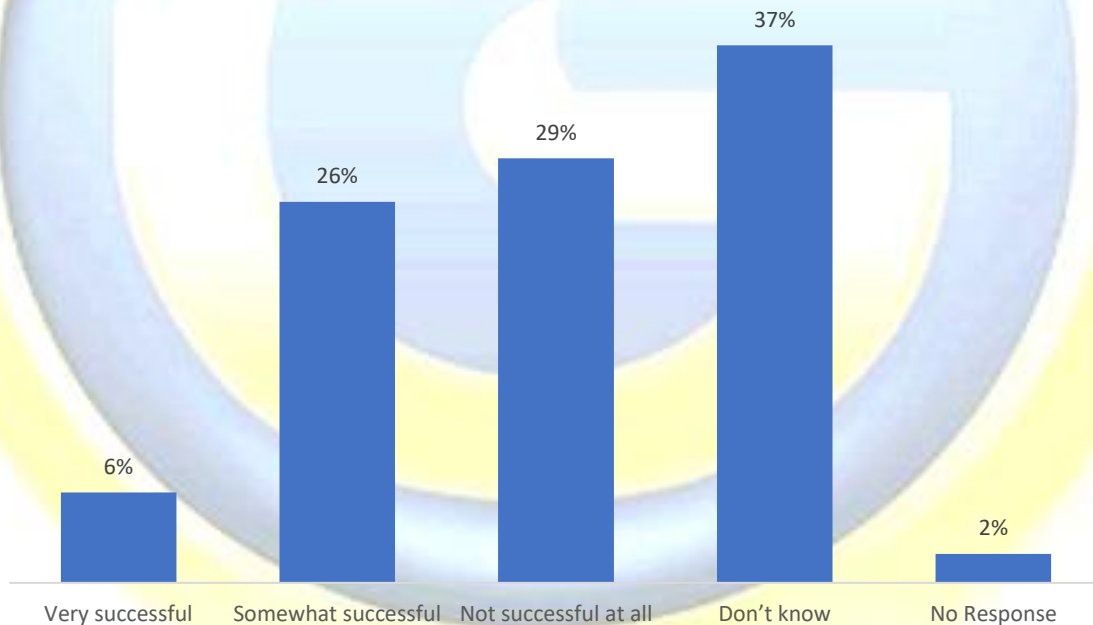
Nearly 1 in 3 Pakistanis believe the UN has failed to bring peace to the world, with higher proportions among those with 12 years of education (41%) and men (36%): Gallup & Gilani Pakistan

According to a survey conducted by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, nearly 1 in 3 Pakistanis believe the UN has failed to bring peace to the world, with higher proportions among those with 12 years of education (41%) and men (36%).

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the country was asked the question, "Please tell me how successful you think the United Nations has been in bringing peace to the world?" In response, 6% said 'Very successful', 26% said 'Somewhat successful', 29% responded 'Not successful at all', and 37 % said they don't know and 2% gave no response.

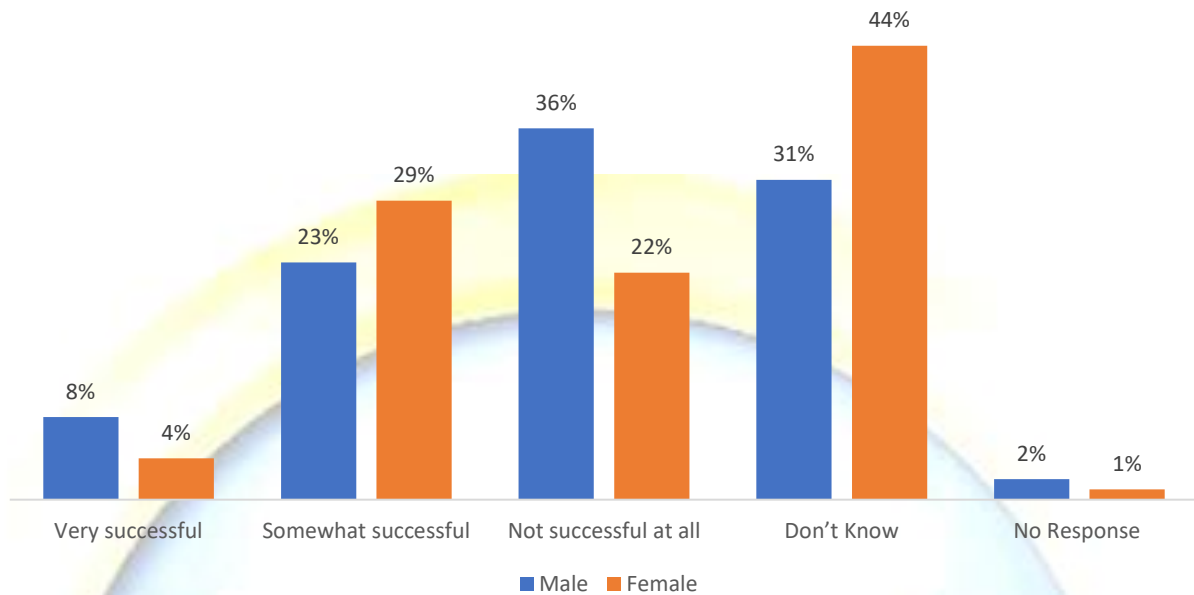
Question: Please tell me how successful you think the United Nations has been in bringing peace to the world?

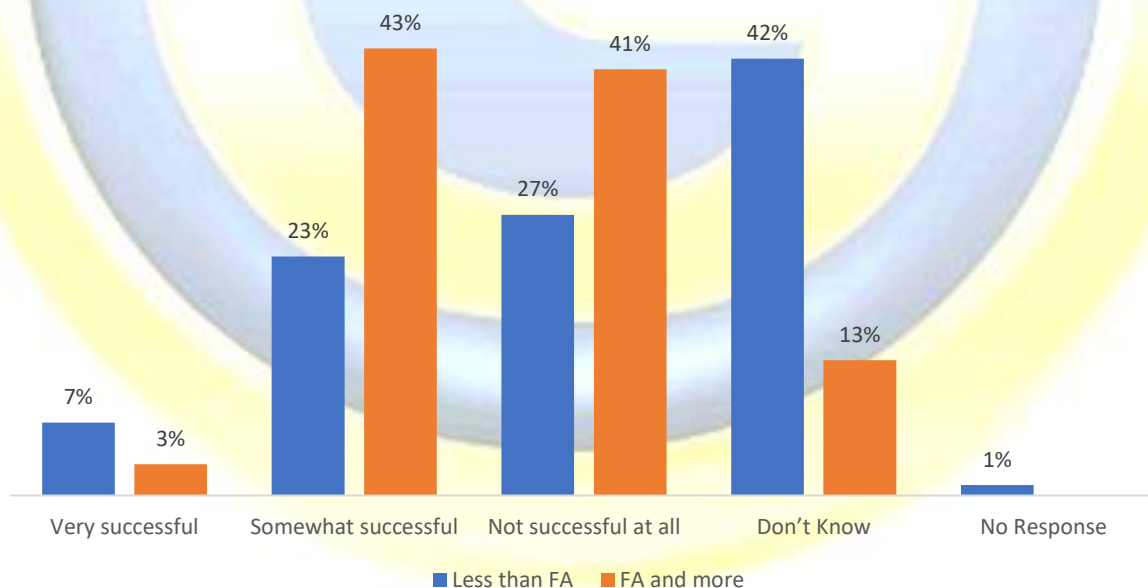
The study in Pakistan was conducted and released by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1024 men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, conducted from 23rd October - 17th November 2024. The error margin is estimated to be approximately ± 2 -3 percent at the 95% confidence level. The methodology used for data collection was telephonic surveys (CATI).

Across gender: More men (36%) than women (22%) are pessimistic about the UN's peacekeeping success.

Across education: Those with 12 years of education (41%) are more likely to believe the UN has not been successful in its peacekeeping efforts, compared to those with less than 12 years of education (27%).
