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LOOKING BACK AND LOOKING AHEAD

The basic purpose of this Roundtable and Report is to start a meaningful debate on the issue of Education Research in Pakistan and identify avenues of further improvement. We admit that during the last 38 years we often asked inappropriate questions or did not maintain a time series as we should have. Moreover, our questions were not always informed by Education Expert knowledge. Hopefully in the future, we will frame more ‘informed questions’ in a more ‘informed framework’.

While recognizing its limitations, what we have and present here, provides approximations to Perceptions on a wide variety of Education issues, which may otherwise be unavailable in a scientific fashion.

We present this to generate a constructive debate between Education Professionals and Survey Researchers. The two can join hands to produce valuable Research and teaching materials for Education Professionals.

The data pertain to 38 years of polling work. We have made much effort to standardize the samples and question wording wherever comparisons are made across years. However it still leaves room for improvement. We will join our readers in bringing greater refinement in all stages of research as we look ahead to future work on the same subjects.

We would welcome any suggestions or comments.

Methodology

INTRODUCTION

Pakistan is the 6th largest country of the world with a population of approximately 174 million. 37% of Pakistani population is below 15 years of age. The literacy level in age 15 and above is 50%. This is 63% for males and 36% for the female population. (2005 estimate) According to 2006 estimates, 2.6% of GDP is spent on education*.

There are total **251,134** educational institutions of all categories in the country. Out of these **71%** are in public sector and remaining **29%** in private sector. The total enrolment in all categories of educational institutions for both public and private sectors is **36 million**. The total **male enrolment is 20 million and female enrolment is 16 million****.

ASPIRATIONS

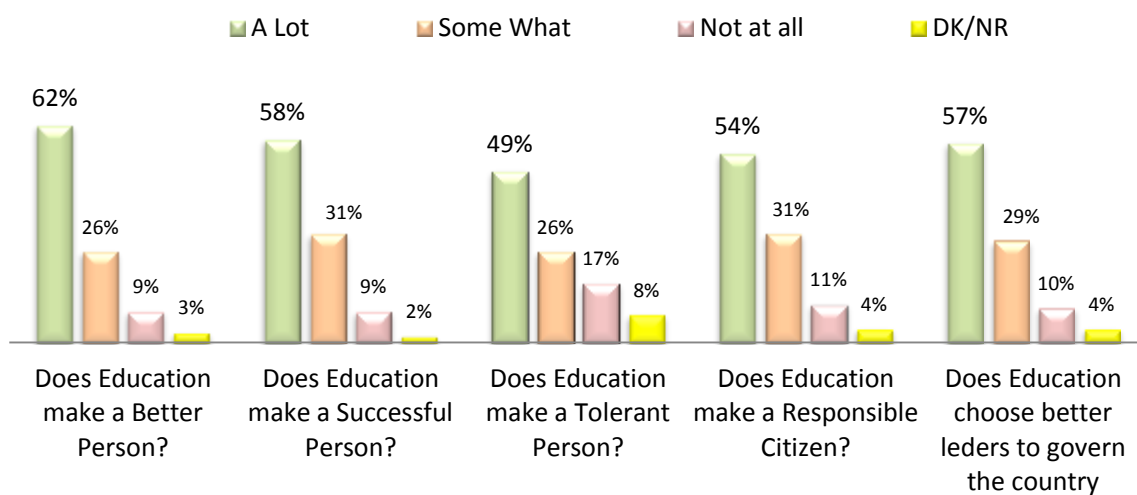
Aspiration for literacy is near universal for both boys and girls. Aspired level of Education is higher for Male than Female child. But we see dramatic change in rising aspirations for higher education of female child during these 38 years.

56% of Pakistanis aspire their girls to go to college and beyond. 70% of them aspire the same for boys.

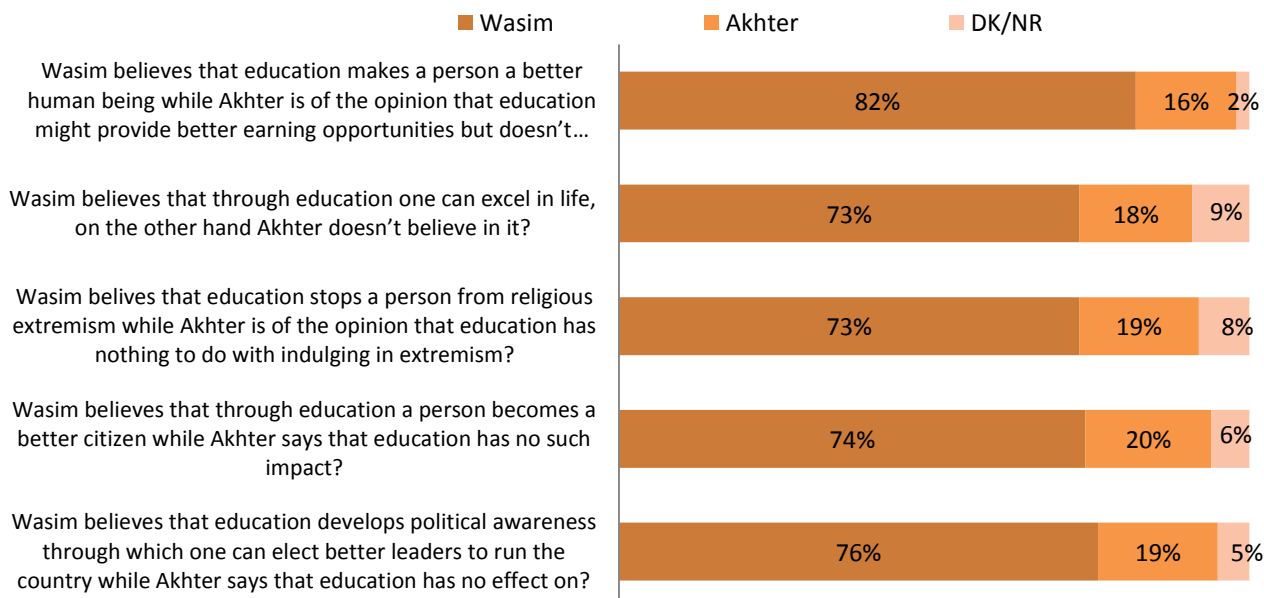

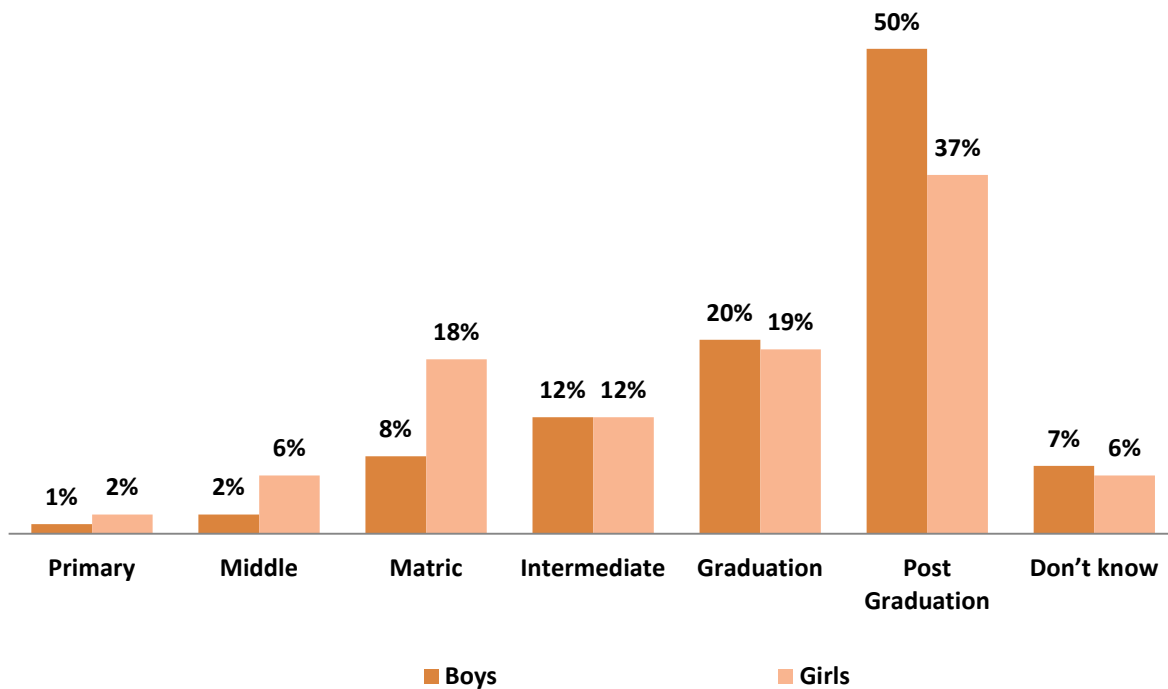

Question: To which level do you think boys and girls should be educated to?

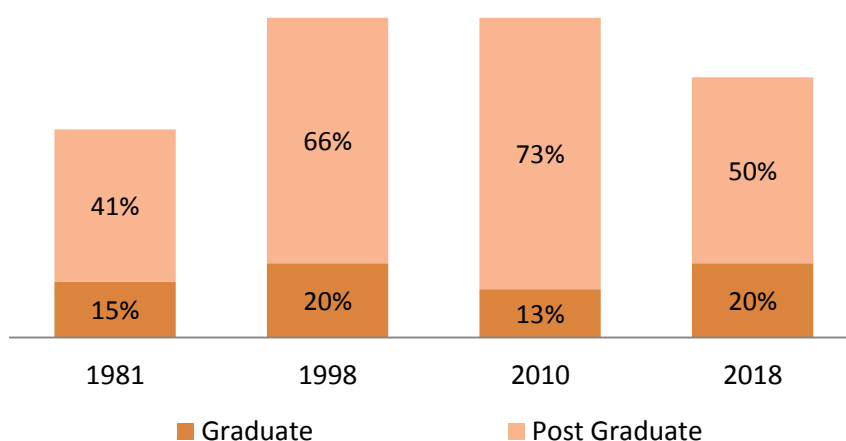

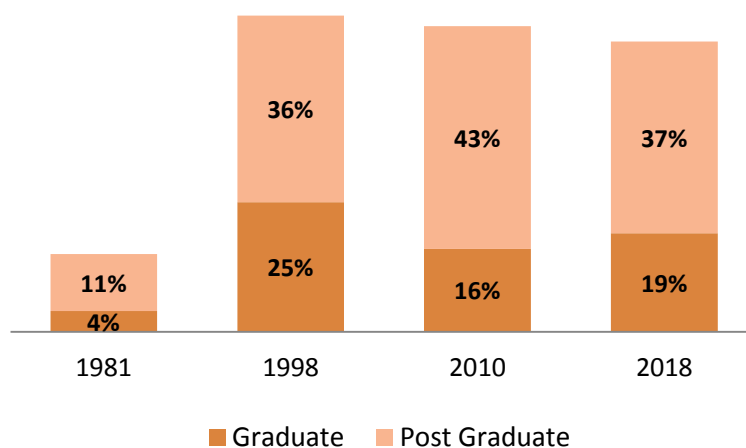

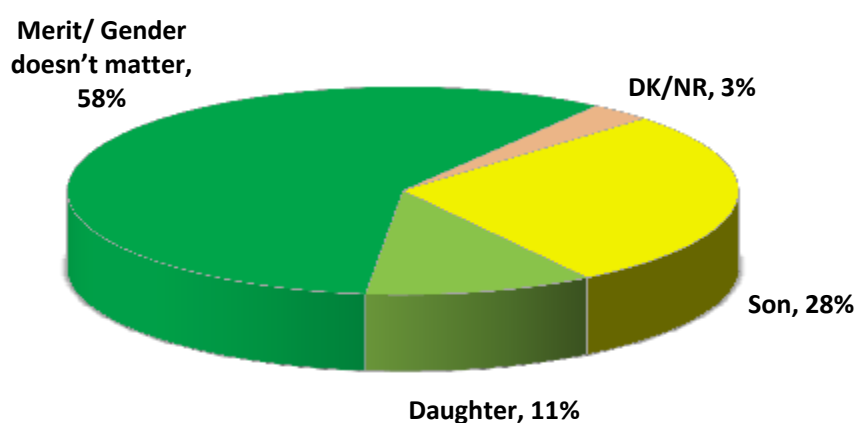
EDUCATION FOR WOMEN

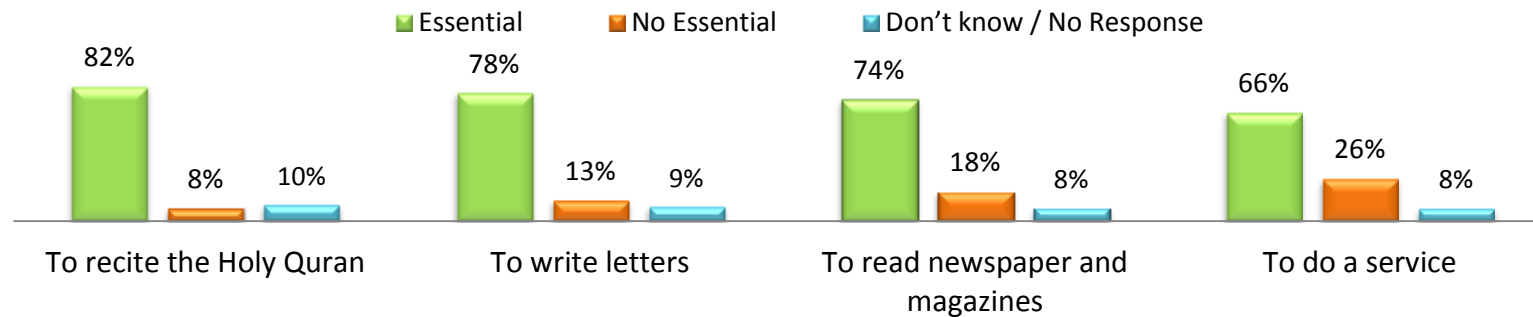

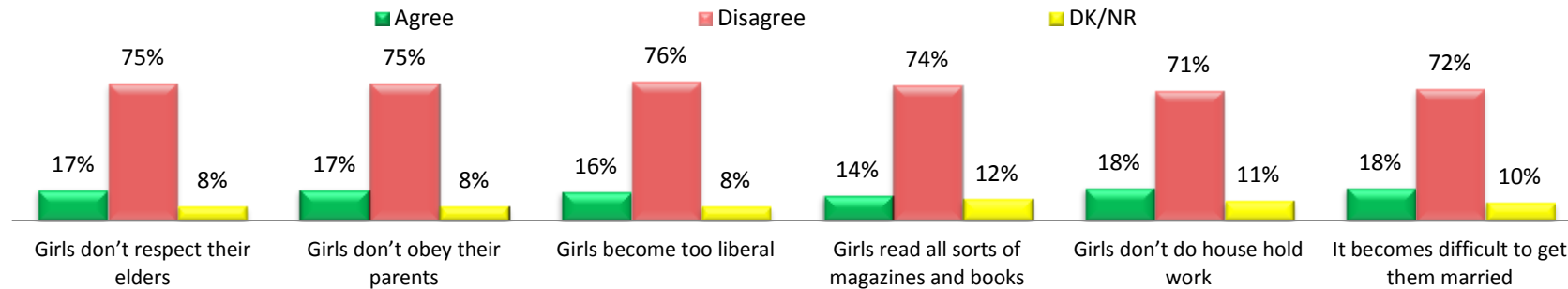

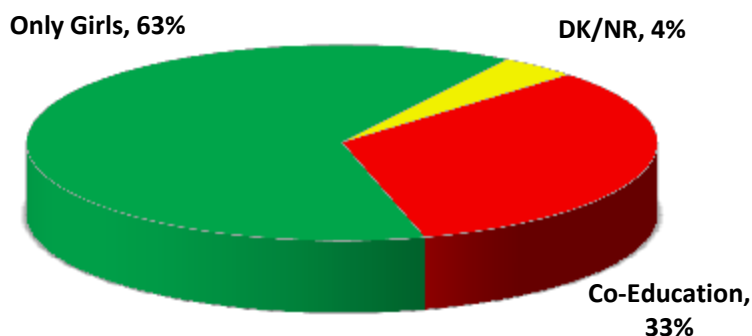

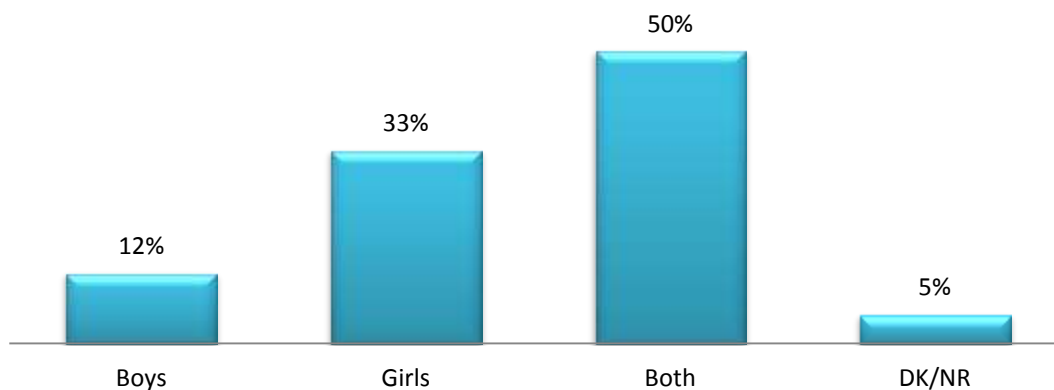

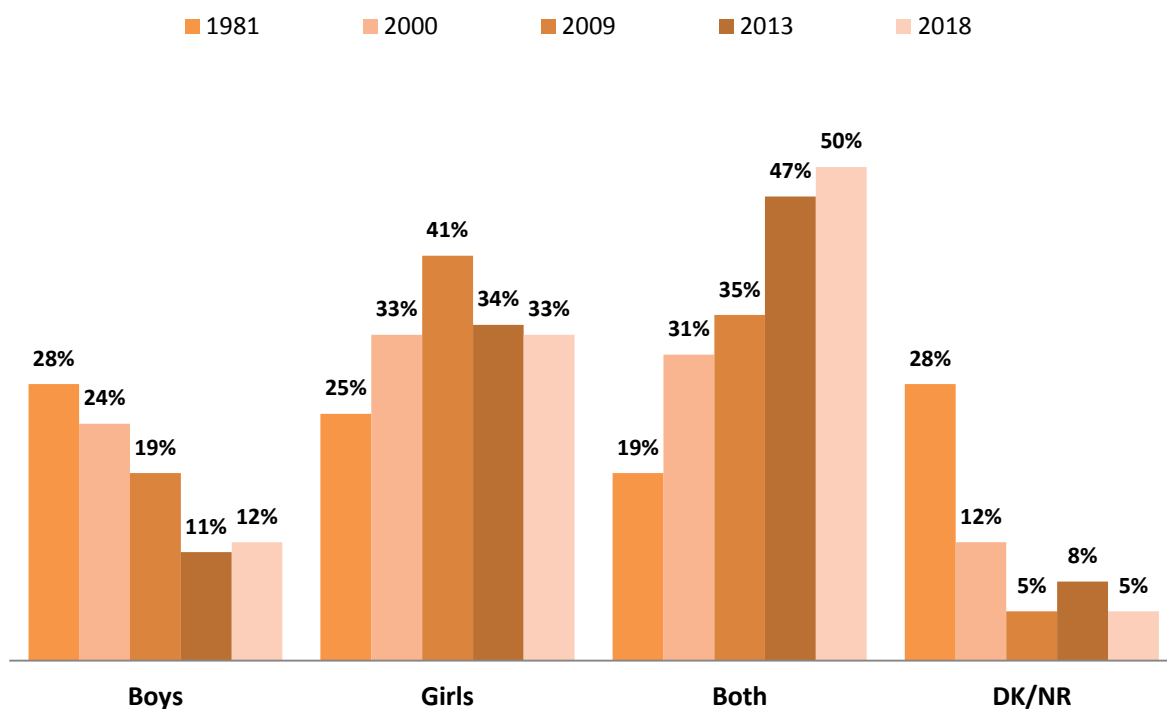

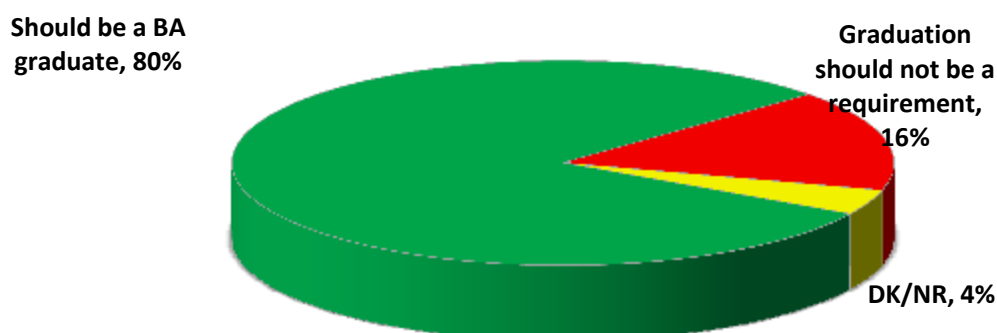

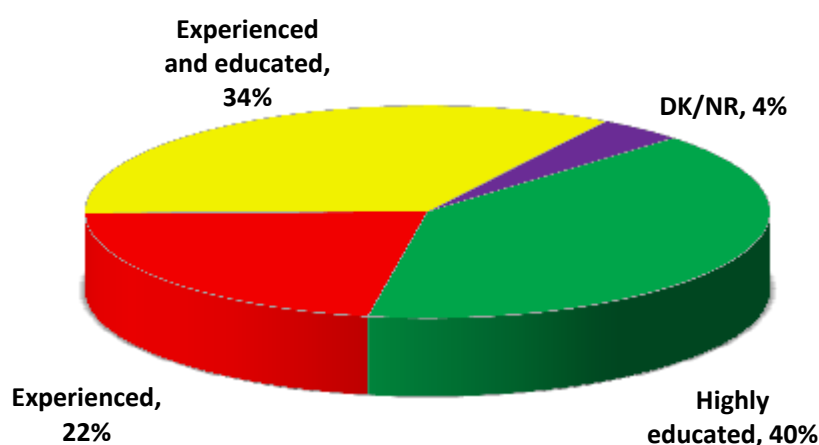

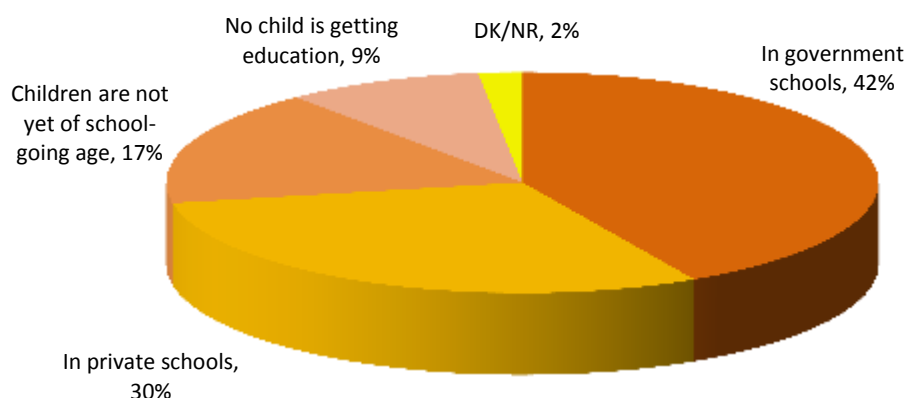

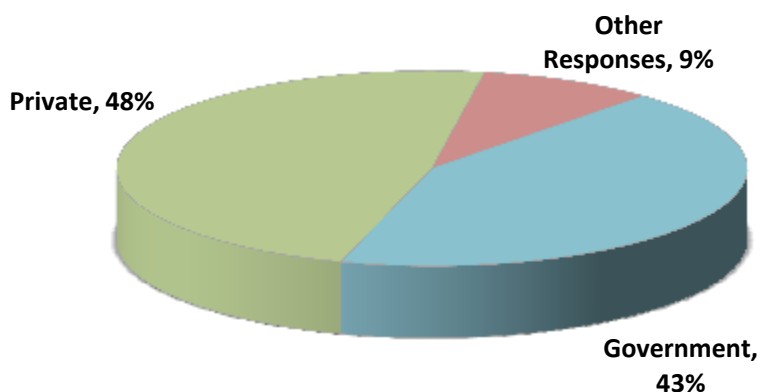

Thus ratio of children in public schools has decrease.
- 2- Or is it a data issue?
- 3- Population growth has slowed. Hence more (6% rather than 17% are in school going age)
- 4- Enrolment has risen; hence fewer children of school going age are out of school (21% instead of 9%)

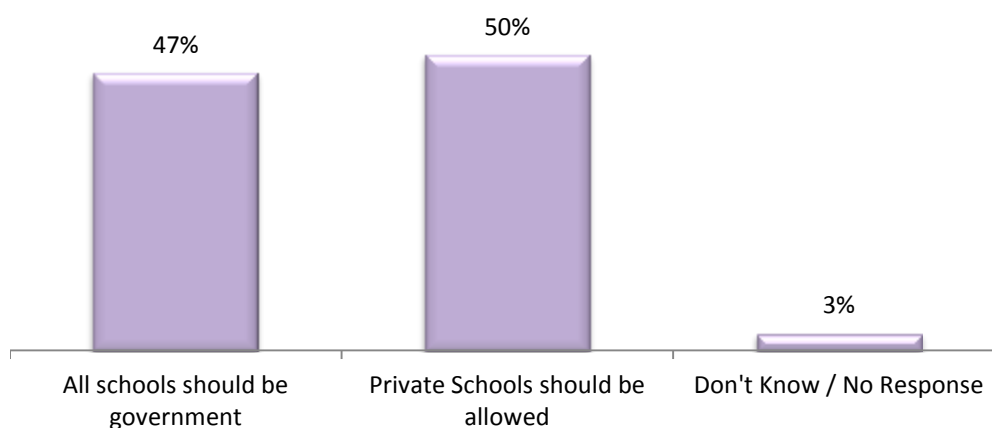

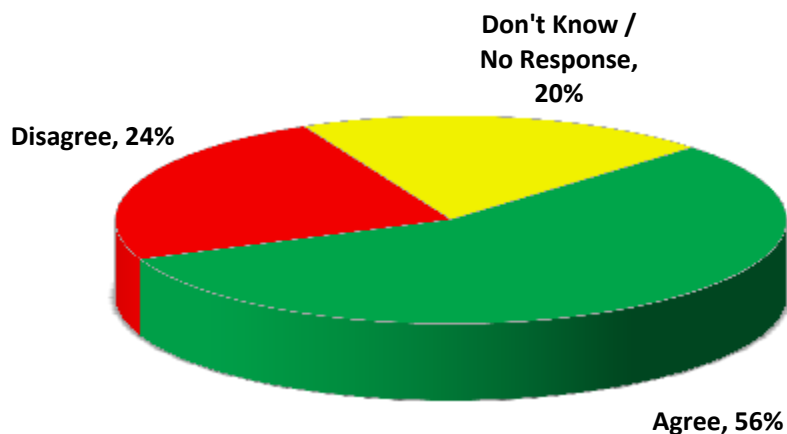

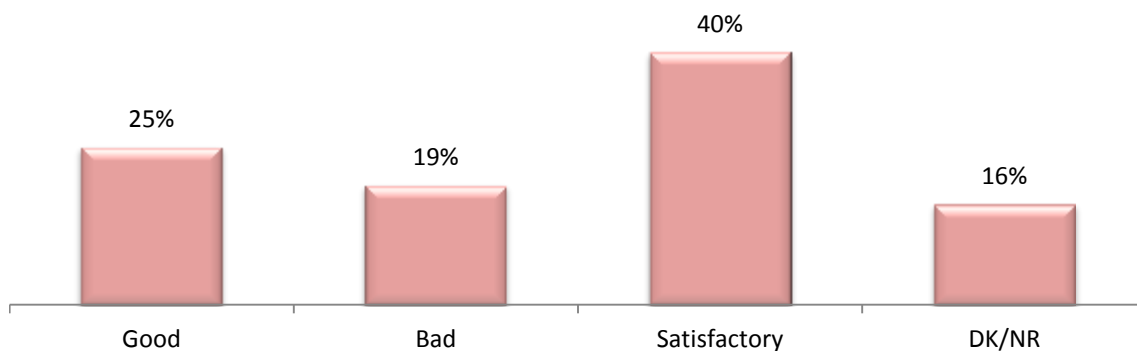

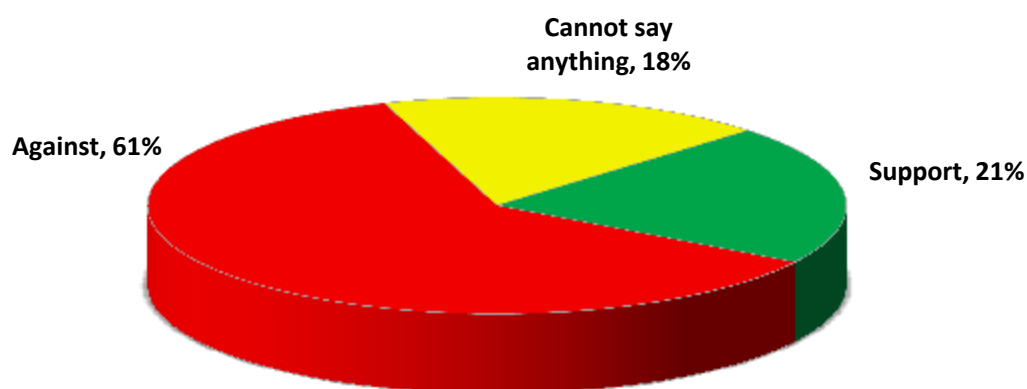

Question: Recently Sindh government has decided to end the policy of wearing uniforms in schools and colleges. Do you support this decision or are you against it?

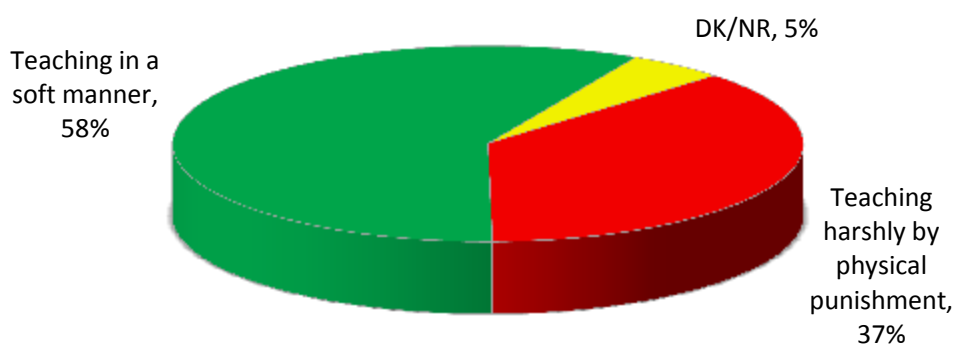

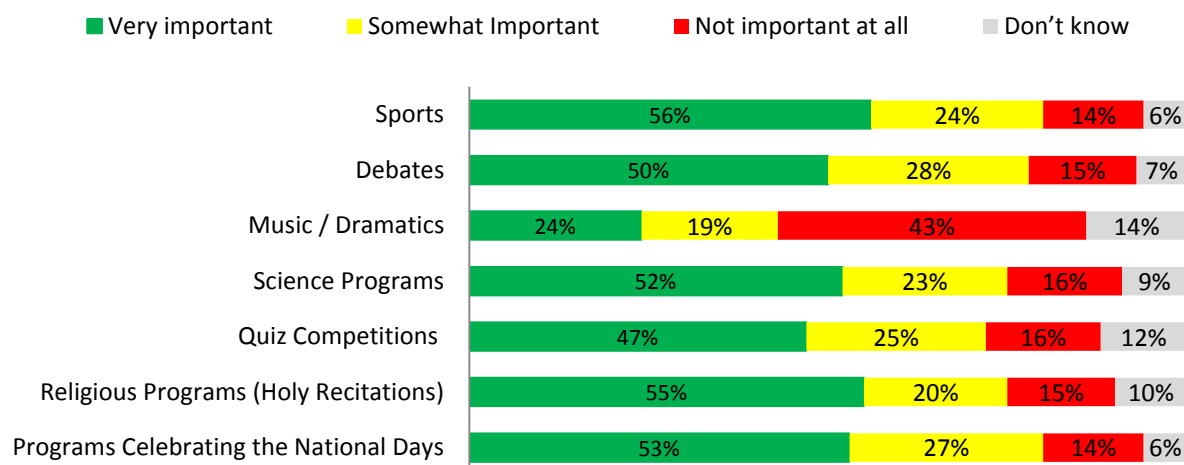

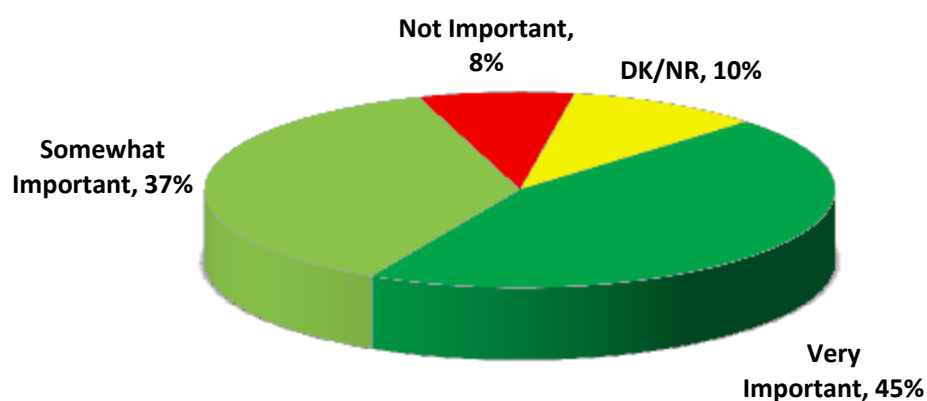

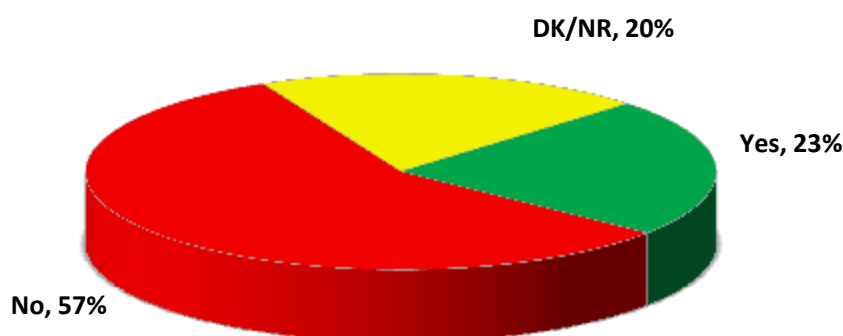

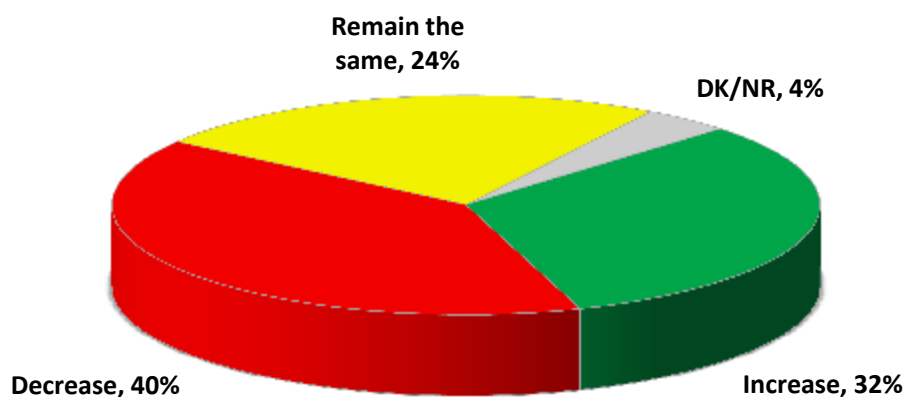

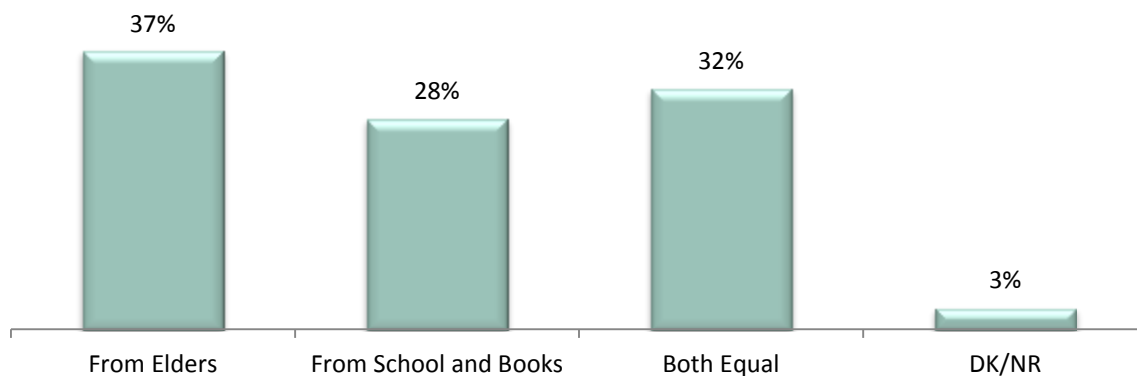

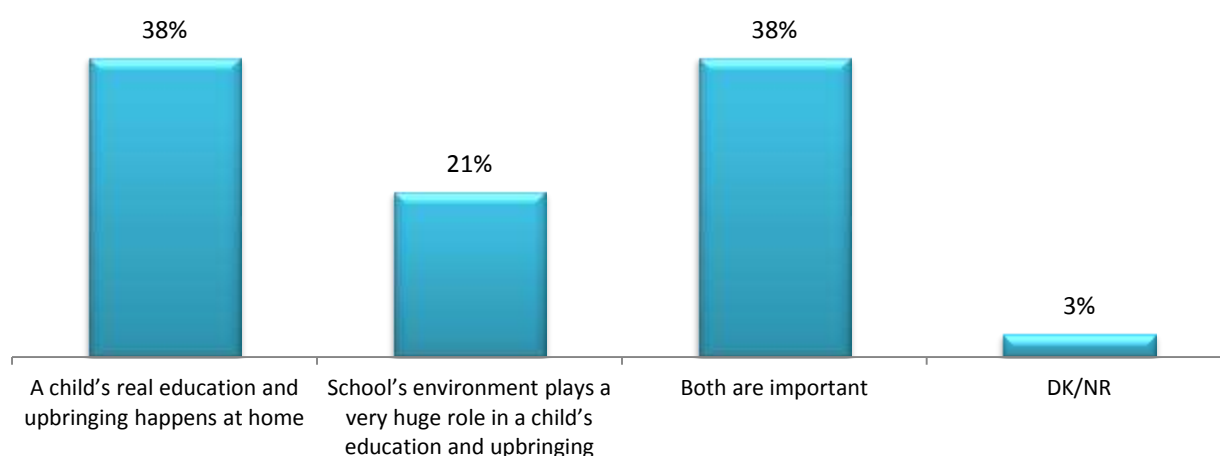

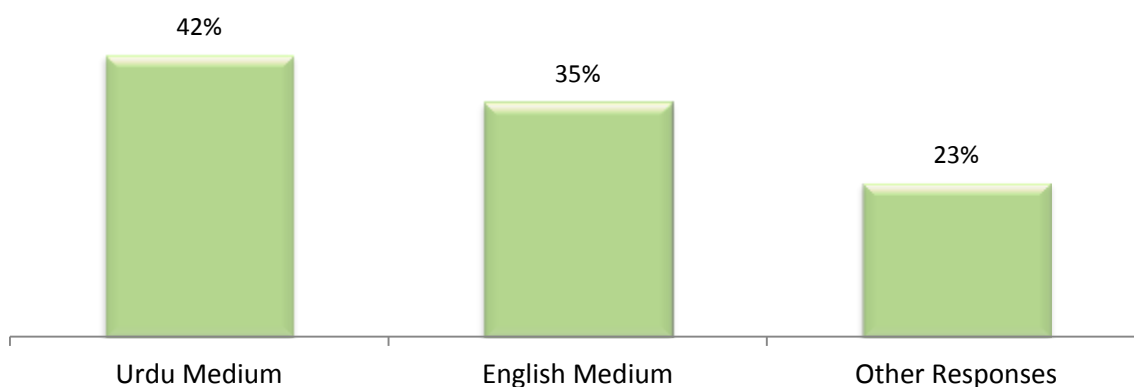

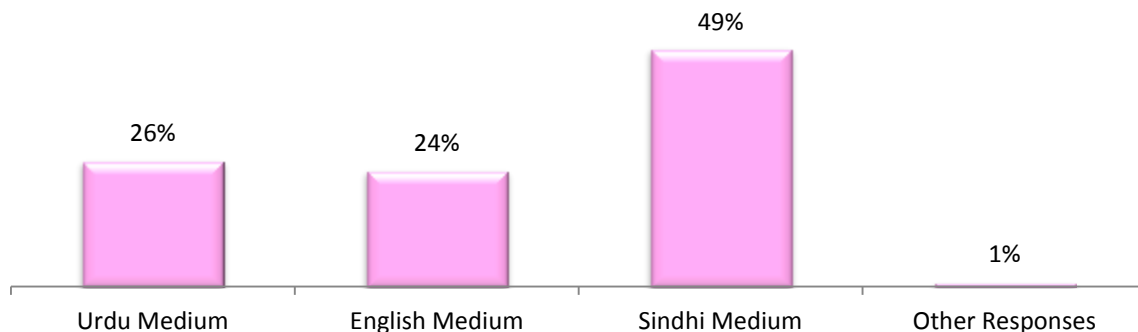

Question: Do you want your children to be educated in English medium or Urdu medium schools?

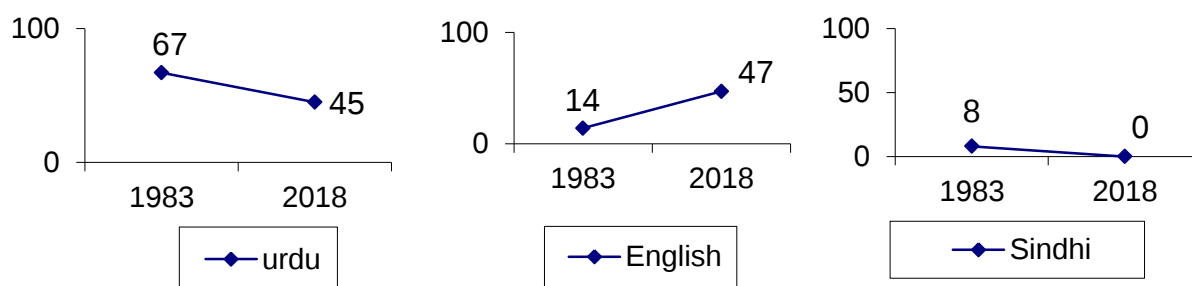

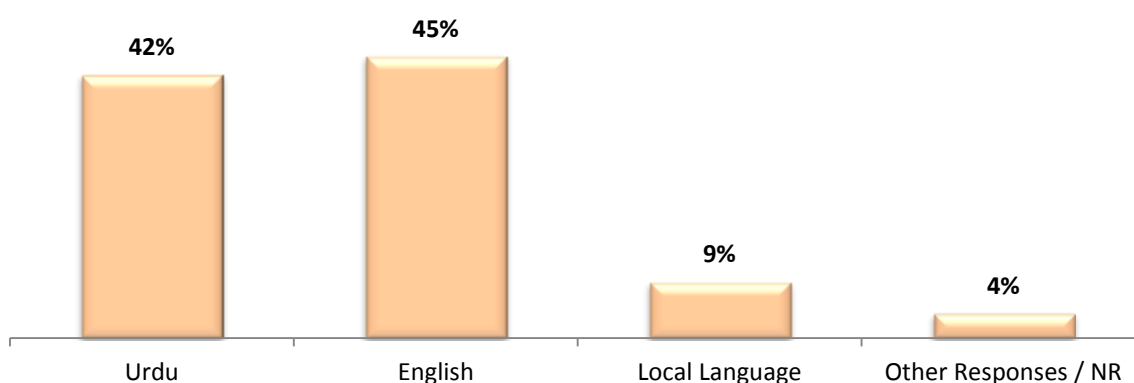

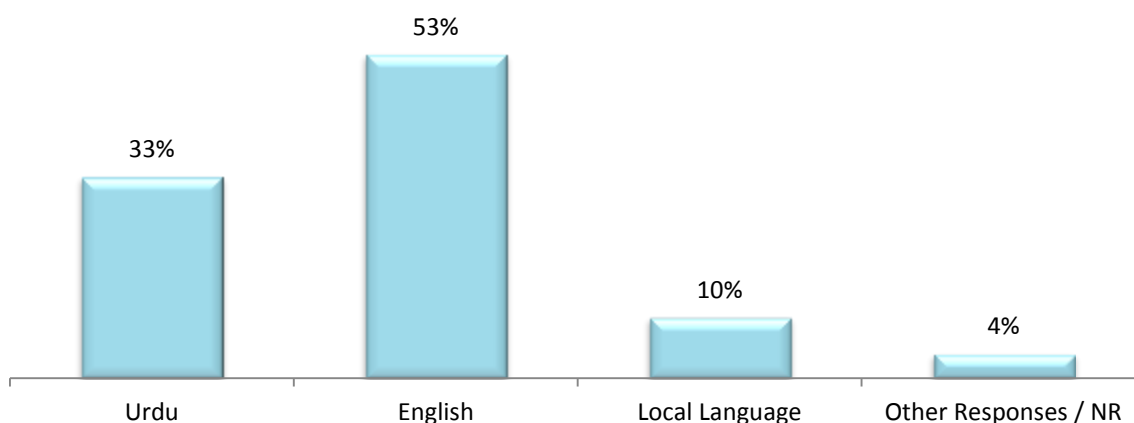

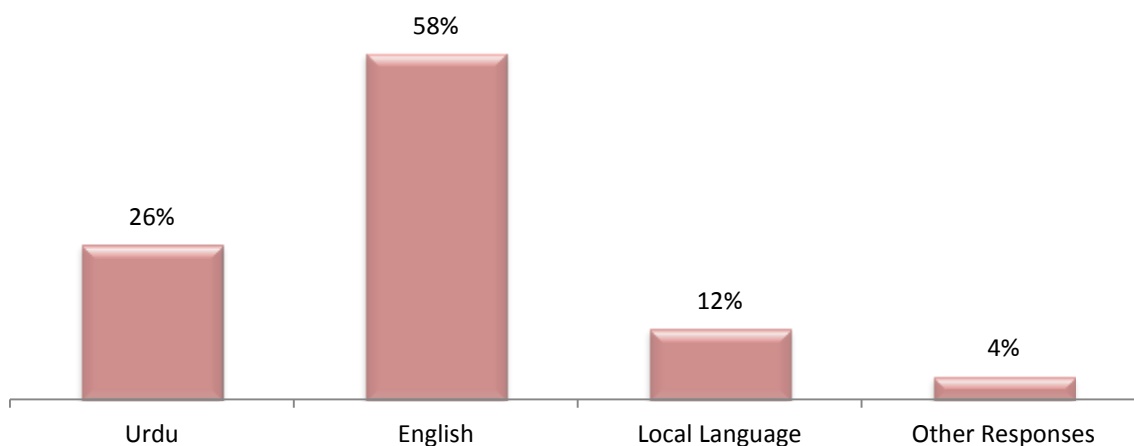

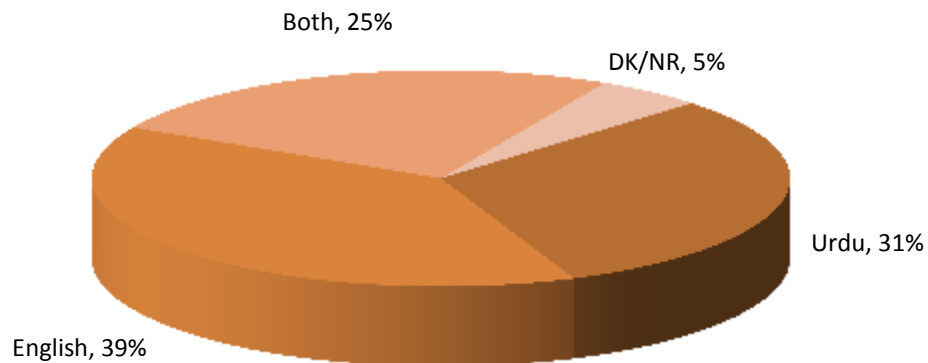

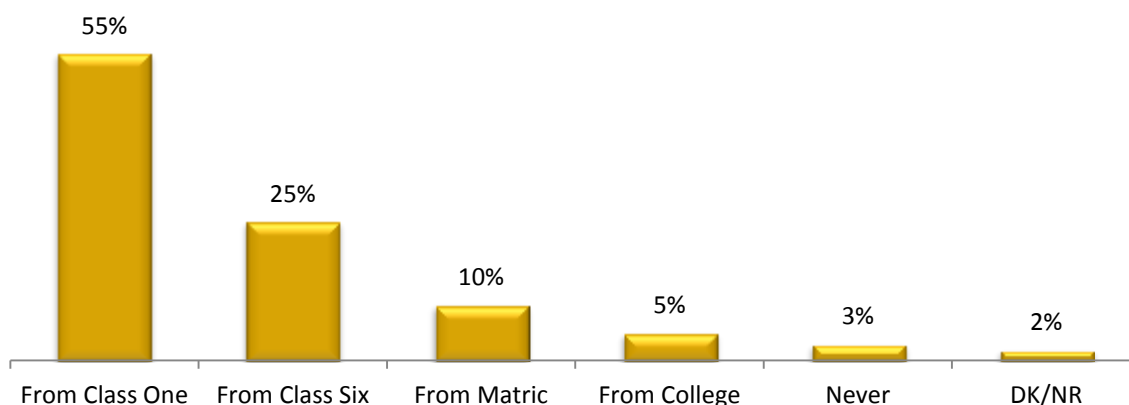

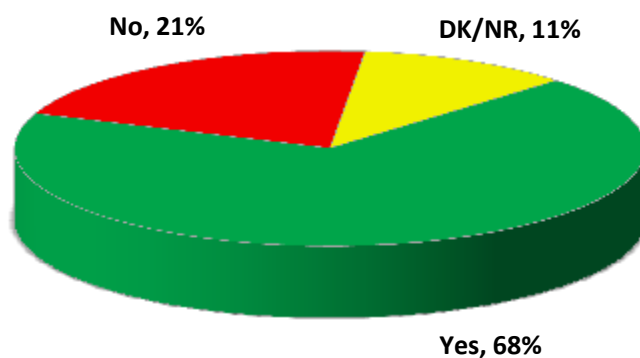

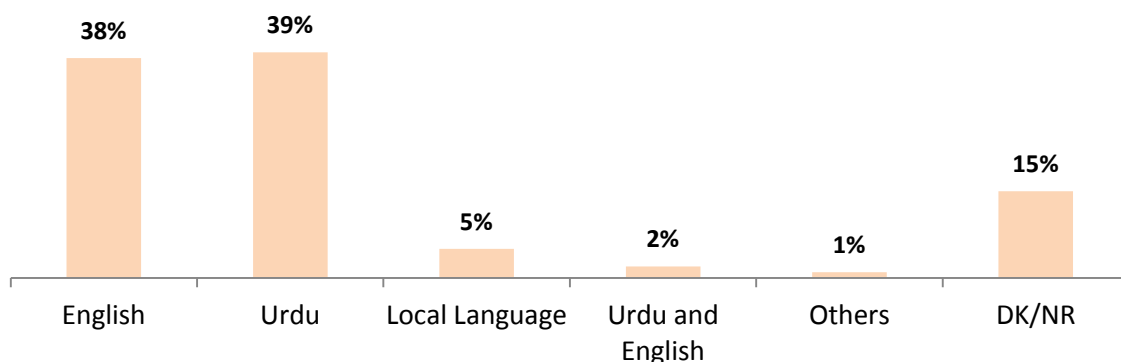

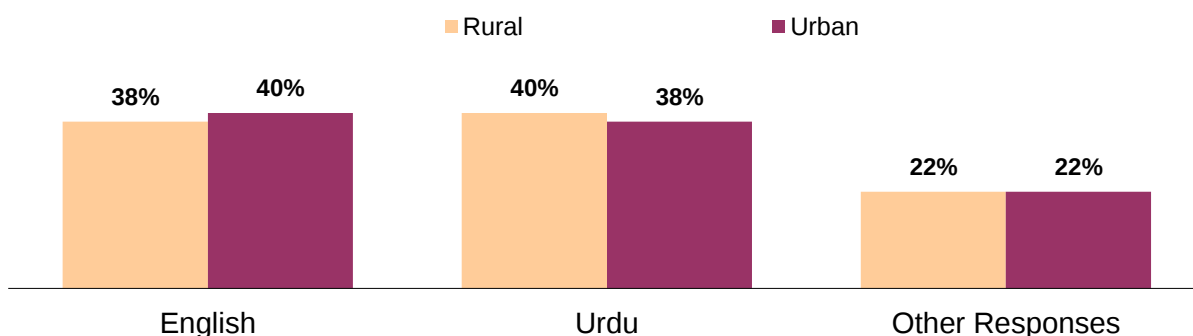
LANGUAGE OF CIVIL SERVICE EXEMINATION

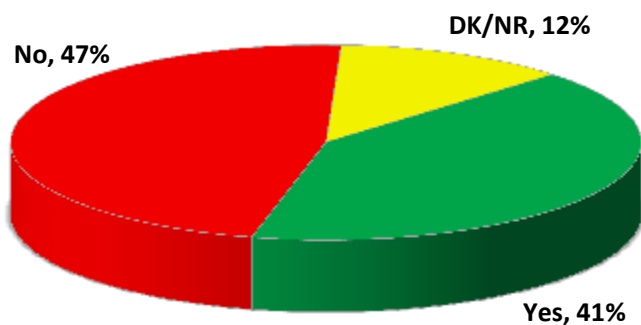

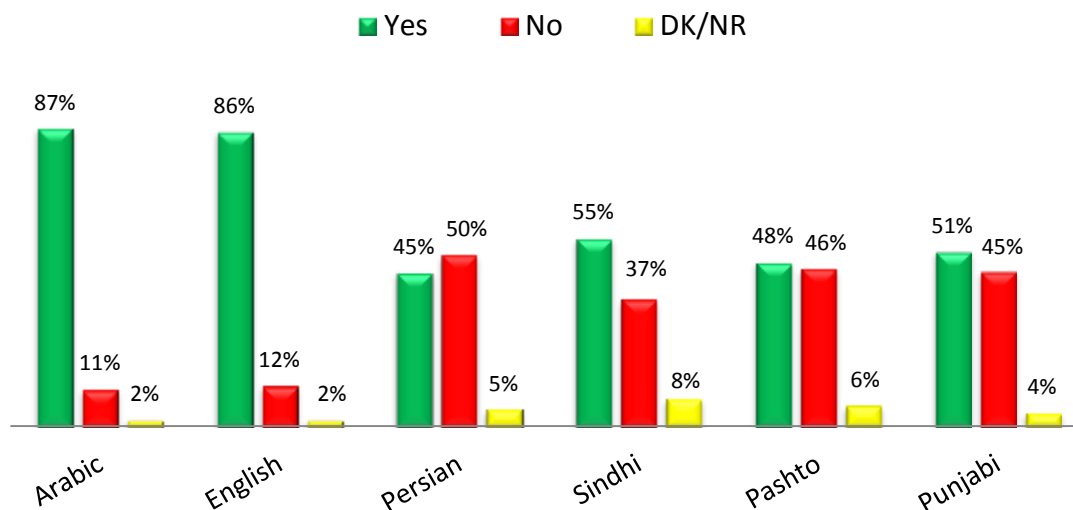

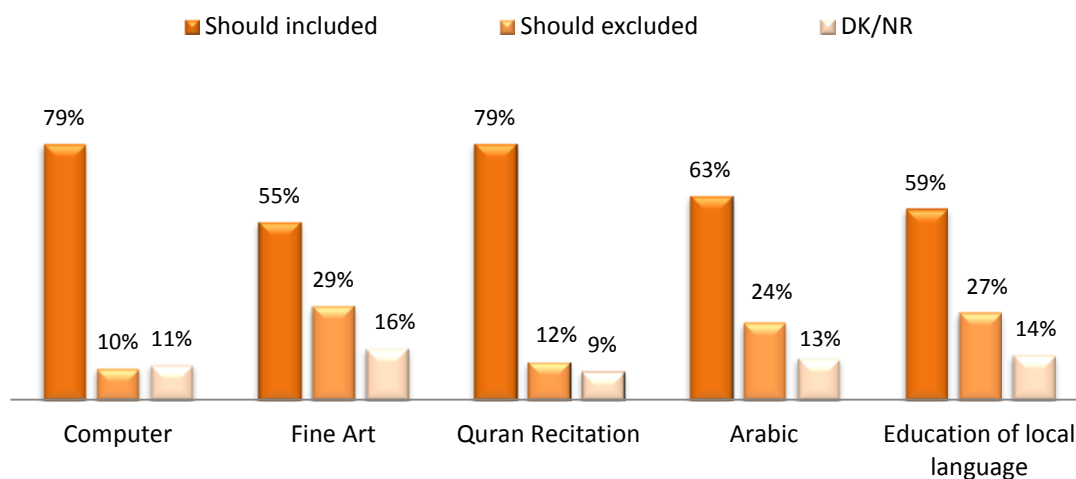

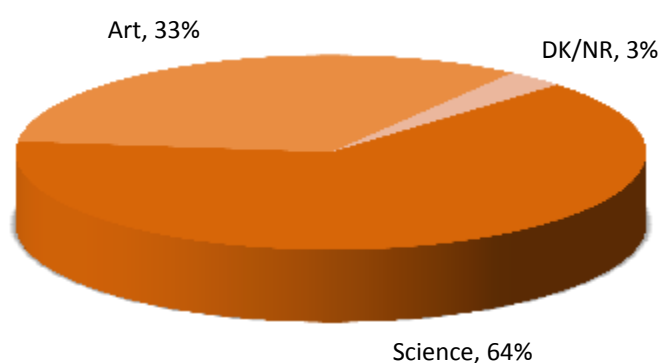

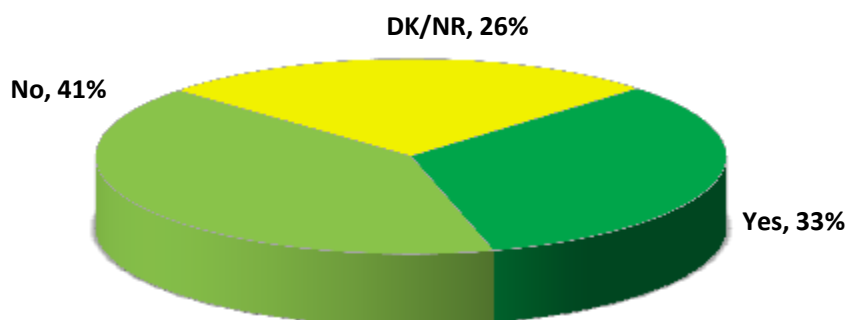

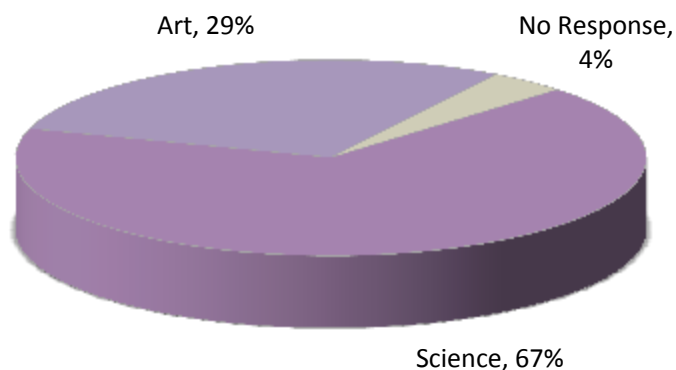

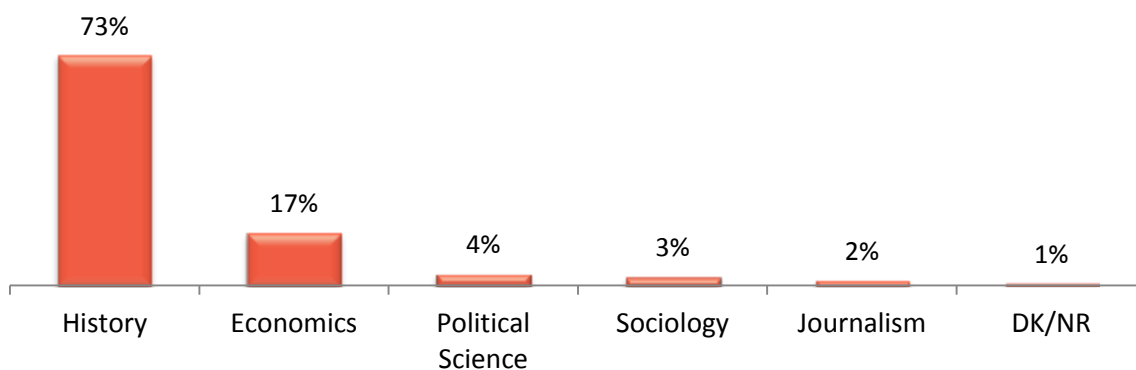

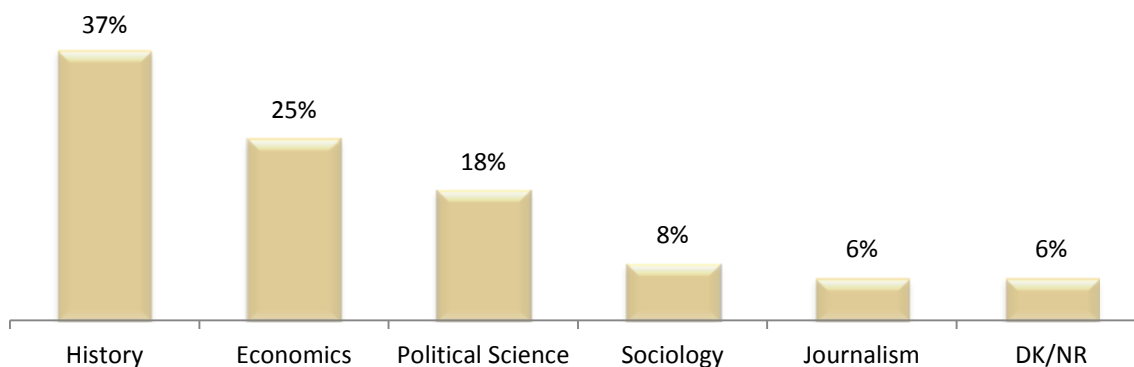

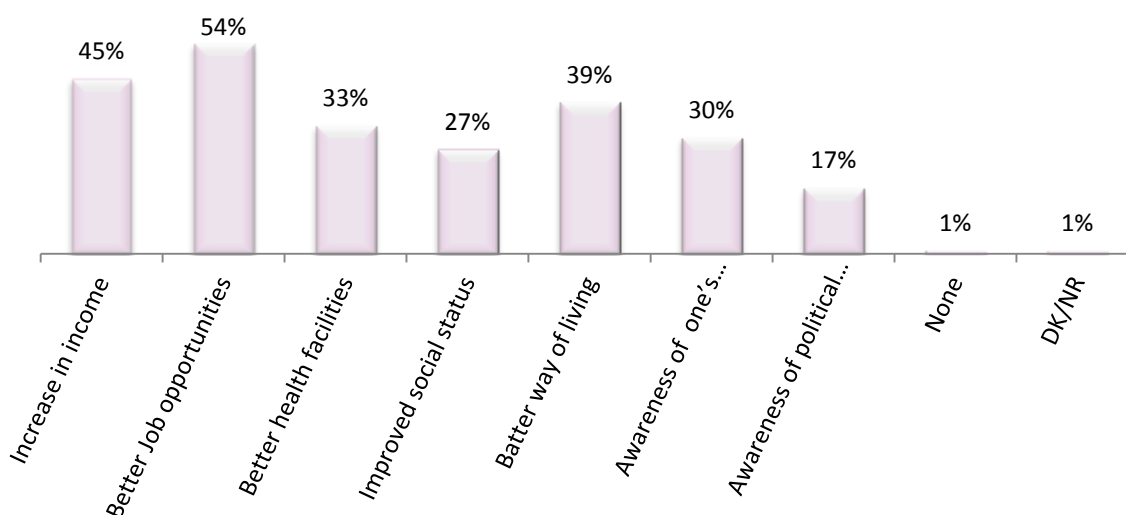

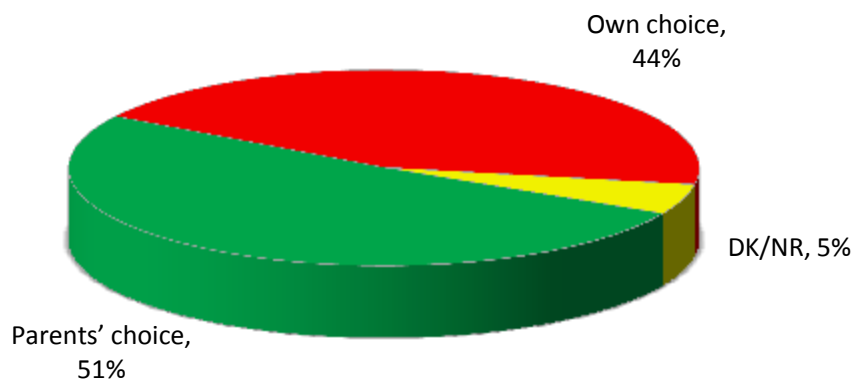

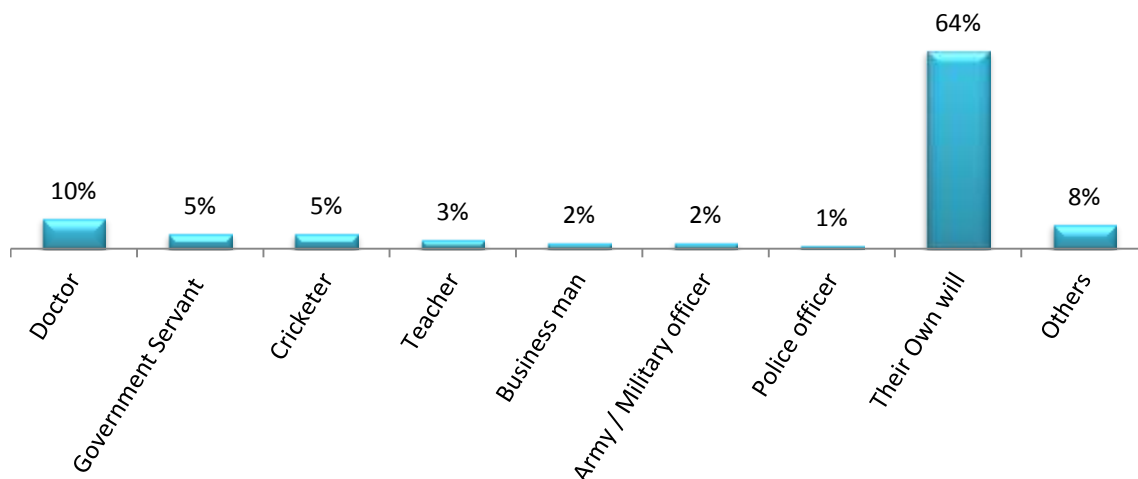

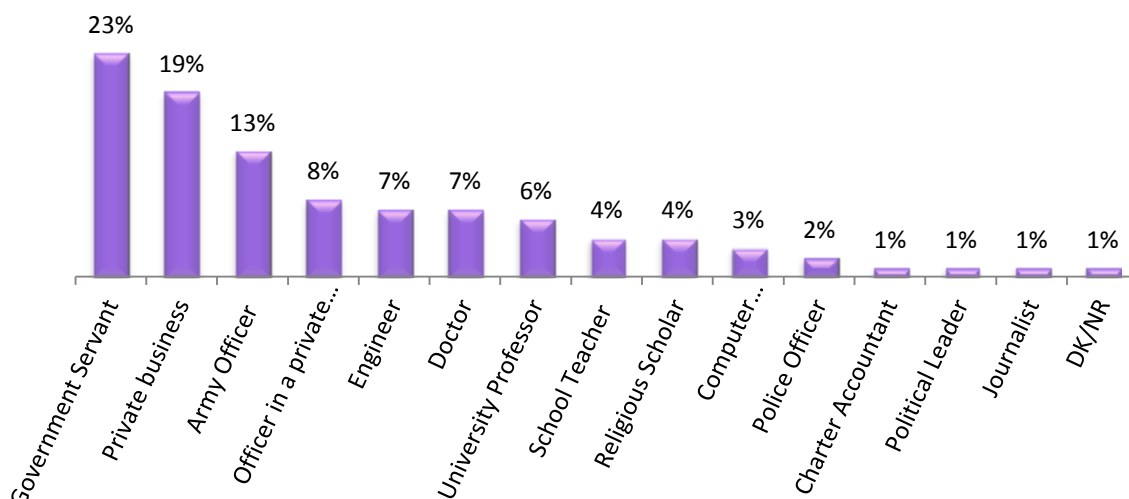

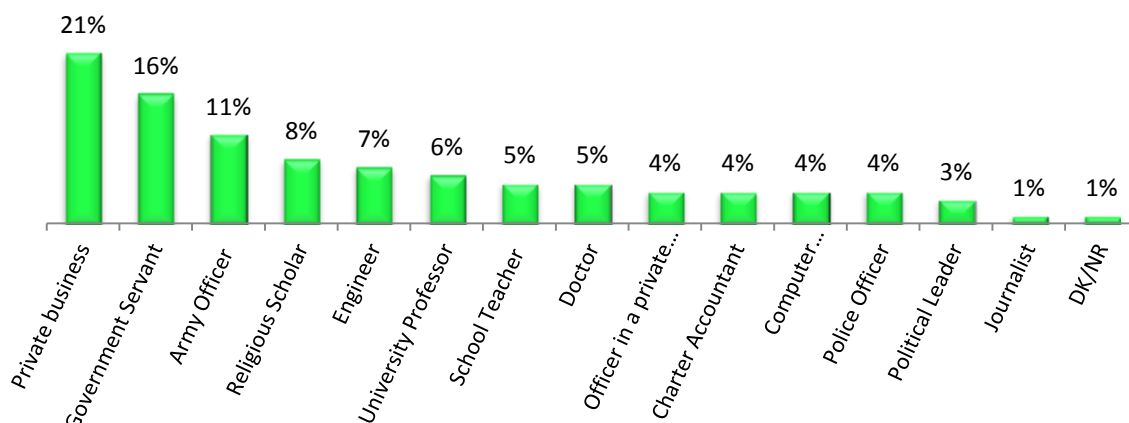

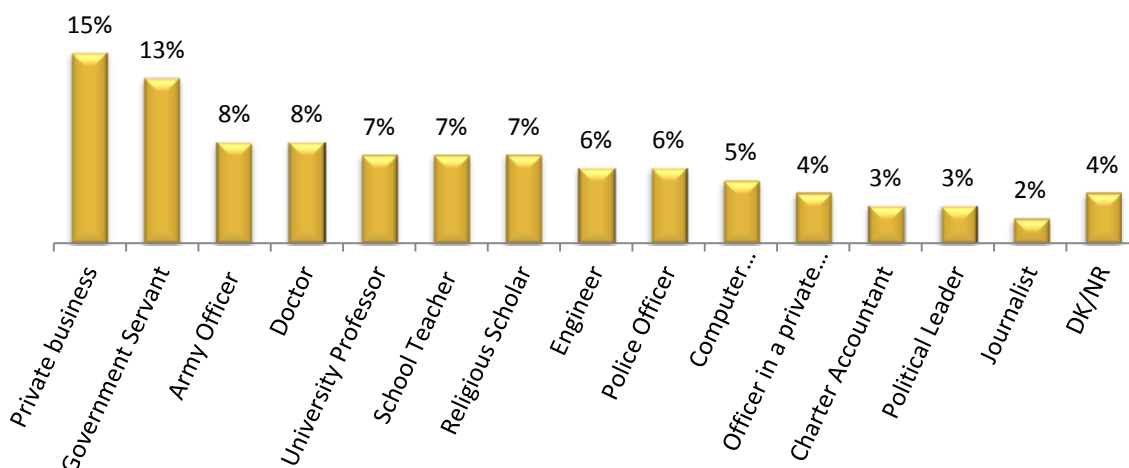

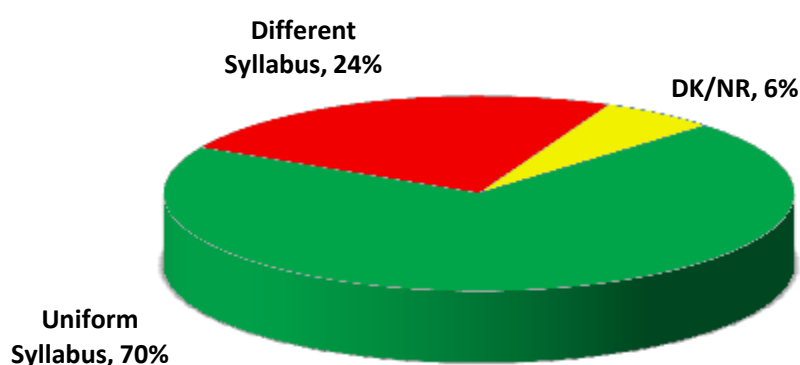

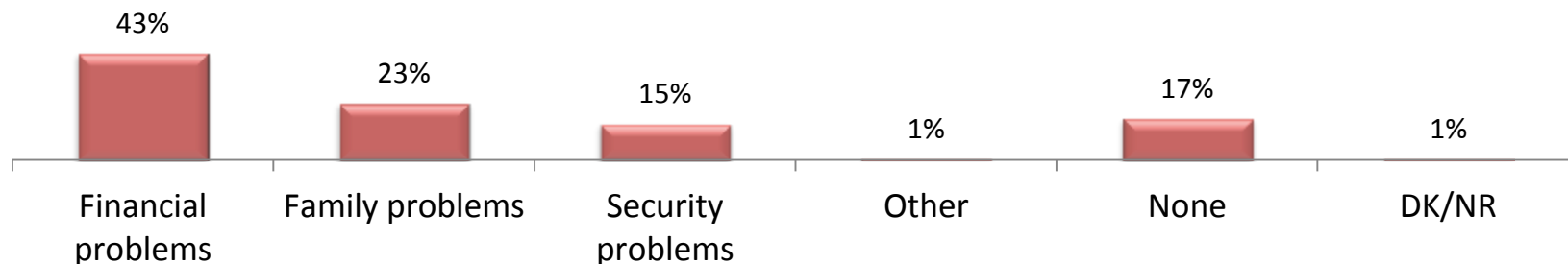

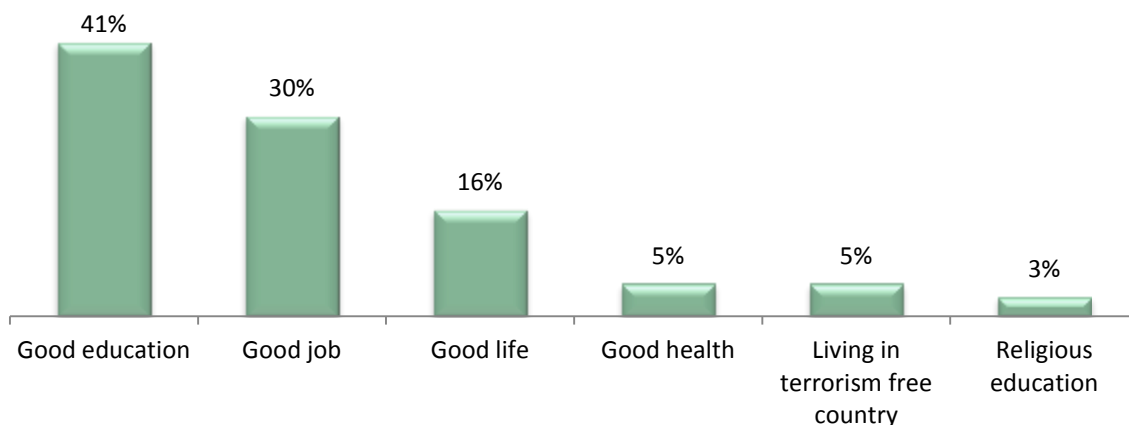

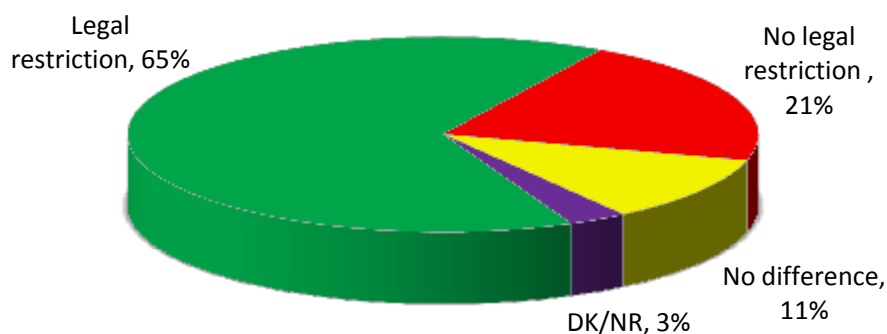

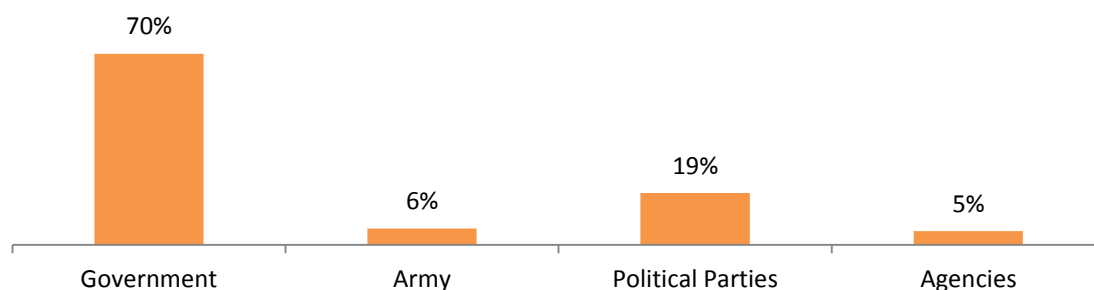

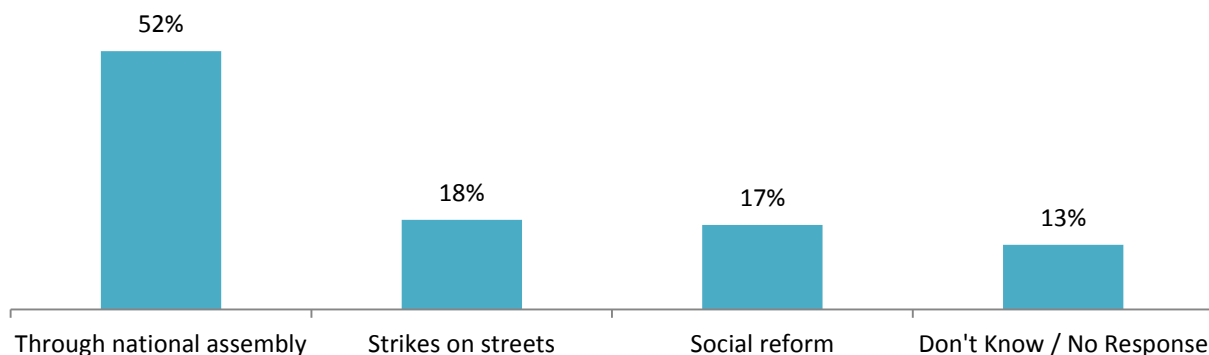

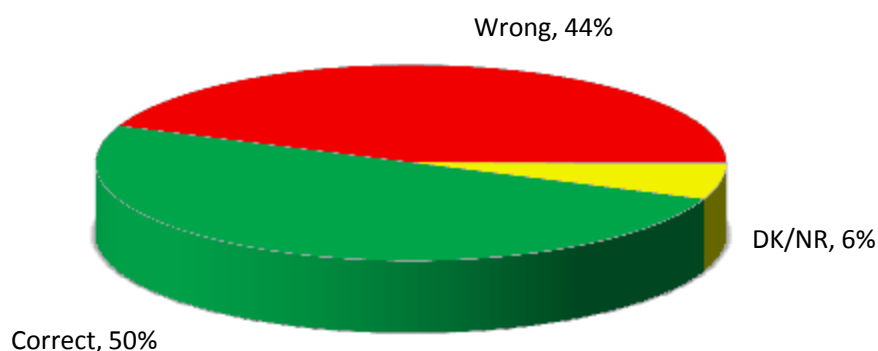

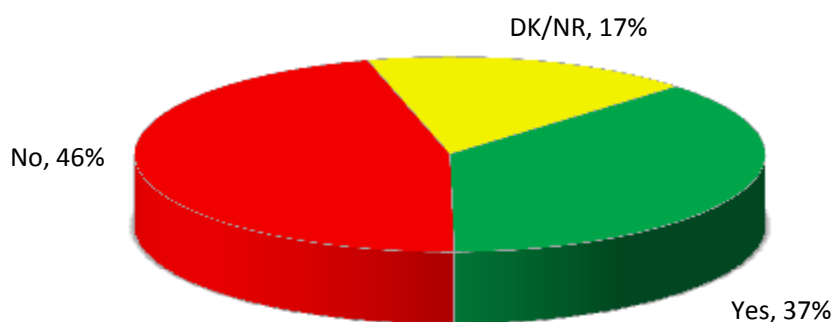

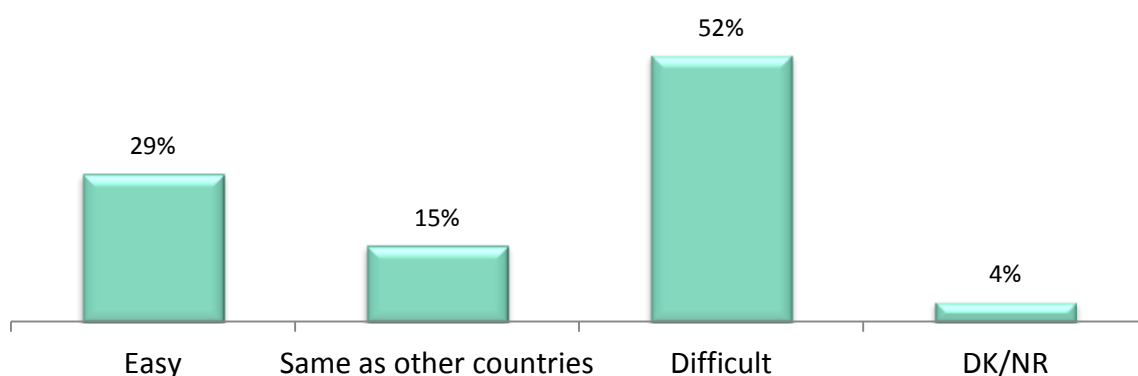

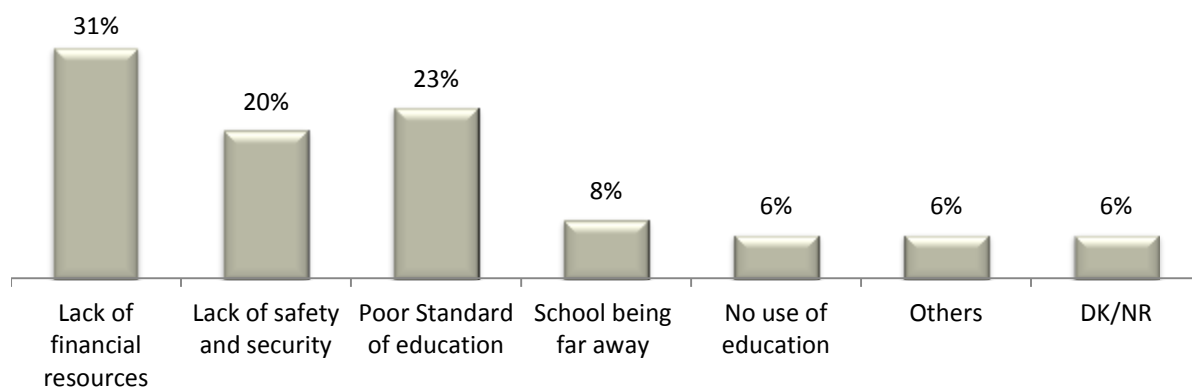

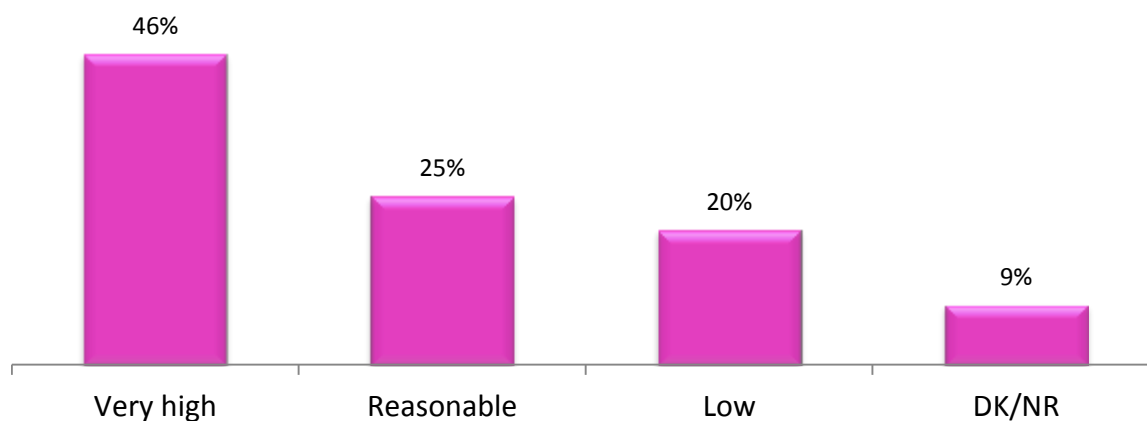

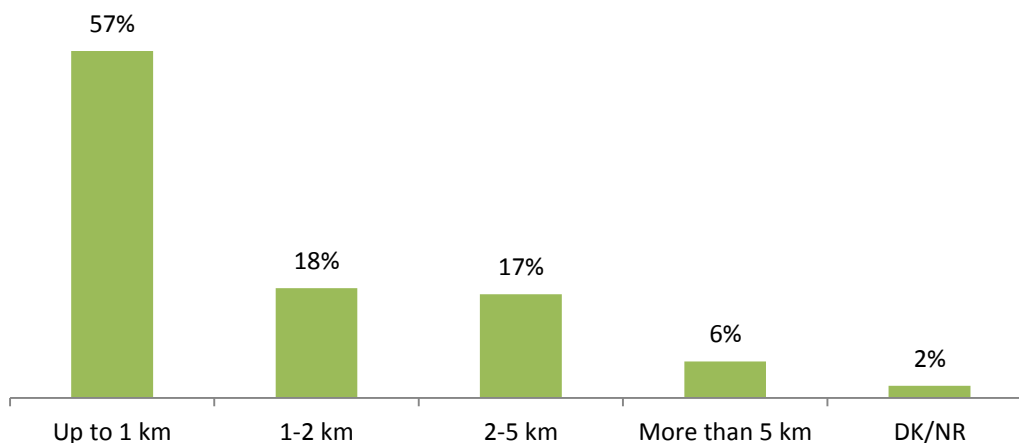

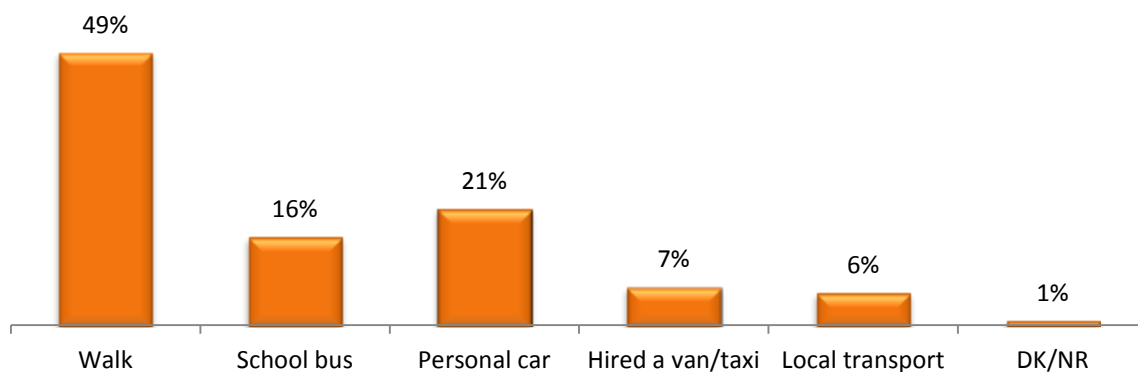

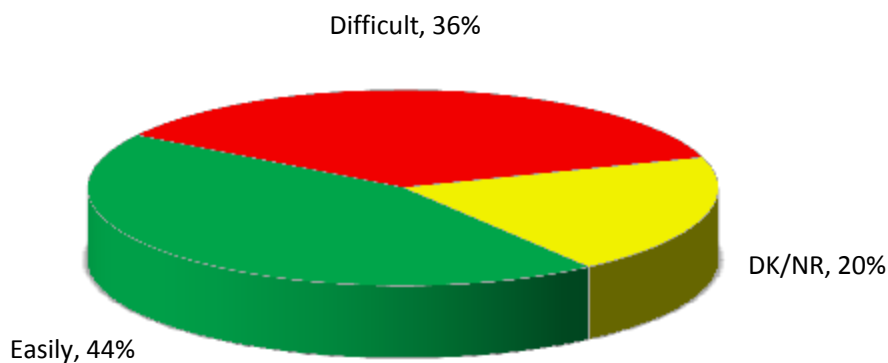

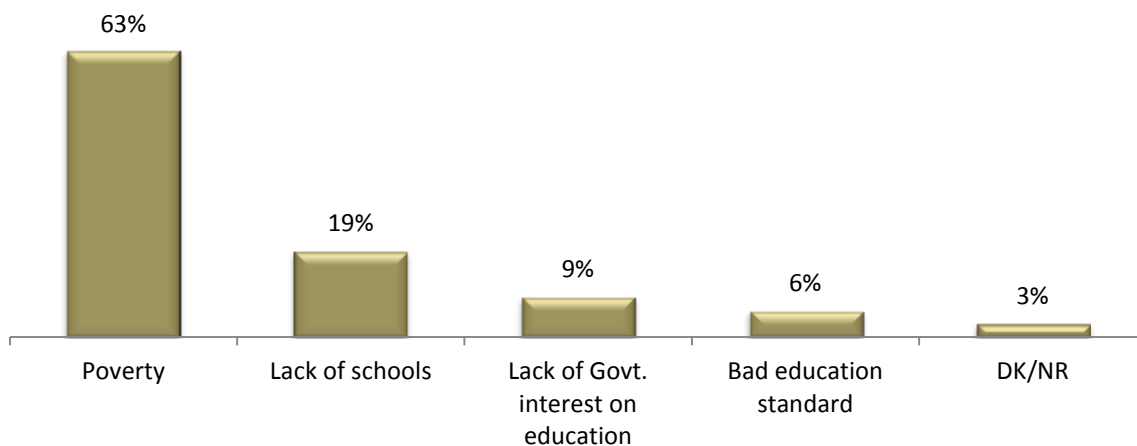

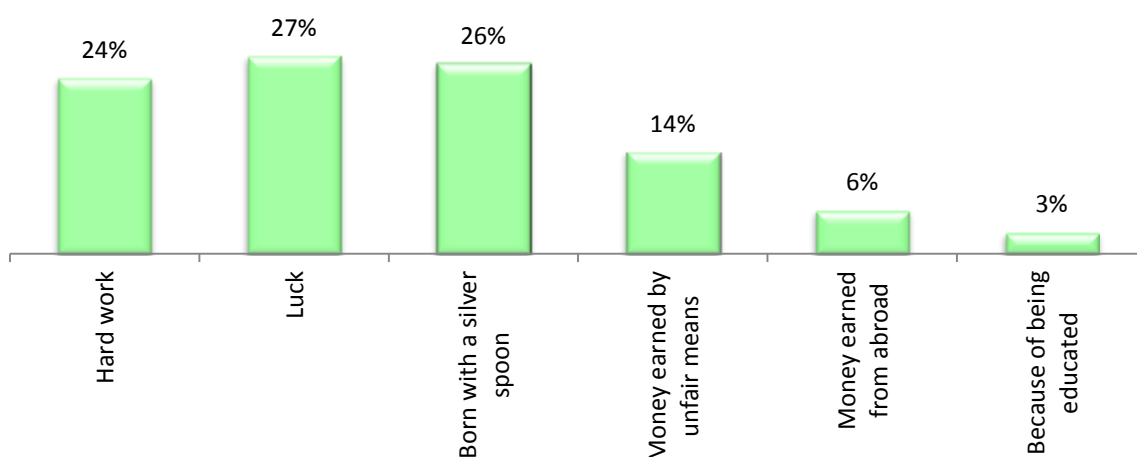

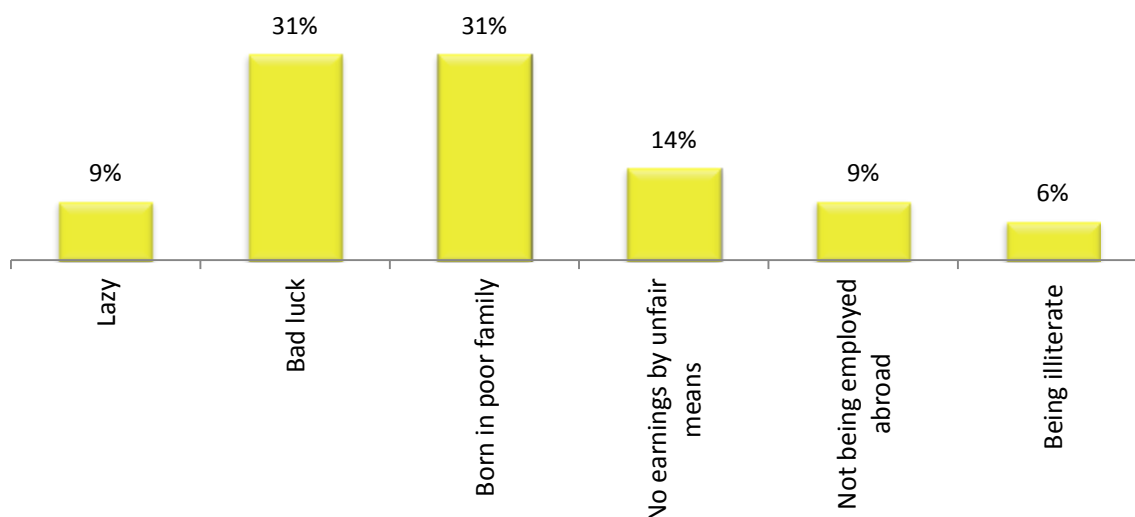

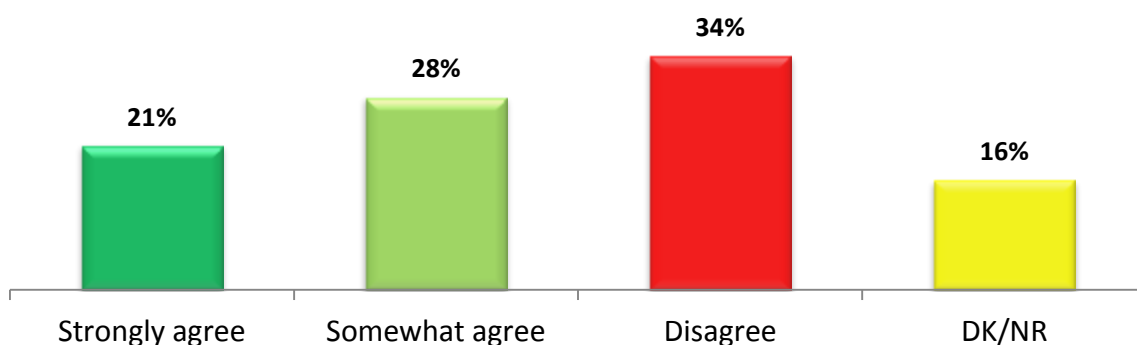

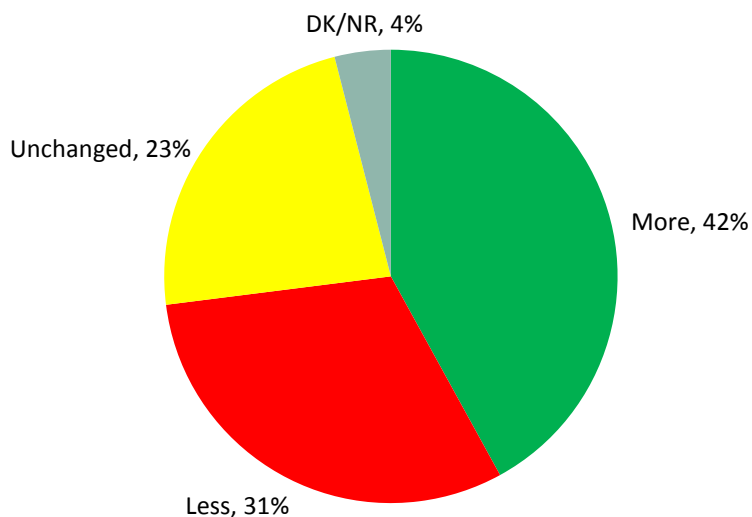

PROGRESS IN EDUCATION: Hope or Despair?

MIXED FEELINGS

When an average Pakistani is asked: What is Pakistan's highest achievement since 1947, the top response is "nuclear capability" followed by "progress in Education".

Yet when asked: What explains the success of the rich and wealthy, only 3% name "educational excellence". A majority attributes it to be "born with a silver spoon (26%) or luck (27%).

The poverty of the poor is also not explained by lack of education.

Nevertheless education is viewed as the highest desirable national goal, and a vehicle for positive change. THE FEELINGS ARE MIXED.

PROGRESS IN EDUCATION: HOPE OR DESPAIR?

MIXED FEELINGS

- **Question:** On a ranking of 1 to 10, 1 being the lowest and 10 being the highest, **educational progress** was rated as 5 among the performance in different fields in Pakistan.

METHODOLOGY

METHODOLOGY

The results presented here are from multiple *nationwide house hold surveys* carried out by Gallup and Gilani over the last three eight decades (1980-2018)

- **SAMPLE PROFILE:**

The respondents in these surveys range from *1000-2500 men and women of age 18 years and above* spread across the *rural and urban* areas of the *four provinces* of the country. They represent different age groups, education status and socio economic profile

- **INTERVIEWING MODE:**

Face to Face, in-house interviews

- **SAMPLING METHODOLOGY:**

Multi-stage area probability sampling

- **SAMPLING TOLERANCE:**

Error margin is estimated to be $\pm 2-3\%$ at 95% Confidence level

- **WEIGHTING:**

The data have been weighted to correspond with census distribution of population for the rural and urban areas of all four provinces.

- **SURVEY DATES:**

The respective year in which these surveys were carried out has been mentioned at the bottom of all charts and tables.

- **VALUES/ PERCENTAGES:**

All values given in this report are percentages unless otherwise specified.

• **NOTE ON COMPARATIVE SECTIONS:**

Caution should be taken in interpreting results in comparative sections of the report. The purpose of having comparative data is to show a broad trend in timeline rather than providing a statistical difference in opinions. This caution is based on following major considerations:

- The exact question wordings may vary across the years where comparison is drawn
- The methodology and sample size may vary
- The timeline is not uniform, we have provided data at two or more points in time as available.

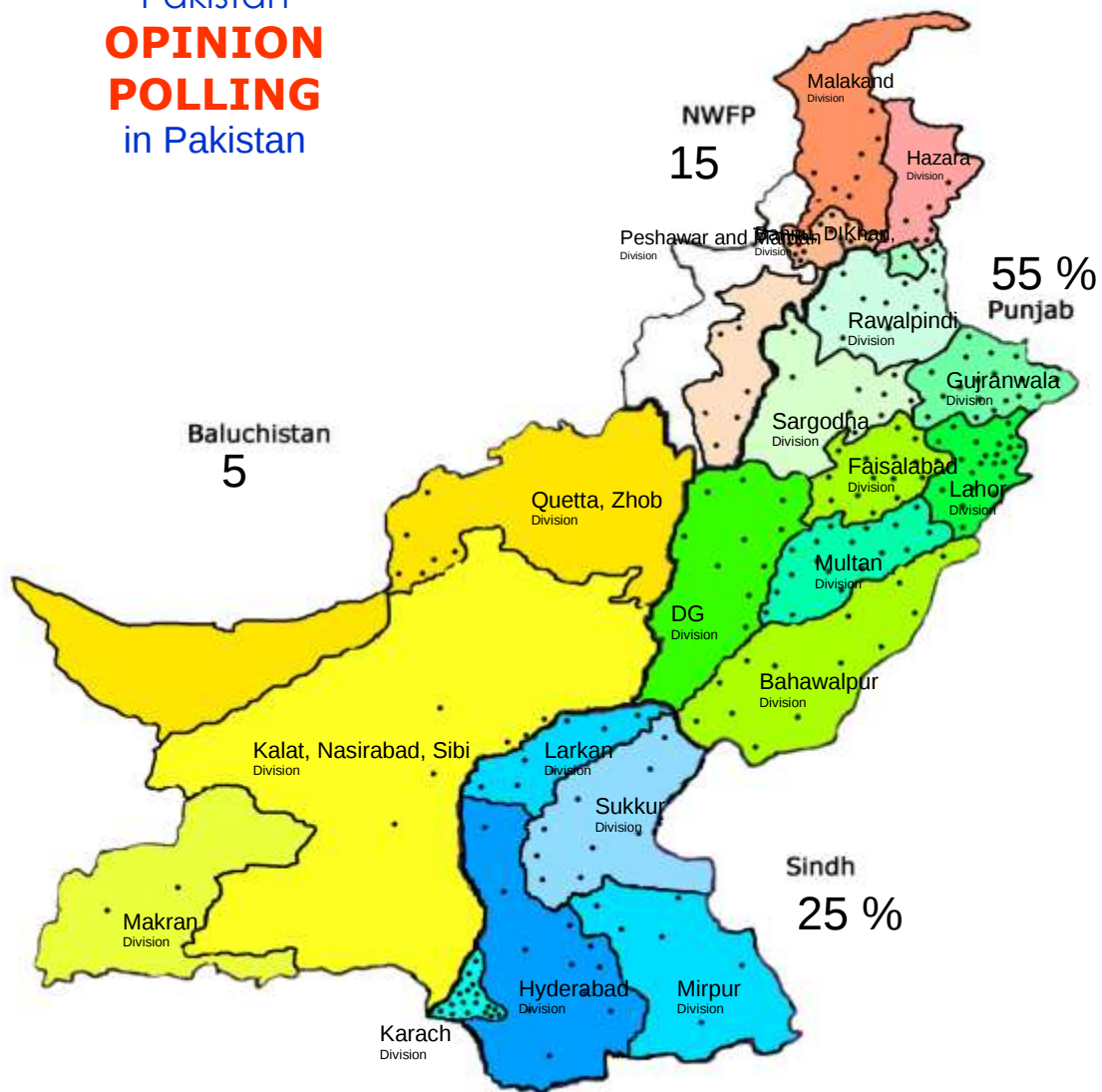
