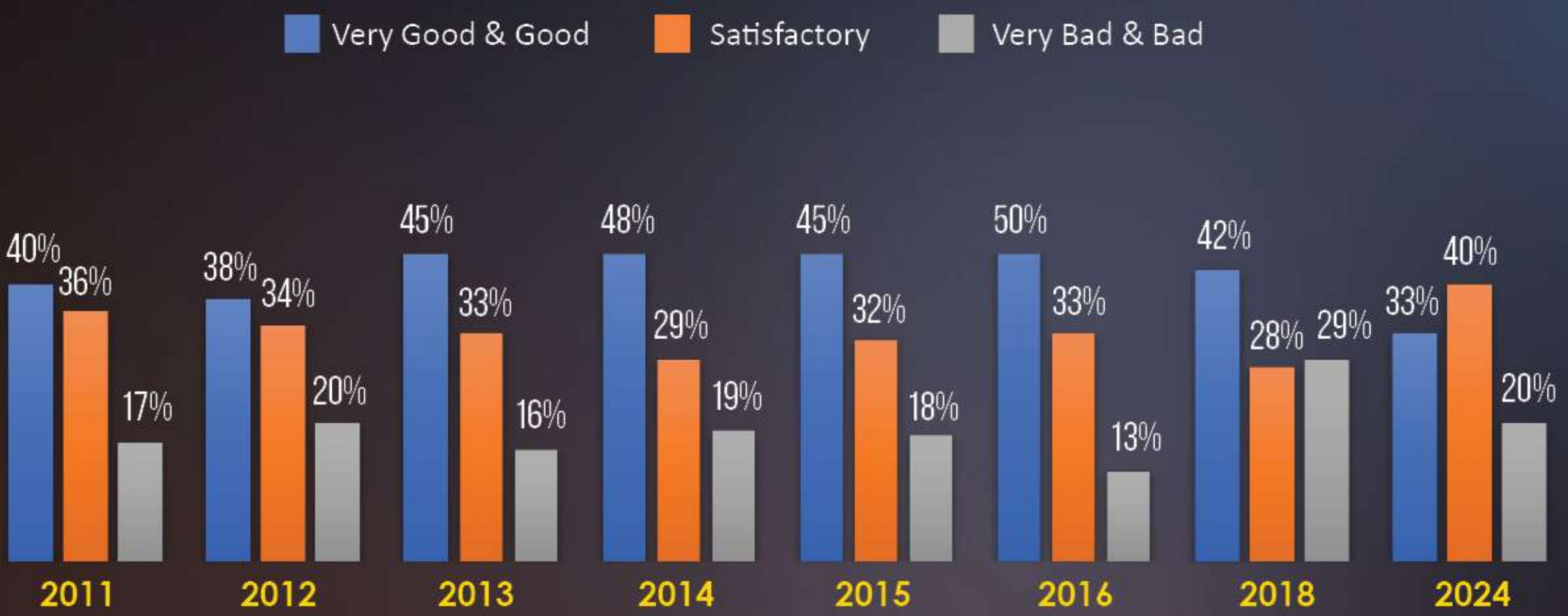


1 in 3 Pakistanis (33%) view performance of educational institutions as good; 40% rate them as satisfactory

1 in 3 Pakistanis (33%) view performance of educational institutions as good; 40% rate them as satisfactory (Gallup & Gilani History Project Findings)

(Islamabad) 6th November, 2024

The Gallup & Gilani survey revealed that confidence in educational institutions is declining, with only 11% of respondents rating them as very good and 22% as good in 2024. For over a decade, Gallup has been asking nationally representative samples of adult men and women the following question: "Please let us know what your opinions on the performance of educational institutions over the past year are. Do you think their performance has been very good, good, satisfactory, bad, or very bad?"

Comparative Picture: In 2024, 11% of survey respondents rated the performance as very good, 22% as good, 40% as satisfactory, 12% as bad, and 8% as very bad. 7% of respondents did not respond to the question.

Trend Analysis: The survey data shows changes in public opinion about educational institutions over the years. In 2011, 12% rated their performance as very good, 28% as good, 36% as satisfactory, 12% as bad, and 5% as very bad, with 8% not responding.

In 2012, the ratings remained similar, with 12% very good, 26% good, 34% satisfactory, 13% bad, and 7% very bad. In 2013, 14% rated as very good, 31% as good, 33% as satisfactory, 12% as bad, and 4% as very bad. By 2014, 15% rated it very good, 30% good, 32% satisfactory, 14% bad, and 4% very bad. The trend peaked in 2016, with 19% rating as very good, 31% as good, 33% satisfactory, 10% bad, and 3% very bad. However, in 2018, the ratings shifted again, with 12% rating very good, 30% good, 28% satisfactory, 20% bad, and 9% very bad. By 2024, the figures indicated a further decline, with 11% rating as very good, 22% as good, 40% satisfactory, 12% bad, and 8% very bad.

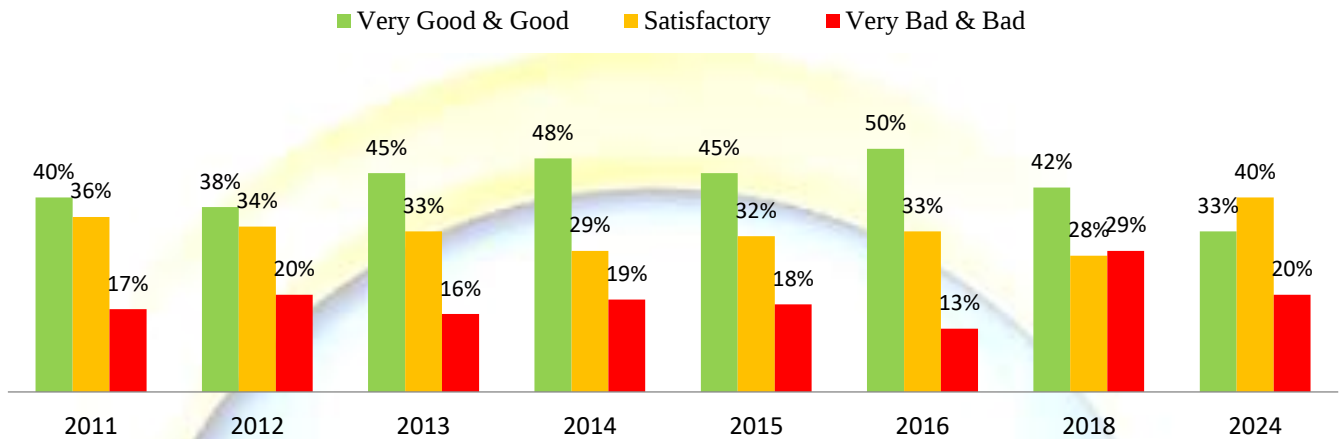
Overall, the data reflects fluctuating perceptions of educational institutions, with a notable peak in positive ratings in 2016 and a decline in public sentiment by 2024.

The following graph illustrates the merged perceptions of educational institutions, categorizing responses into three groups: good (combining 'very good' and 'good'), satisfactory, and bad (combining 'very bad' and 'bad'). This simplification allows for a clearer view of overall trends in public opinion over the years.

The study in Pakistan was conducted and released by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 769 men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, conducted from 28th June - 10th July 2024. The error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at the 95% confidence level. The methodology used for data collection was telephonic surveys (CATI).
