THE PEOPLE

2023 results for Pakistan

More than half (66%) the Pakistanis disagree/strongly disagree with the statement that their country is ruled by the will of people (*figure. 7*). It is surprising that in a democratic country, only 20% of the citizens agree/strongly agree with the statement.

Females and the younger age group more disillusioned with the veracity of the claim that their country is run by the will of the people.

In terms of demographic differences, 6% more females (69%) disagreed/strongly disagreed with the statement, “my country is ruled by the will of the people”, as compared to men (63%) (*figure. 8*). Additionally, respondents falling under the age bracket of 18-24 (68%), were also more likely to disagree/strongly disagree with the statement; alluding to a disillusionment with the younger generation (*figure. 10*). In a similar stream, the more educated strata followed suite with 71% of those with higher level education degrees also disagreeing/strong disagreeing with the statement (*figure. 11*).

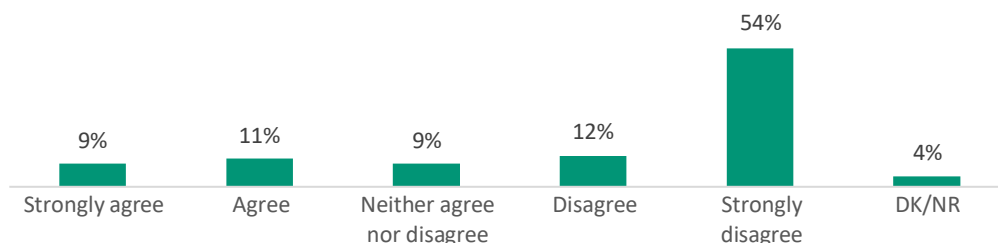
A significant uptake since the past years in percentage of citizens who do not believe that the country is run by the will of the people.

Compared to 2020 (48%) and 2021 (54%), there was a significant surge in the number of Pakistanis who do not believe that their country is ruled by the will of the people (66%) in 2023 (*figure. 9*). The difference between 2020 and 2023 amounting to 18% (See note in methodology about trend analysis).

Pakistan and 43 other countries: Pakistan comes second in the list of countries who do not believe that their country is ruled by the will of the people.

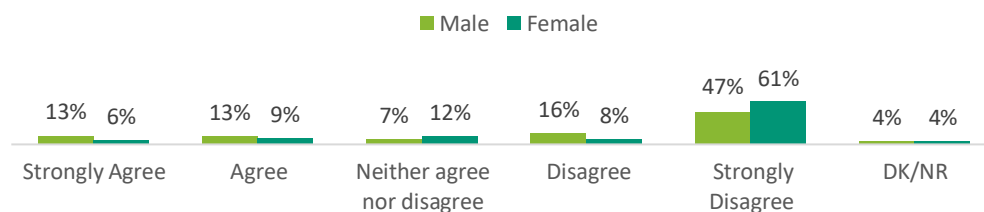
Globally, Pakistan (66%) comes second to Bosnia and Herzegovina (73%) as the top two countries that do not believe that their country is ruled by the will of the people (*figure. 12*). Bulgaria comes in third (61%), followed by Georgia/Romania (56%) and Moldova (55%).

Q5. Do you agree or disagree with the statement "My country is ruled by the will of the people?"



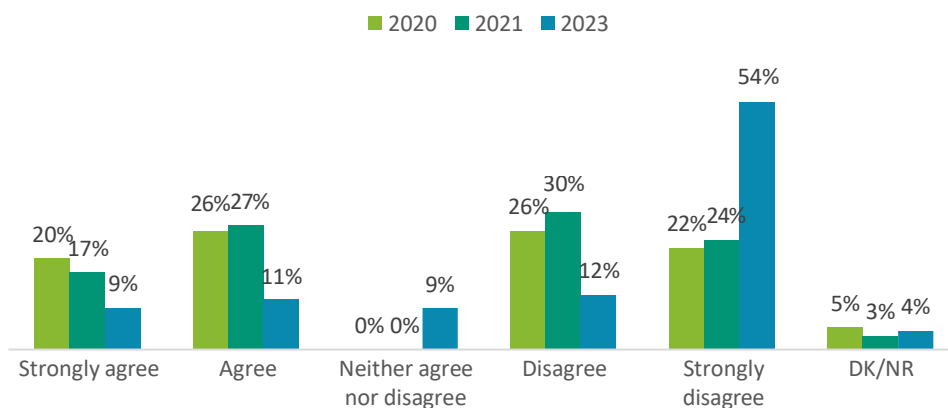

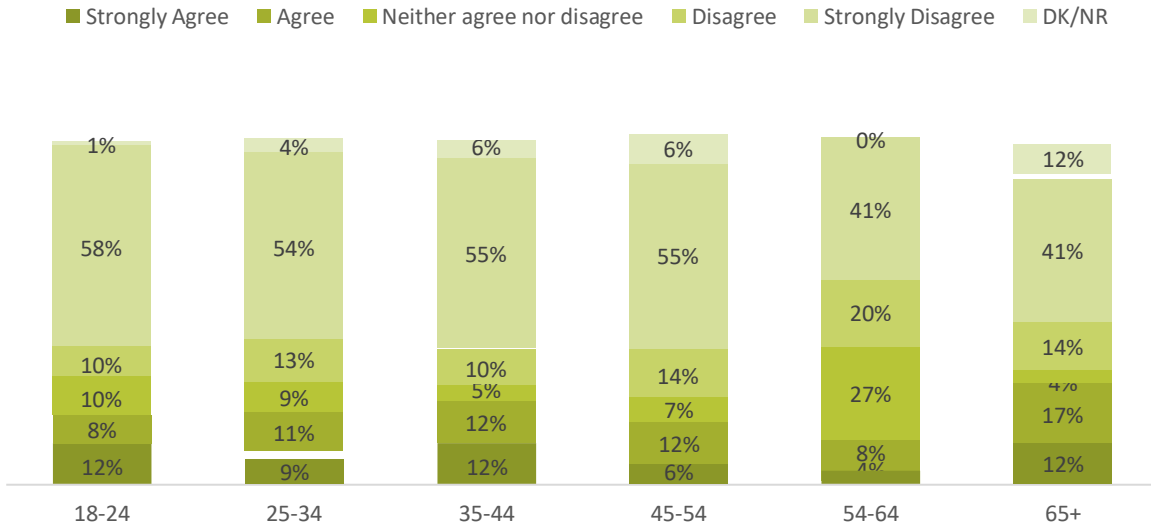

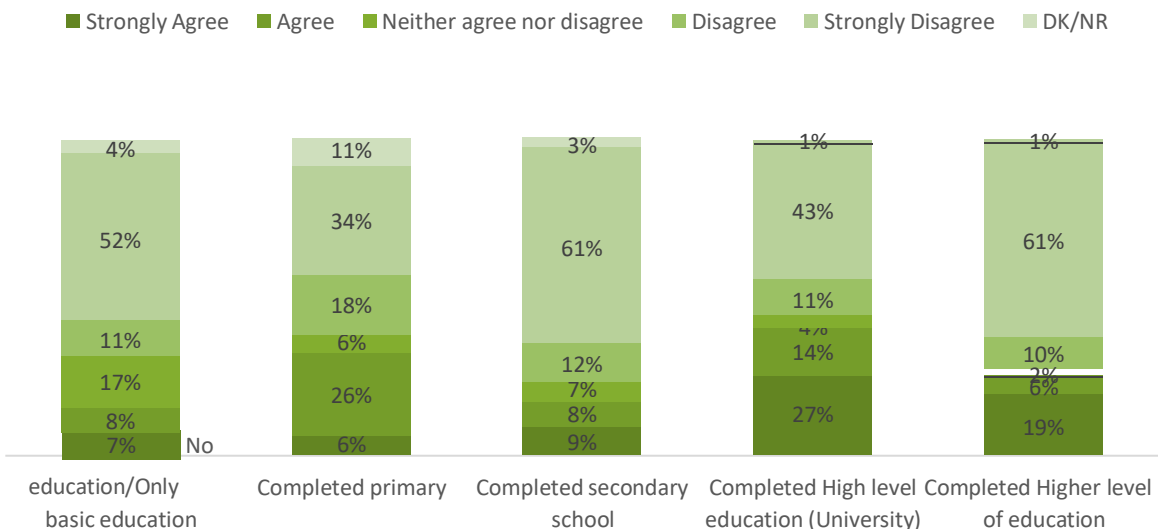

Q5. Do you agree or disagree with the statement "My country is ruled by the will of the people?": *by age*



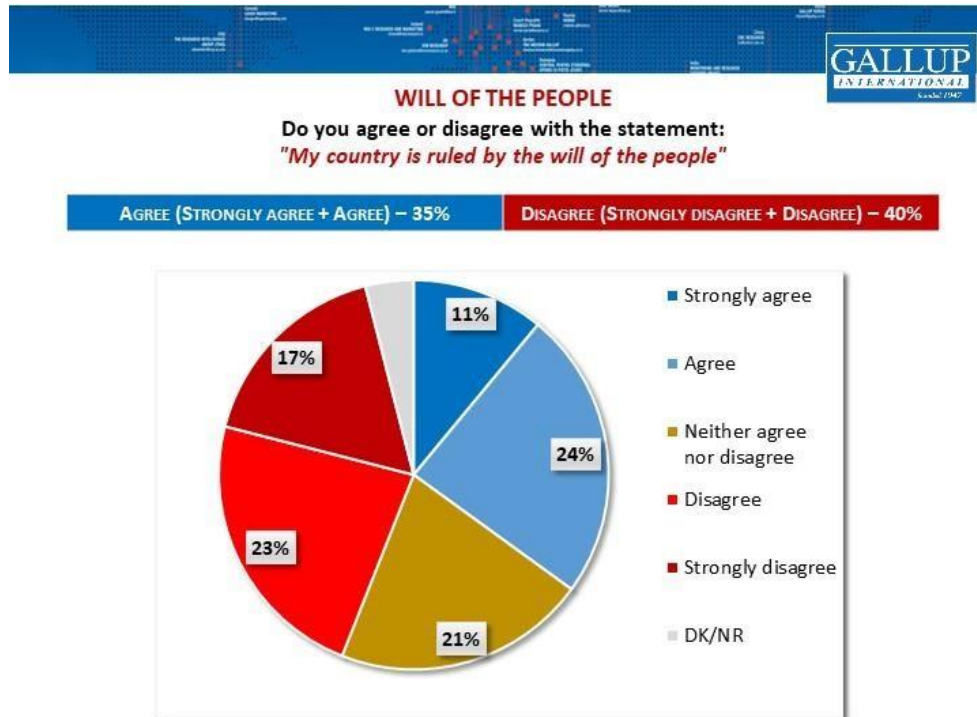

INDICATOR 3: FREE AND FAIR ELECTIONS

2023 results for Pakistan

Nearly half (45%) the Pakistanis disagree with the notion that elections in their country are free and fair, with only 28% believing otherwise (*figure. 13*). 18% of the respondents chose to be neutral by neither agreeing or disagreeing, while 10% responded with “DK/NR”.

Fairness of electoral procedure: Men seem more like than women to believe in the occurrence of free and fair elections. Those who are more educated tend to disagree.

More men (31%) as compared to women (23) seemed to believe that elections are definitely/rather free and fair in Pakistan (*figure. 14*). In terms of age, those who are 65+ seem least likely to agree with the statement, with only 23% agreeing, as compared to the 32% of the 18-24 age group respondents (*figure. 16*). Additionally, as has been noted in the previous indicator as well, in terms of education, those who had completed higher level (56%) were the most likely to hold the opinion that elections in Pakistan are definitely/rather not free and fair (*figure. 17*).

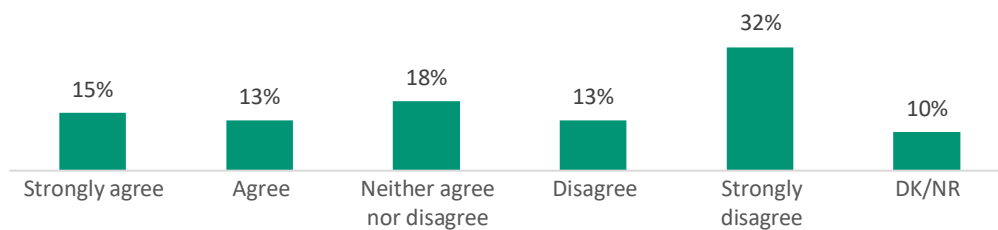
Citizens have been gradually disillusioned by the fairness of elections in Pakistan, with a 16% decrease between 2020-2023 in those who think elections are free and fair.

There has been a gradual shift in perception regarding the electoral process in Pakistan in the past 3 years (*figure. 15*). In 2020, nearly half (44%) of the citizens thought of elections as free and fair. This decreased to 40% in 2021, further falling to 28% in 2023. (See note in methodology about trend analysis).

Pakistan and 43 other countries: Pakistan does not make it to the list of top 5 countries that do not believe that the elections in their country are free and fair- with a 30% gap between Pakistan and Bosnia & Herzegovina (top of the list).

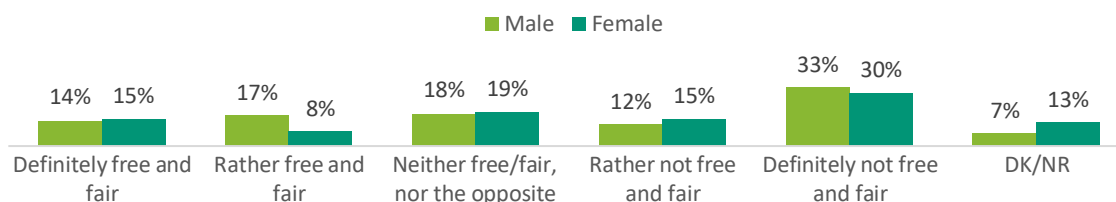
Bosnia and Herzegovina (75%) tops the list of countries that does not believe that the elections in their country are free and fair (*figure. 18*). There is a 30% difference between the dissatisfaction of Bosnia and Herzegovina, as compared to Pakistan (45%).

Q6. Do you feel the elections in your country are free and fair?



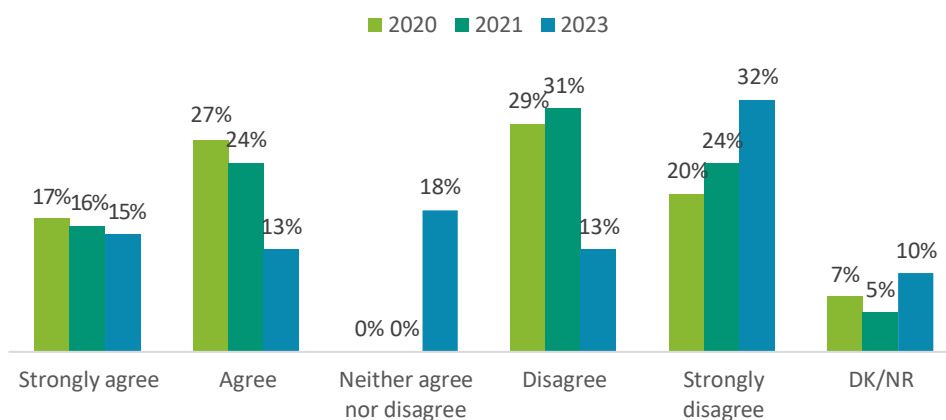

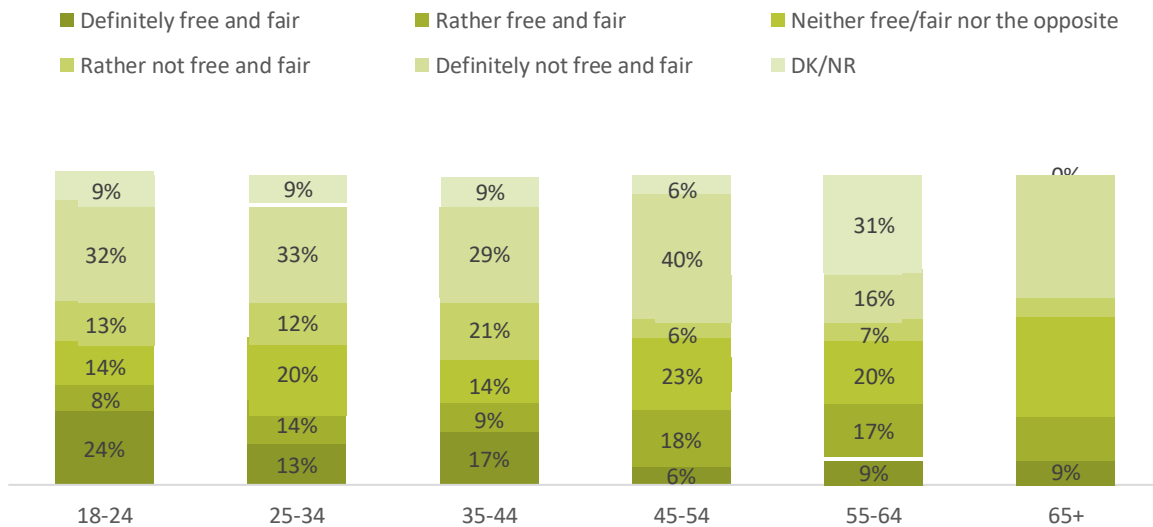

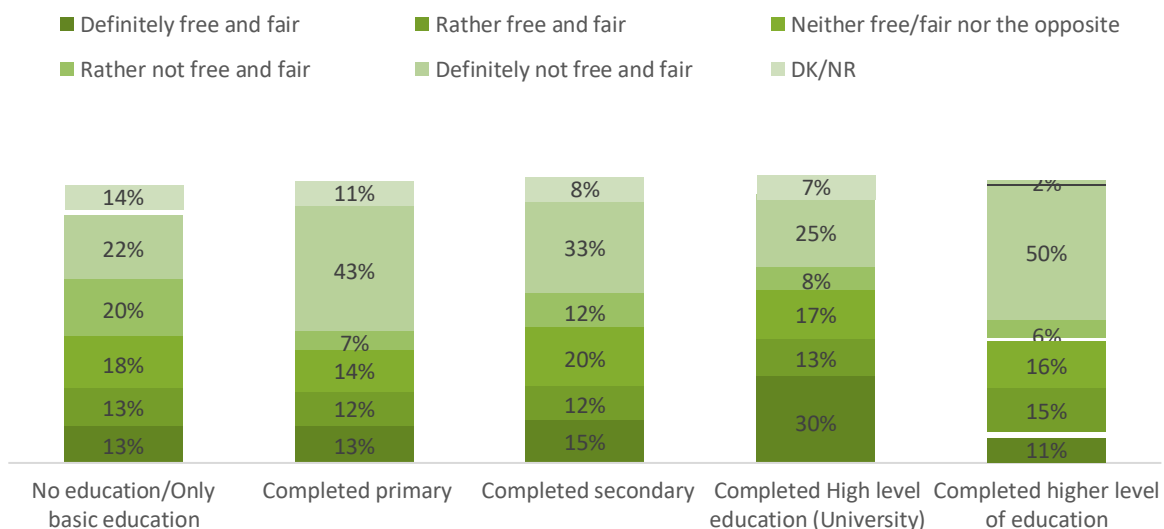

Q6. Do you feel the elections in your country are free and fair?: *by age*



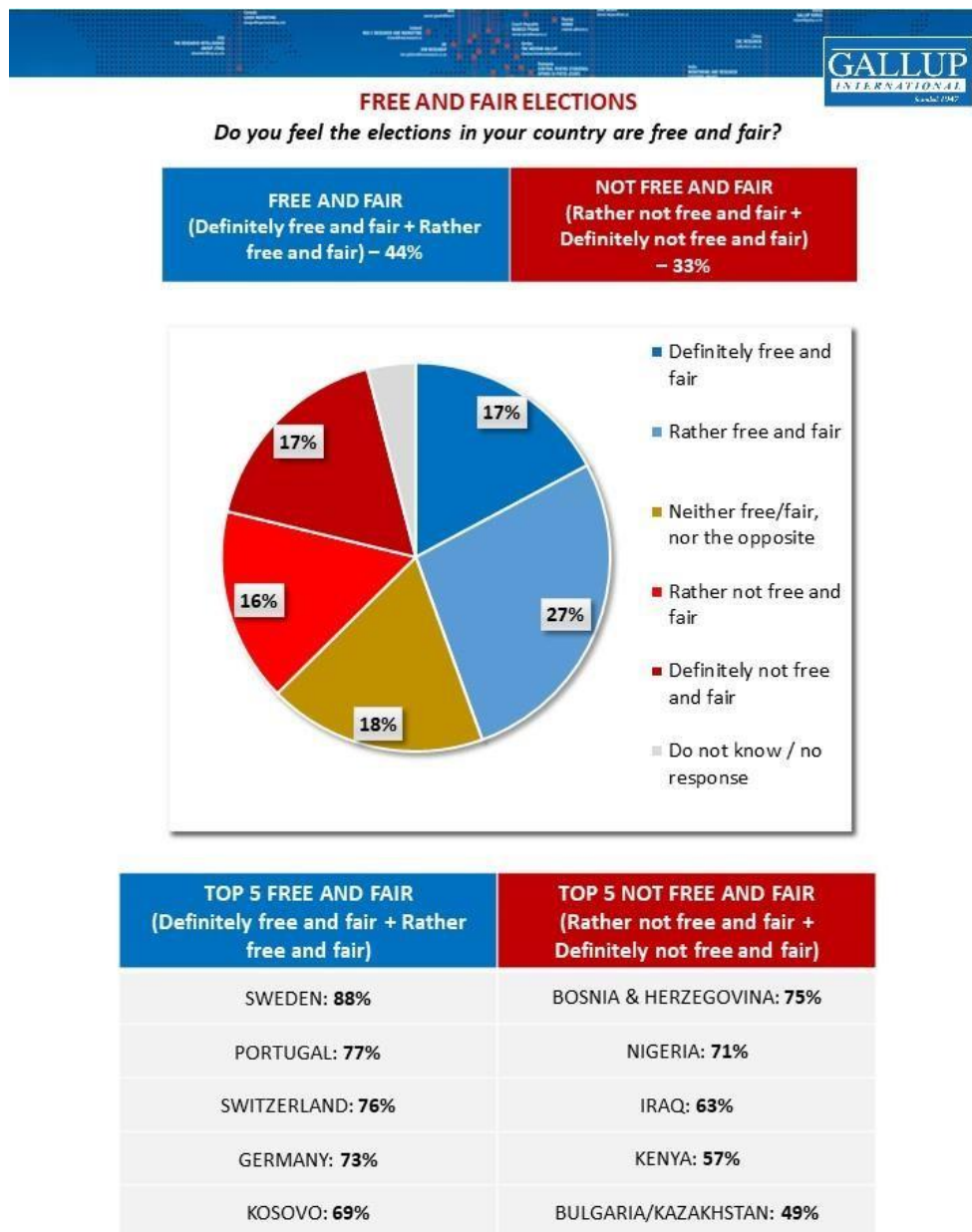

Methodology and Sample Profile of countries where research was conducted

Methodology :

The Gallup International End of Year Survey (EoY) is an annual tradition initiated by and designed under the chairmanship of Dr. George Gallup in 1977. The survey is conducted every year since then. This year it was carried out in 45 countries around the world. Sample Size and Mode of Fieldwork: A total of 46 138 persons were interviewed globally. In each country a representative sample of around 1000 men and women was interviewed during October-December 2023 either face to face, via telephone or online. The margin of error for the survey is between +3-5% at 95% confidence level.

Note on Trend Analysis : In earlier years the likert scale used is 4 scale. In 2023 5 scale question is used with an additional option of neutral . This makes strict comparison between 2023 vs the rest difficult. We therefore advise caution when interpreting the results.
