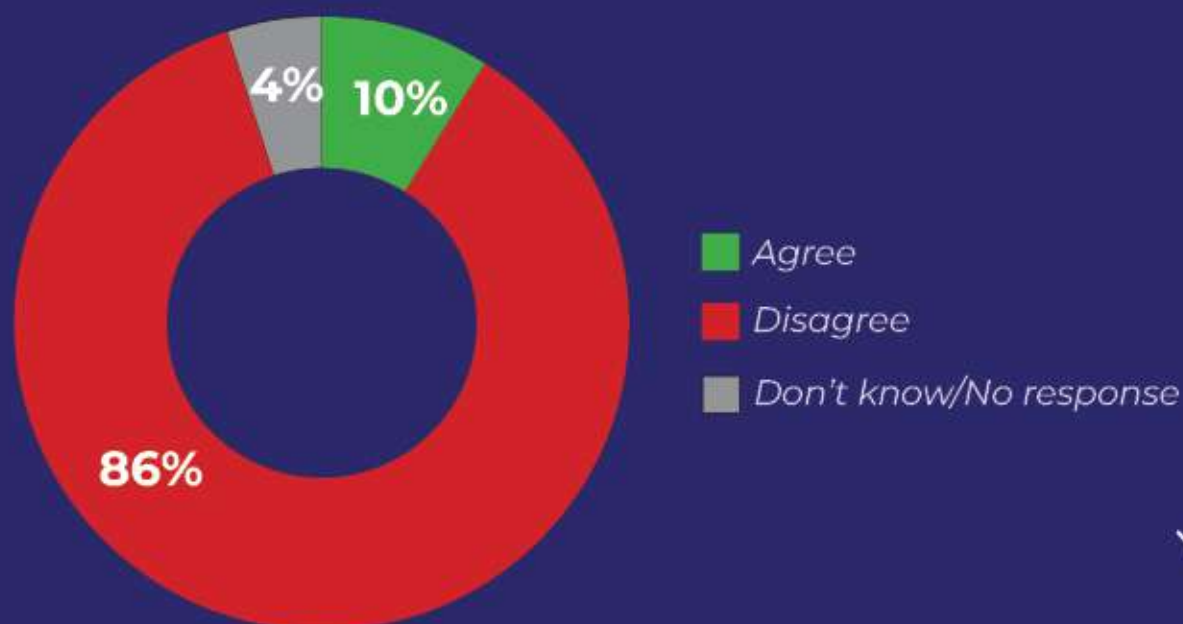


10% Pakistanis feel it is okay to reuse syringe if it is expensive,

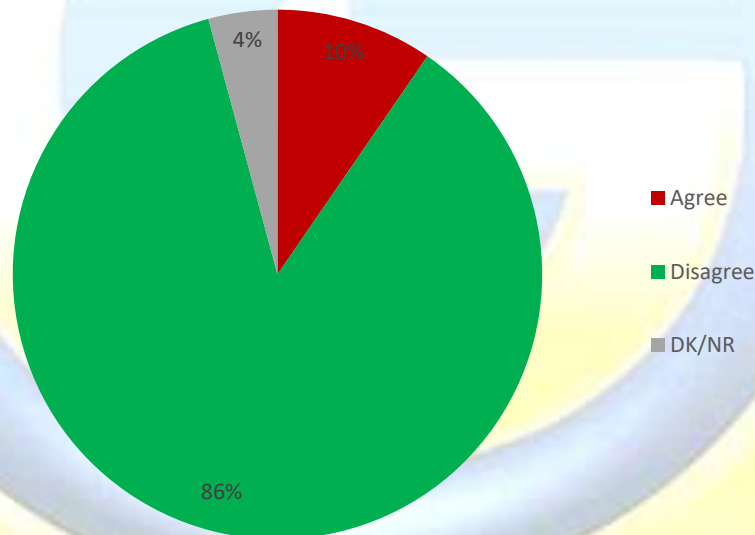
10% Pakistanis feel it is okay to reuse syringe if it is expensive, including 11% of those with less than 12 years of education and 7% urban residents: Gallup & Gilani Pakistan

According to a survey conducted by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, 10% Pakistanis feel it is okay to reuse syringe if it is expensive, including 11% of those with less than 12 years of education and 7% urban residents.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the country was asked the question, “Please tell us whether you agree or disagree with the following statements? - It is okay to reuse a syringe if it is expensive.” In response, 10% said ‘Agree’, 86% said ‘Disagree’, and 4 % said they don’t know or gave no response.

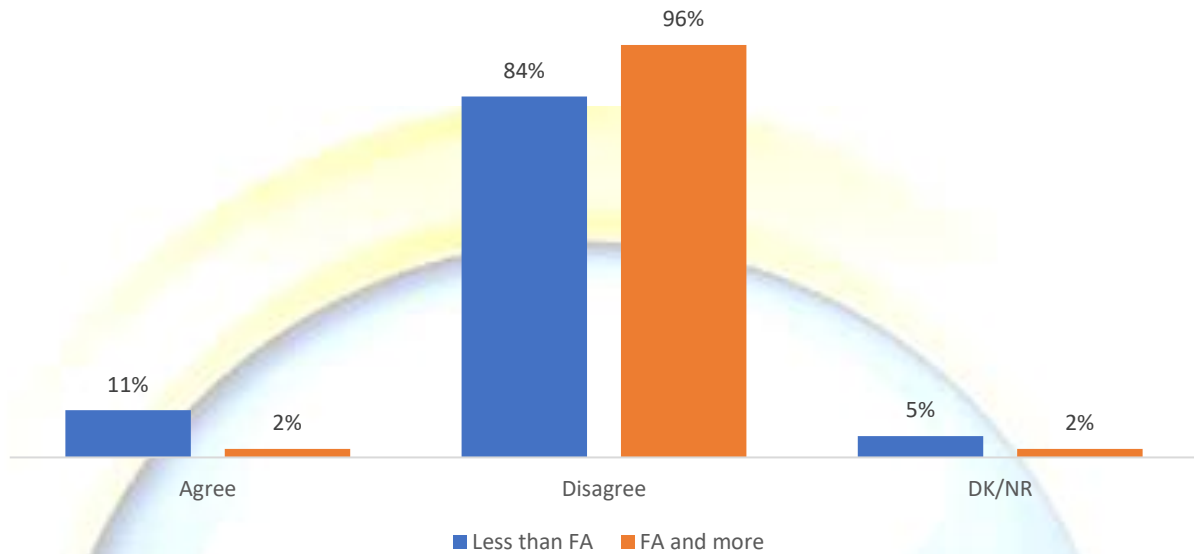
Question: Please tell us whether you agree or disagree with the following statements? - It is okay to reuse a syringe if it is expensive

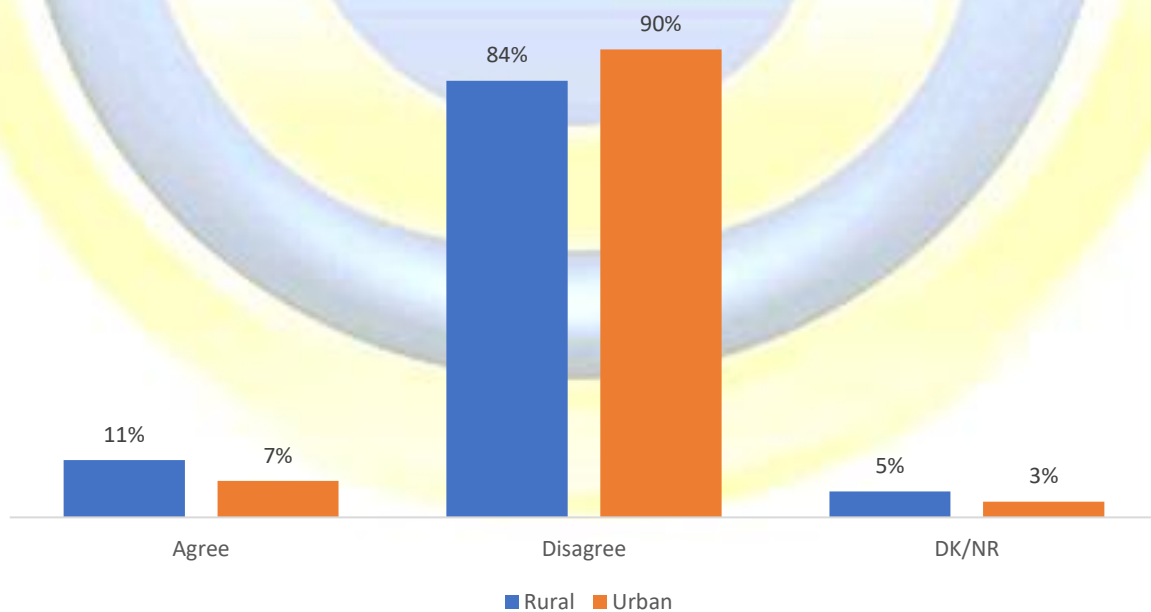
The study in Pakistan was conducted and released by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 3048 men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, conducted from 30th November- 10th December 2024. The error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at the 95% confidence level. The methodology used for data collection was telephonic surveys (CATI).

Across education: 2% Pakistanis with 12 years or better education say it is okay to reuse a syringe if it is expensive, yet this percentage increases to 11% among those with less than 12 years of education.

Across rurality: A concerning 4% gap exists between rural and urban residents' attitudes toward reusing expensive syringes, with 11% of rural residents and 7% of urban residents believing it is okay to reuse them.
