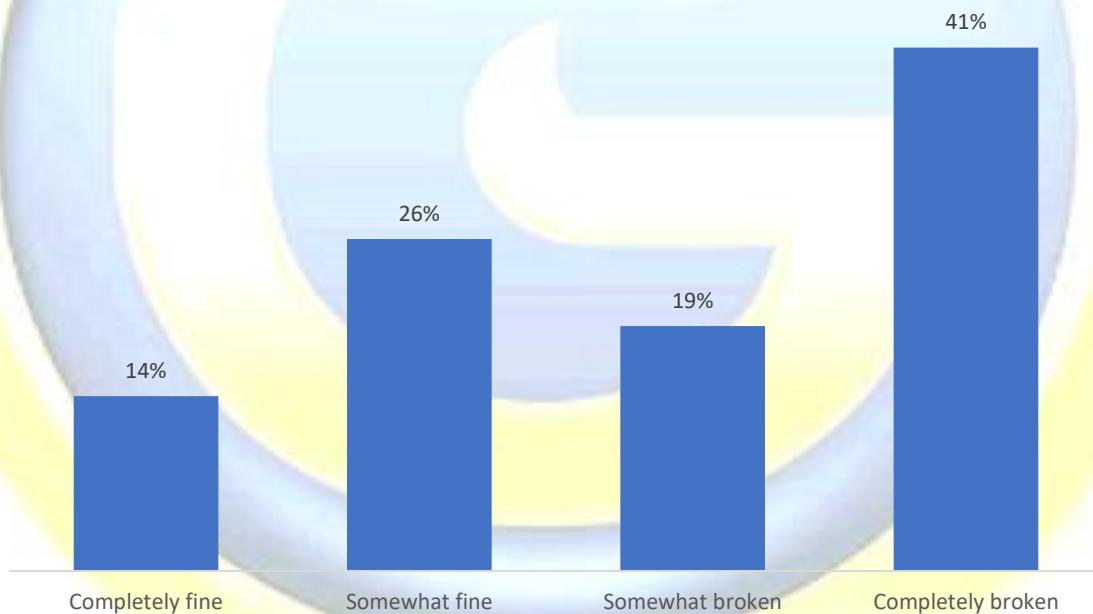
More than two-fifths Pakistanis (41%) report that the roads in their area are completely broken, while only 14% believe they are completely fine: Gallup & Gilani Pakistan

According to a survey conducted by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, more than two-fifths Pakistanis (41%) report that the roads in their area are completely broken, while only 14% believe they are completely fine.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the country was asked the question, “What would you say is the condition of roads in your area?” In response, 14% said ‘Completely fine’, 26% said ‘Somewhat fine’, 19% said ‘Somewhat broken’, 41% said ‘Completely broken’.

The study in Pakistan was conducted and released by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1024 men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, conducted from 23rd October - 17th November 2024. The error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at the 95% confidence level. The methodology used for data collection was telephonic surveys (CATI).
