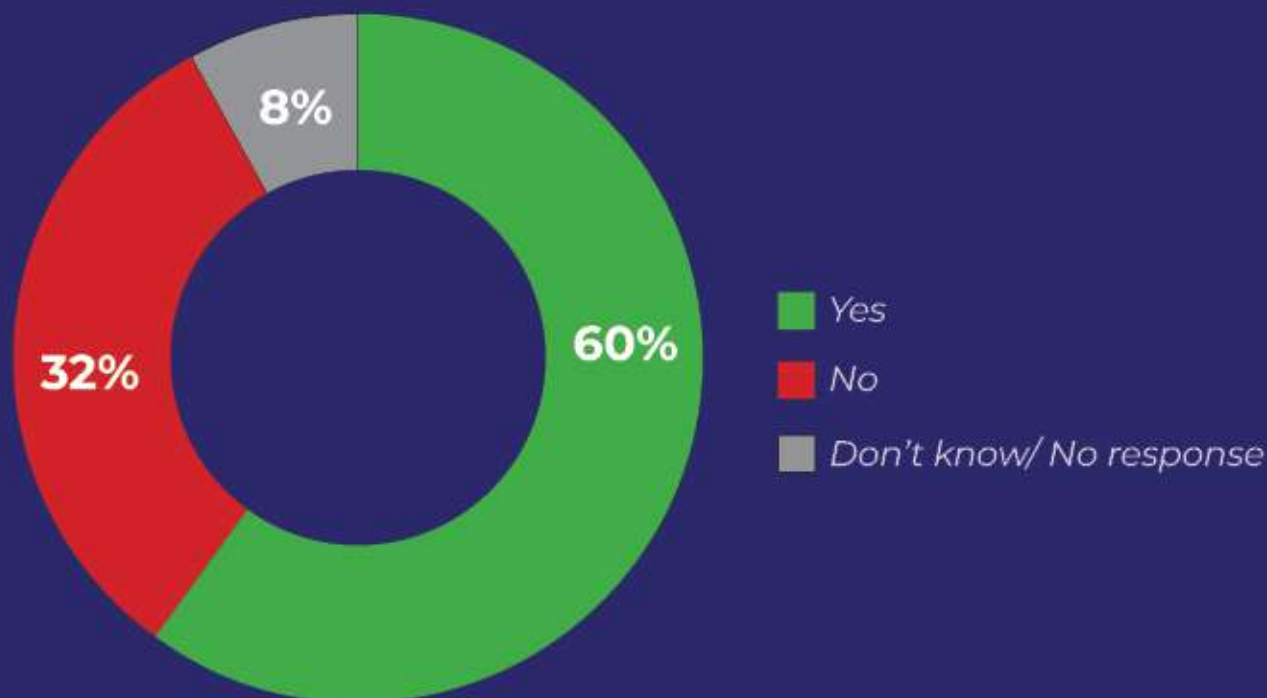
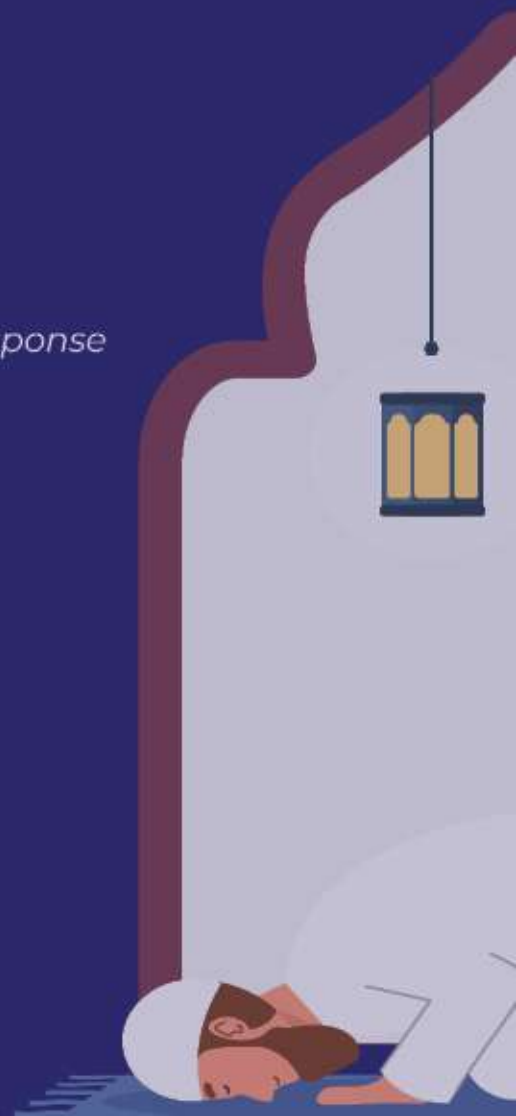


A majority of Pakistanis (60%) attended the last Friday prayer at the mosque

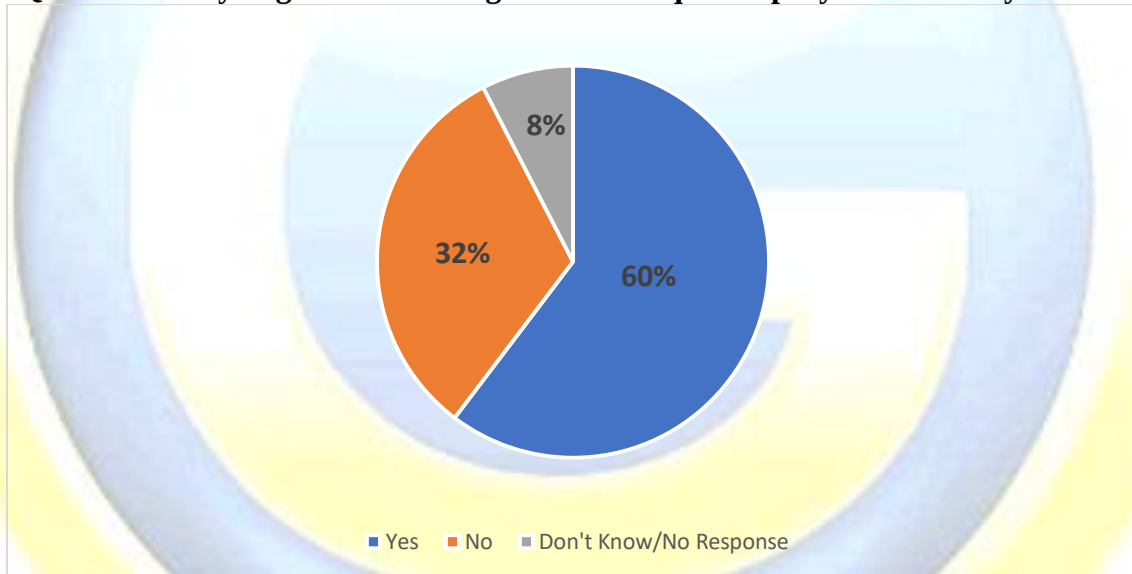

According to a survey conducted by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, A majority of Pakistanis (60%) attended the last Friday prayer at the mosque, with men (85%) and older people (82%) very likely to attend

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women from across the country was asked the question, “*Did you get a chance to go to the mosque for prayer last Friday or not?*” In response, 60% said ‘Yes,’ 32% said ‘No,’ and 8% either did not know or did not respond.

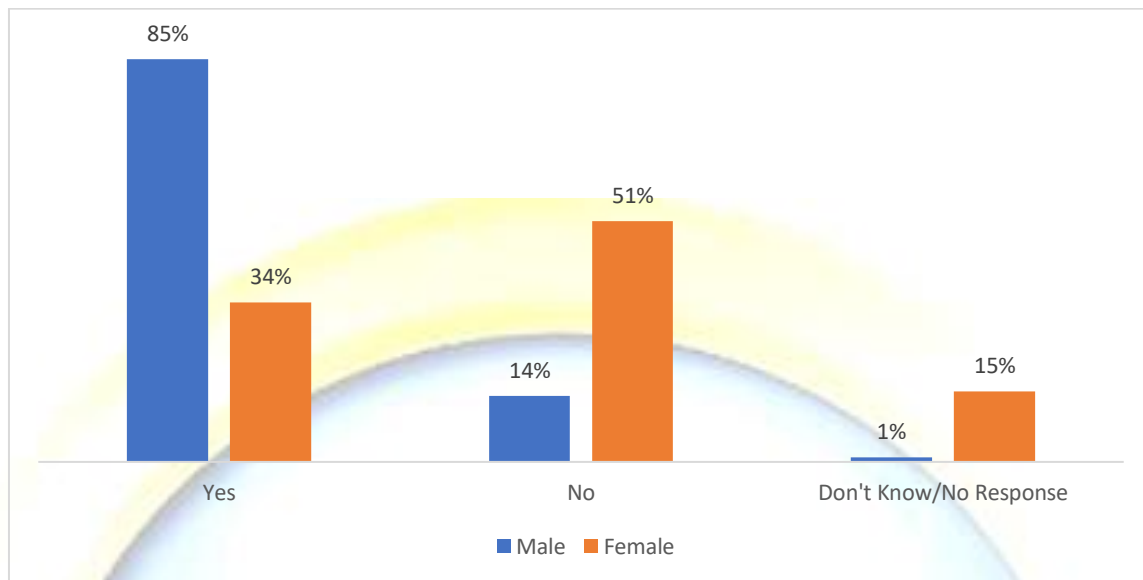
Question: Did you get a chance to go to the mosque for prayer last Friday or not?

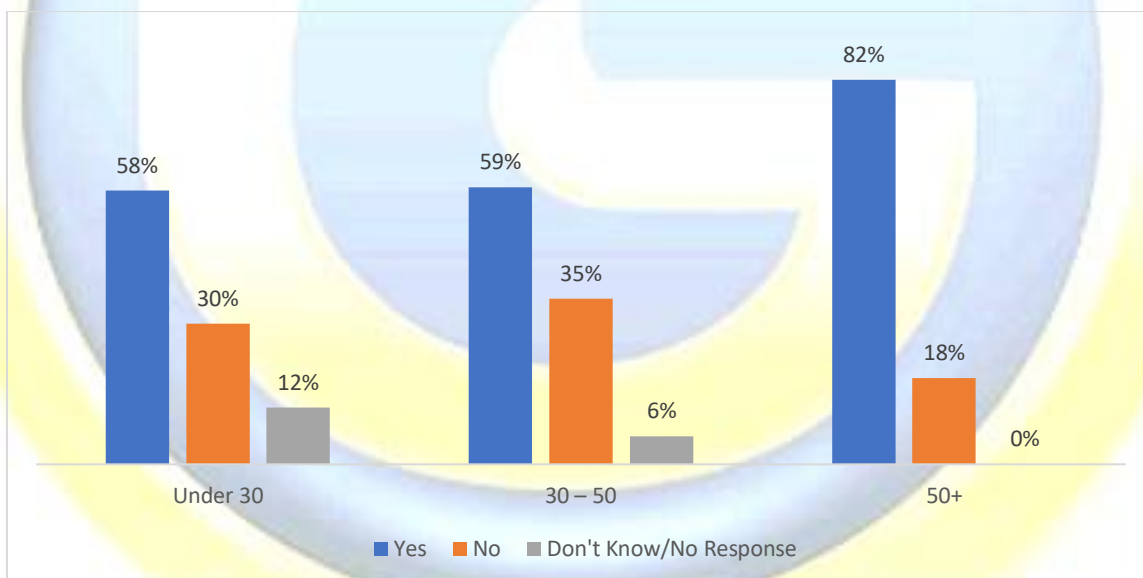
The study in Pakistan was conducted and released by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 788 men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, conducted from 7th January – 12th January 2025. The error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at the 95% confidence level. The methodology used for data collection was telephonic surveys (CATI)

Across gender: Men (85%) were 51% more likely than women (34%) to have attended Friday prayer at the mosque.

Across Age: Older persons (50+) were by far the most likely (82%) to attend Friday prayer compared to 59% of middle-aged persons (30-50) and 58% of younger persons.
