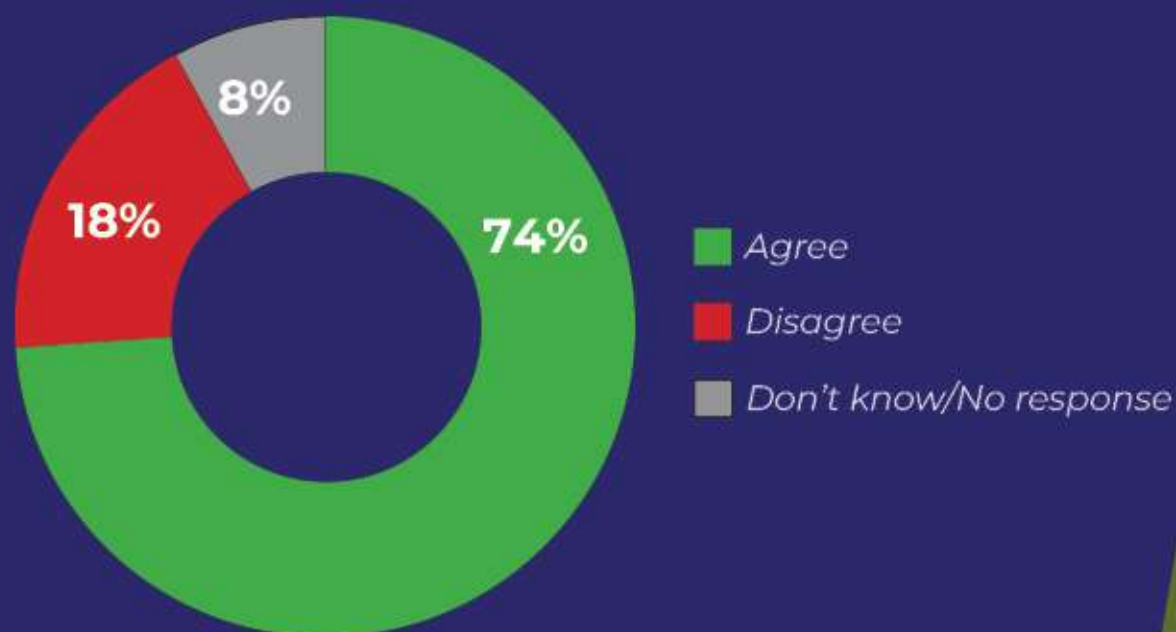


3 in 4 Pakistanis believe they are more hardworking than people in western countries

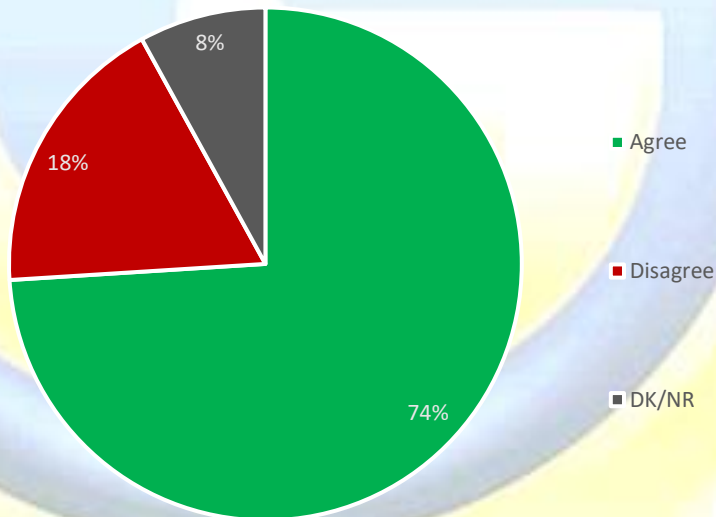
3 in 4 Pakistanis believe they are more hardworking than people in western countries, with a higher proportion of those with less than an FA qualification holding this view: Gallup & Gilani Pakistan

(Islamabad) 4th December, 2024

According to a survey conducted by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 3 in 4 Pakistanis believe they are more hardworking than people in western countries. Survey findings reveal that individuals with less than an FA qualification are 13% more likely to agree that Pakistanis are more hardworking than Westerners, compared to those with FA and higher qualifications.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the country was asked the question, “Please state whether you agree or disagree with the following statements? - Compared to people living in western countries, Pakistani people are more hardworking.” In response, 74% said ‘Yes’, 18% said ‘No’, and 8% responded they don’t know or gave no response.

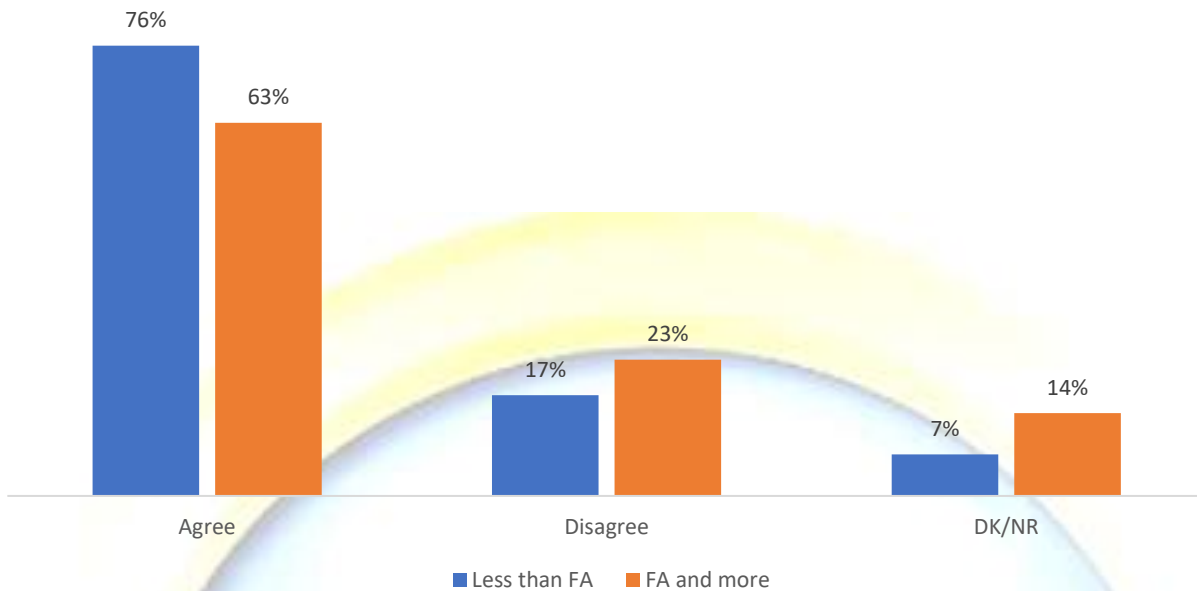
Question: Please state whether you agree or disagree with the following statements? - Compared to people living in western countries, Pakistani people are more hardworking.

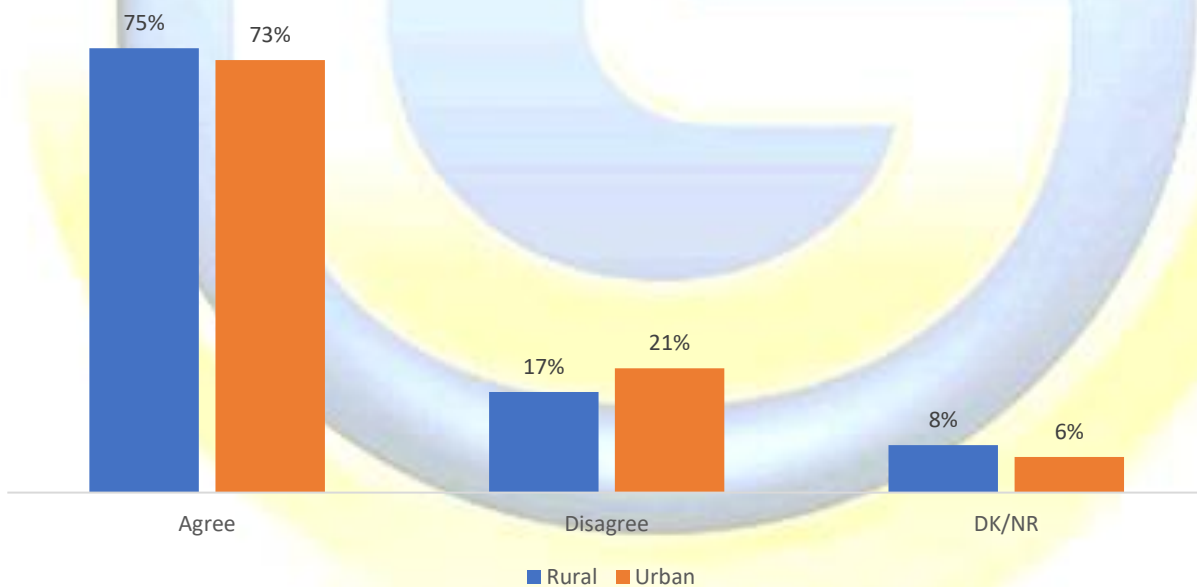
The study in Pakistan was conducted and released by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1089 men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, conducted from 12th September – 11th October 2024. The error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at the 95% confidence level. The methodology used for data collection was telephonic surveys (CATI).

Across education: This sentiment was more common among individuals with less than an FA qualification (76%) compared to those with FA or higher degrees (63%).

Across rurality: There was no significant difference in agreement between rural and urban populations, with 75% of rural and 73% of urban respondents agreeing.
