In past two decades, only once proportion of urban respondents reporting to have sacrificed over Eid was lower than rural respondents, 2023 was worst year in terms of respondents reporting sacrificing animals: Gallup & Gilani Pakistan

(Islamabad) 11th September, 2024

According to a survey conducted by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, more than half of rural Pakistanis (58%) sacrificed an animal this Eid al-Adha or had someone from their household make the sacrifice. Over 2 decades, a majority of both urban and rural population (50%) had made the sacrifice, except in 2023. A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the country was asked the question, "Please tell me, did you or anyone in your household sacrifice an animal this Eid al-Adha?" In response this year, 58% of rural residents and 46% of urban residents said 'Yes, while 42% and 54%, respectively, said 'No'.

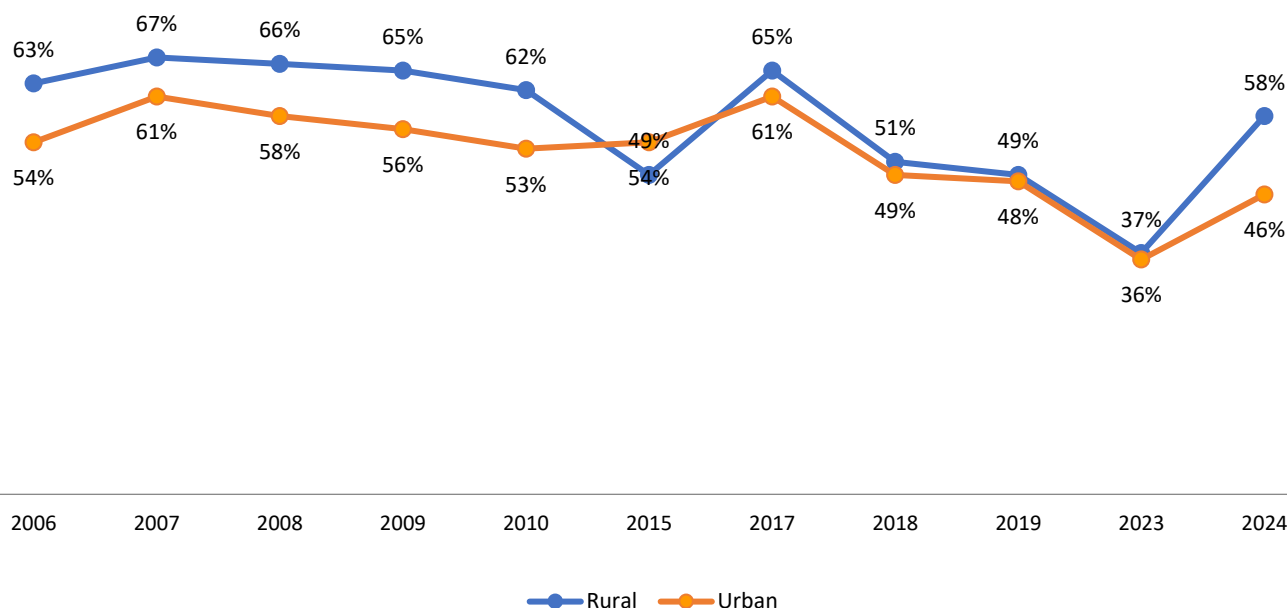
Comparative Picture: In 2024, more than half (58%) of rural residents reported that either they or someone in their household sacrificed an animal for Eid al-Adha. Conversely, only 46% of urban residents reported performing an animal sacrifice, while 42% and 54% respectively, indicated that they had not. Overall, this highlights a significant difference of 12% between rural and urban practices of having performed the ritual on Eid al-Adha.

Trend Analysis: From 2004 to 2010, the proportion of rural adults sacrificing an animal during Eid al-Adha remained largely stable, fluctuating by about 5%. This rate dropped by 10% in 2015 but rebounded with a 19% increase to 58% in 2024. In contrast, urban residents showed a stable trend with only a 2% variation from 2004 to 2017, but a 10% increase in animal sacrifice between 2023 and 2024 was witnessed. Between 2006 and 2023, the gap between rural and urban respondents reporting qurbani narrowed showing narrowing income differentials in urban and rural areas. Only once in two decades rural respondents reporting sacrificing animal was higher than urban ones.

This press release has been made as part of the Gallup Pakistan History Project which aims to release historical empirical polling data to wider audiences. The objective is to sustain and encourage empirical decision-making in Pakistan.

The study in Pakistan was conducted and released by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 769 men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, conducted from 28th June - 10th July 2024. The error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at the 95% confidence level. The methodology used for data collection was telephonic surveys (CATI).
