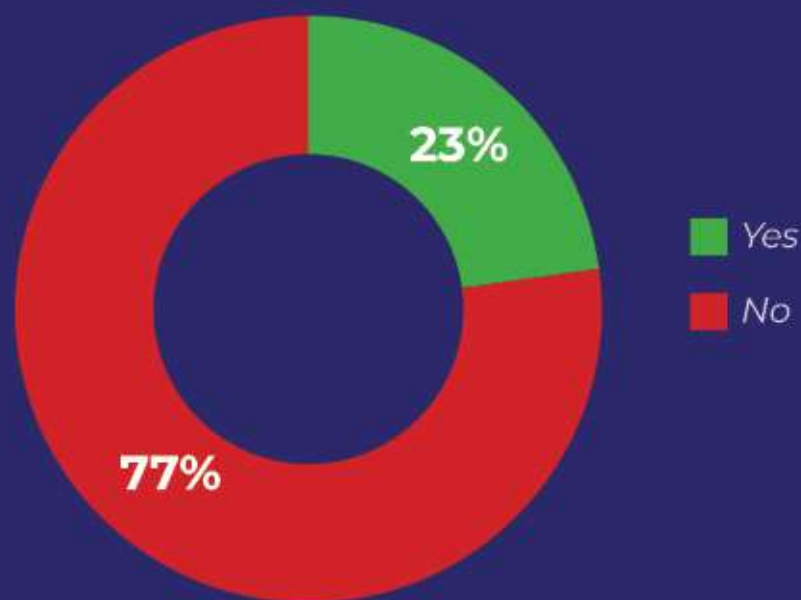


Almost 1 in 4 (23%) Pakistani parents reported their child having a habit of thumb-sucking

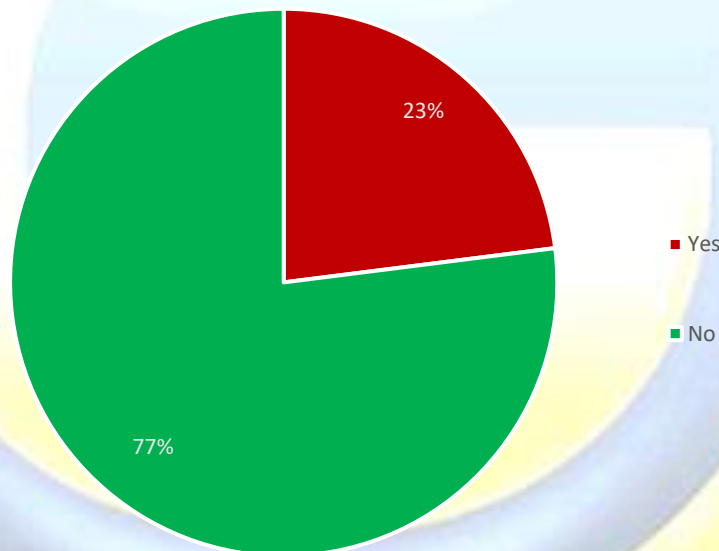
Almost 1 in 4 (23%) Pakistani parents reported their child having a habit of thumb-sucking, with no significant difference found across urban-rural households: Gallup & Gilani Pakistan

(Islamabad) 4th November, 2024

According to a survey conducted by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, almost 1 in 4 (23%) Pakistani parents reported their child having a habit of thumb-sucking. A deeper analysis revealed that there was no significant difference in urban and rural children (rural 23%, urban 22%).

A nationally representative sample of married adult men and women who have children under five years of age from across the country was asked the question, “Please tell me if your child has a habit of sucking his/her thumb?” In response, 23% said ‘Yes’, while 77% said ‘No’.

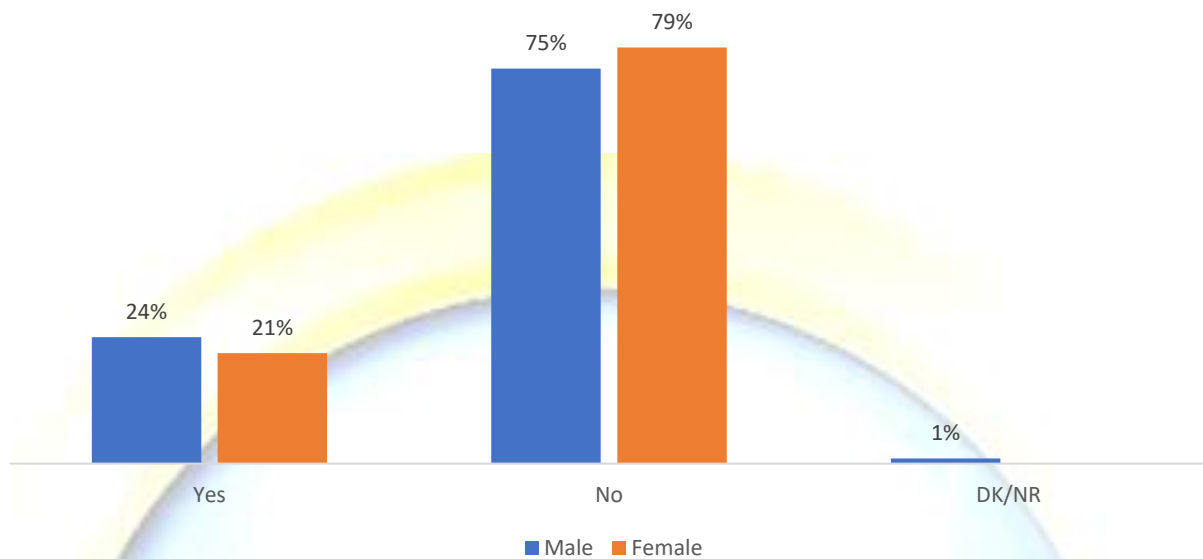
Question: Please tell me if your child has a habit of sucking his/her thumb?

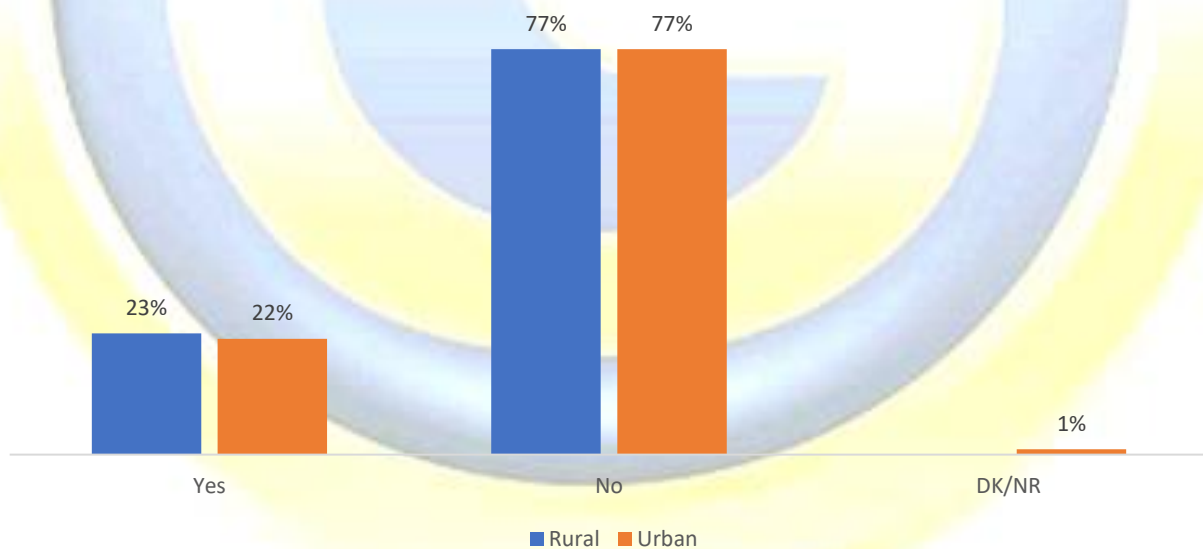
The study in Pakistan was conducted and released by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 612 married men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, conducted from 12th September - 11th October 2024. The error margin is estimated to be approximately ± 2 -3 percent at the 95% confidence level. The methodology used for data collection was telephonic surveys (CATI).

Across gender: A 3% higher proportion of male parents than female parents reported thumb-sucking habit in their children.
