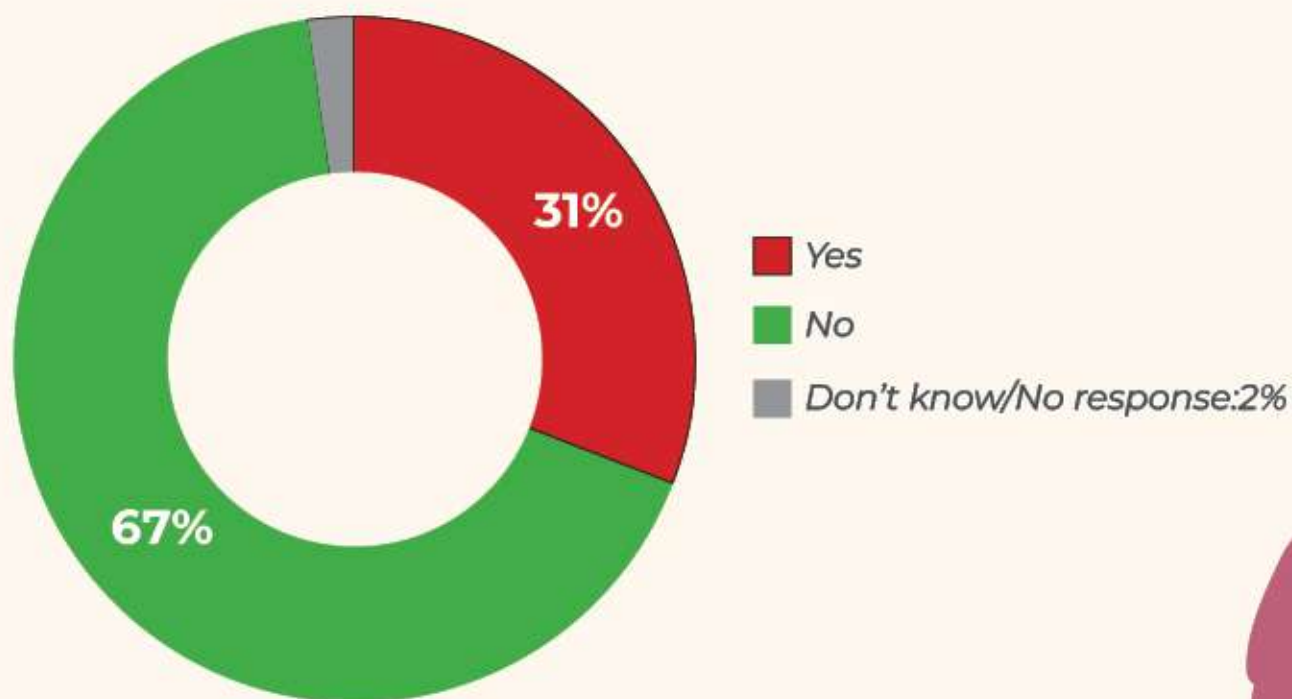

Majority Of Pakistanis (67%) Reject the Notion That Less Educated Spouses Find It Difficult to Accept Their Partner's Opinion, while 31% Agree with it. (Gallup & Gilani Survey)

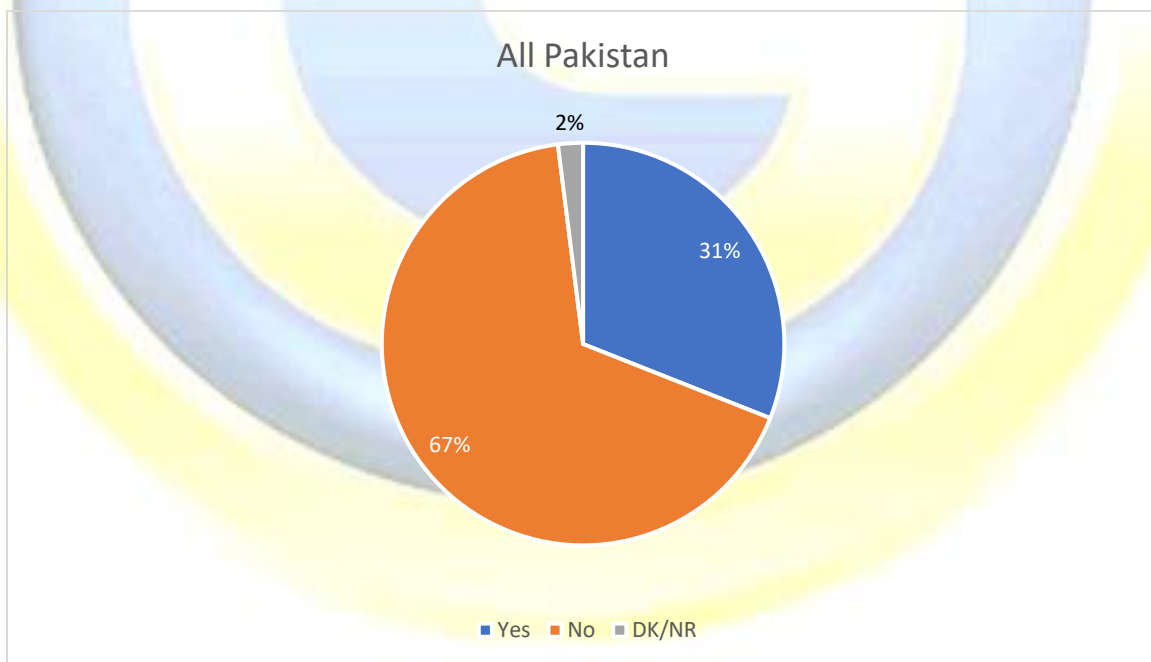

According to a Gallup & Gilani Pakistan survey, the majority of Pakistanis (67%) reject the notion that less educated spouses find it difficult to accept their partner's opinion, while 31% agree with it.

A nationally representative sample of adult men and women across the country was asked the question, ***“Do you think a less educated husband or wife finds it difficult to accept their spouse's opinion?”***. In response, 31% of Pakistanis responded “Yes” less educated husbands or wives find it difficult to accept their spouse's opinion. In contrast, 67% responded “No,” indicating they do not believe a less educated spouse struggles to accept their partner's opinion; only 2% said they did not know or chose not to respond.

These results suggest that, for most Pakistanis, education is not viewed as a decisive factor in a spouse's ability to accept and value the other's viewpoint.

The study in Pakistan was conducted and released by Gallup & Gilani Pakistan, the Pakistani affiliate of Gallup International. The recent survey was carried out among a sample of 1060 men and women in urban and rural areas of all four provinces of the country, conducted from August 02, 2025 to August 21, 2025. The error margin is estimated to be approximately $\pm 2-3$ percent at the 95% confidence level. The methodology used for data collection was telephonic surveys (CATI).
